FREEDOM TO FLOURISH

By now you have likely heard that Iowa has a new state logo and slogan. "Freedom to Flourish" is the catchy new phrase, replacing "Fields of Opportunities," which has been on the 68 welcome signs located on Interstate Highways 80 and 35 since 1999.

Gov. Kim Reynolds likes the new marketing, and I do, too. Sure, there will be detractors, much like those who spout their salty opinions whenever a new license plate design is announced and then fork out more of their own money to buy the all-black ones.

Gov. Reynolds says the new logo will appear on state websites starting tomorrow, but it will take some time to roll out everywhere. For what it's worth, I like the new slogan and logo, but I have to wonder how much this all cost. How does \$305,000 hit you?

That may sound steep, but consider this. The slogan and logo consist of four words, so the cost per word whittles down to \$76,250. Maybe that's not fair. OK, there are 21 letters, so the cost per letter is a measly \$14,523.

The state worked with consulting group FleishmanHillard out of St. Louis, because who knows how to better market Iowa than Missourians? Anyway, the folks at FleishmanHillard clearly like the slogan and logo. At that price, who wouldn't?

But before you get too wound up about how your taxpayer dollars are being spent, know that the \$305,000 came from federal American Rescue Plan Act funds, or what is better known as the COVID-19 Stimulus Package. You know, the \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill passed by Congress and signed into law by President Biden to speed up the country's recovery from the pandemic and

recession.

Oh, wait. Those are tax dollars, too. Different bucket, though.

Don't spit out your coffee yet; there are more dollars to be spent. The cost to replace the 68 interstate road signs is estimated at \$375,000 more, but we are told those dollars would come from existing budgets. Since I have my calculator handy, I did the math and came up with a cost of \$5,515 per sign.



Harry dedicated his life to serving others first, as a Lutheran pastor in Chicago's southside and later in Green Bay, Wisconsin. Harry moved on to Minneapolis where he served for 13 years as director of Family Life and Aging for the American Lutheran Church. He then moved to Milwaukee to develop and direct Caring Community, Inc. He retired from a 14-year career with Thrivent Financial for Lutherans. In 1997, Harry married Starr Scherf and lived in Johnston for more than 25 years.

Following his retirement, Harry's caring and dedicated service in community continued with Golden K Kiwanis, as board advisor for the Storybook Project, as a volunteer at ChildServe, Johnston, and as a reading mentor at Findley Elementary.

Washington Fellowship; Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE); Delta Sigma Pi International Fraternity; faculty advisor for Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity at Drake; nearly 20 years of taking students to Uganda for life changing cultural exchange experiences; and supporting Drake and the Shining City Foundation in building a clinic in a rural village in Uganda. She was also actively involved in her church, Greater Life Community Church, and served on the Nazarene District Advisory Board. In January, Deb, with her son, Bryan, and his wife, Lesley, stepped foot on Antarctica to reach her seventh continent and 31st country.

Deb was predeceased by her father, David. She is survived by her son, Bryan Bishop, and his wife, Lesley; daughter, Dr. Lisa Bishop and her husband, Jeremy Schuck; her three grandchildren, Trevor, Leo and Jacoby Schuck; mother, Frances Sprunger; sisters, Sandy (Curt) Hilding and Jean (Roger) McEowen; brothers, David (Marty) Sprunger and Randy (Susan) Sprunger; many nieces, nephews and their children, and many people around the world that she thought of as part of her family.

COOL OFF WITH A SWEET, FROZEN TREAT

Just bake chocolate chip cookies, spread them with peanut butter, add a scoop of ice cream and roll in chopped peanuts, chocolate chips or toasted coconut for a sweet bite of perfection.

With approximately 4,000 active peanut farmers, it's likely your peanuts — often referred to as "nutrition in a nutshell" — came from Georgia, which produces 52% of the country's supply. ■

PEANUT BUTTER ICE CREAM SANDWICHES

Recipe courtesy of Peanut Butter Lovers and the Georgia Peanut Commission

Yield: 12

- 24 fresh baked chocolate chip cookies (about 3 inches in diameter), cooled
- 1 1/2 cups creamy or crunchy peanut butter
- 1 1/2 quarts vanilla ice cream, slightly softened
- chopped peanuts, for topping (optional)
- mini chocolate chips, for topping (optional)
- toasted coconut, for topping (optional)

Directions:

On 12 cookies, top sides down, spread layer of peanut butter. Add one scoop of ice cream to each. Create sandwiches by topping with remaining cookies.



Roll edges of ice cream in chopped peanuts, mini chocolate chips or toasted coconut, if desired. Place on baking sheet in freezer and freeze until firm.

Serve slightly frozen.
