FREEDOM TO FLOURISH

By now you have likely heard that Iowa has a new state logo and slogan. "Freedom to Flourish" is the catchy new phrase, replacing "Fields of Opportunities," which has been on the 68 welcome signs located on Interstate Highways 80 and 35 since 1999.

Gov. Kim Reynolds likes the new marketing, and I do, too. Sure, there will be detractors, much like those who spout their salty opinions whenever a new license plate design is announced and then fork out more of their own money to buy the all-black ones.

Gov. Reynolds says the new logo will appear on state websites starting tomorrow, but it will take some time to roll out everywhere. For what it's worth, I like the new slogan and logo, but I have to wonder how much this all cost. How does \$305,000 hit you?

That may sound steep, but consider this. The slogan and logo consist of four words, so the cost per word whittles down to \$76,250. Maybe that's not fair. OK, there are 21 letters, so the cost per letter is a measly \$14,523.

The state worked with consulting group FleishmanHillard out of St. Louis, because who knows how to better market Iowa than Missourians? Anyway, the folks at FleishmanHillard clearly like the slogan and logo. At that price, who wouldn't?

But before you get too wound up about how your taxpayer dollars are being spent, know that the \$305,000 came from federal American Rescue Plan Act funds, or what is better known as the COVID-19 Stimulus Package. You know, the \$1.9 trillion economic stimulus bill passed by Congress and signed into law by President Biden to speed up the country's recovery from the pandemic and

recession.

Oh, wait. Those are tax dollars, too. Different bucket, though.

Don't spit out your coffee yet; there are more dollars to be spent. The cost to replace the 68 interstate road signs is estimated at \$375,000 more, but we are told those dollars would come from existing budgets. Since I have my calculator handy, I did the math and came up with a cost of \$5,515 per sign.

The NP Comet Cupboard Indoor Food Pantry is open on the first and third Wednesdays of the month from 5-6:30 p.m. (no appointment necessary and no eligibility requirements). It is located in the Education Wing of Polk City United Methodist Church, 1421 W. Broadway St., Polk City.

The NP Comet Cupboard in Polk City is doing food rescue at the Polk City Fareway store three days a week.

Those who wish to donate items can place them inside the tiny pantry or bring them to the big red collection barrel inside the church. If you or someone you know are in need, take what you need.

Food items commonly needed are dry soup mixes, canned vegetables, canned fruit, canned tuna/chicken, canned pasta, instant mashed potatoes, dried pasta, pasta sauce, peanut butter, jelly, mac-n-cheese, cereal, pancake mix and syrup, instant oatmeal, cornbread/muffin mix, brownie/ cake mix, breakfast bars, granola bars, popcorn, hot tea, cocoa packs, coffee. Donations of personal items such as chapstick, hand cream, Kleenex, hand sanitizer, etc. are also appreciated. For \$25, you can help fill one bag of groceries for a family facing financial hardships.

JESTER PARK NATURE CENTER ACTIVITIES

The Jester Park Nature Center is a focal point within our community where recreation, education, tourism and conservation efforts all intersect into a gathering place for people of all ages to engage in the natural world. We want all to enjoy the outdoors and learn about Iowa's natural heritage.

BOATING

Jester Park offers two boat ramps leading into Saylorville Lake. One is located off Jester Park Drive near the main campground, with the other located at the Lincoln Access beside the Mile-Long Bridge. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers warns boaters to use caution upstream from the Mile-Long Bridge. A "No Motorized Vessel Zone" is located north of the Mile Long Bridge from April 1 to Aug. 31. During periods of flood storage, restriction may be lifted.

CAMPING AND CABINS

Jester Park offers more than 148 campsites along the lakeshore and across the wooded hills overlooking Saylorville Lake. There are 80 electric sites, 62 non-electric sites, four walk-in primitive sites, and two youth areas. Two campground shower houses are open mid-April through the end of October (weather permitting).

EQUESTRIAN ACTIVITIES

The Jester Park Equestrian Center offers riding lessons, shows and clinics, team building, trail riding, wagon and sleigh rides, camps, and therapeutic and at-risk programming.

GOLFING

The Jester Park Golf Course is an 18-hole championship course. Excellent playing conditions and challenging holes have helped make Jester Park a popular course for state tournaments. Jester Park also offers a 9-hole par 3 course especially popular with beginning golfers, as well as a modern Golf Learning and Practice Facility with driving range and practice greens.

JESTER PARK LODGE

The Jester Park Lodge is a full service banquet and conference center nestled along the northwest shore of Saylorville Lake at Jester Park with all of the amenities you expect. Minutes away from Des Moines and yet a world apart. More information here.

MINIATURE GOLF

Located next to the Jester Park Driving Range, the new Jester Park Miniature Golf Course is an 18-hole, nature-themed miniature course packed full of fun obstacles with the added bonus of a beautiful park view.

RECIPE

COOL OFF WITH A SWEET, FROZEN TREAT

(*Family Features*) When the sun is shining and you need to beat the heat, cool down with a little shade and a nutty, frozen treat. This kid-favorite is a childhood classic you can customize with favorite toppings, too.

Made with the protein power of peanuts, these Peanut Butter Ice Cream Sandwiches are easy to prepare on hot days that call for a cold dessert. Just bake chocolate chip cookies, spread them with peanut butter, add a scoop of ice cream and roll in chopped peanuts, chocolate chips or toasted coconut for a sweet bite of perfection.

With approximately 4,000 active peanut farmers, it's likely your peanuts — often referred to as "nutrition in a nutshell" — came from Georgia, which produces 52% of the country's supply. ■

PEANUT BUTTER ICE CREAM SANDWICHES

Recipe courtesy of Peanut Butter Lovers and the Georgia Peanut Commission

Yield: 12

- 24 fresh baked chocolate chip cookies (about 3 inches in diameter), cooled
- 1 1/2 cups creamy or crunchy peanut butter
- 1 1/2 guarts vanilla ice cream, slightly softened
- chopped peanuts, for topping (optional)
- mini chocolate chips, for topping (optional)
- toasted coconut, for topping (optional)

Directions:

On 12 cookies, top sides down, spread layer of peanut butter. Add one scoop of ice cream to each. Create sandwiches by topping with remaining cookies



Roll edges of ice cream in chopped peanuts, mini chocolate chips or toasted coconut, if desired. Place on baking sheet in freezer and freeze until firm.

Serve slightly frozen.
