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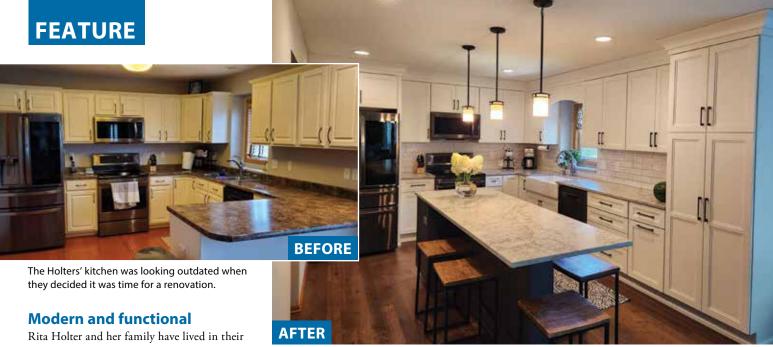

home since December of 2004. When they purchased the house, it was new construction, so there wasn't a desire to change much aesthetically, other than improving the landscaping and finishing the basement. They did the landscaping in phases and finished the basement in 2006.

Almost 20 years later, the home was starting to show its age, and they decided to

tackle upgrading in phases. They updated the living room a few years ago and decided the kitchen was next on the list. The kitchen cabinets, in particular, were showing their age, so Rita wanted a more modern style with added functionality. That led to a whole room makeover.

"Our cabinets were in pretty poor shape. In discussing with friends, several people recommended Peggy at Cabinets by Design. I reached out to Peggy with a pretty basic idea. Open spaces and functional areas

The Bousums purchased their Johnston home 10 years ago, and Kayla knew at some point it would require some renovations to make it their dream home.

"I remember asking myself at the time, 'How long can I tolerate the wall separating the kitchen from the living room?' After our kids got to the age where we were done with childcare expenses, we started saving up for a large-scale remodel."

The first step came about by chance as one of Kayla's Johnston High School's School-to-Work students was interning at an interior design company and needed a real-life client to work with. She volunteered herself, and she took that opportunity to learn about the design process while working with a contractor. That first estimate they received seemed high, so she sought two more from other contractors.

They ultimately chose Cyclone Contracting of Ames because they did things differently, she says. They asked for an upfront design fee but provided a hard estimate. The designer, Jennie Noah, took the time to listen to Kayla's ideas and understood what she wanted. Over the next six months, Jennie and Kayla worked together to get the estimate as exact as possible, while working with a budget the Bousums felt comfortable with.

"They also began planning a timeline for construction that worked for our family," says Kayla. "The construction took only 10 weeks. We prepared food in our basement in crockpots and an air fryer. The dust and paint fumes were the worst part, but when my ideas started coming to life, it was so exciting to live through."

She says the whole family likes the new space. She now enjoys that, when someone is in the kitchen, they are not separated from the rest of the family. The design also features a new laundry room and half bathroom, using some of the space from a formal dining room they never used. The rest of that space was converted to a small office space and an additional bathroom and dedicated laundry zone.

Kayla says the kids are no longer embarrassed to bring friends over, and she

especially appreciates the area where they can hide their phones and chargers.

"Our home really functions for us now. Our location and neighborhood have always been the highlight of our home, and now the interior measures up, too," she says. Recently, they refinished their dated bathroom. The wish list included a custom shower, floor replacement, new light fixtures and a repainted vanity.

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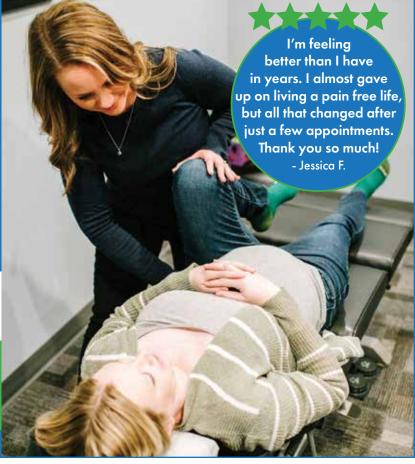

The couple is thrilled with the final result, says Brian, adding he

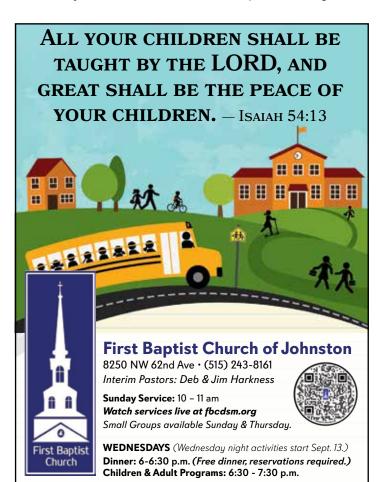


is a big fan of the giant shower with plenty of room along with a more updated design.

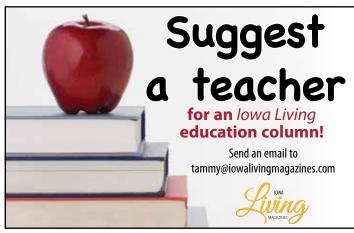

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THIS MEDICARE step could save you money

I know what you might think: "I like my current coverage; no change needed." That may be true. Some of the most heartbreaking stories I've heard are when someone goes to the pharmacy to pick up medication and finds out it's no longer



covered or has changed. That's when out-of-pocket costs can skyrocket, and the medicine can cost hundreds more than the last time they went to the pharmacy.

During the annual enrollment period last year, I ran the numbers for one of the individuals we work with and found that Meloxicam. an arthritis medicine, costs \$12 for a 90-day refill at their in-network pharmacy and \$1,117.80 at one that was not in-network. That is not the kind of surprise you want to get when you go to pick up your medicine and the reason I run the numbers for them before making any changes.

You can switch to an Advantage Plan from a traditional Medigap supplement (like Plan F or Plan G) during annual enrollment. You can also move from one Advantage Plan to another or from one prescription drug plan to another.

There is a lot of information out there about Medicare, and the choices can feel overwhelming. A professional can help people make sense of it all, while helping them coordinate their Medicare decisions with the other aspects of their retirement plan, so every decision is made with their retirement vision in mind.

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ROTARIANS mark Kester's accomplishments



The Johnston Rotary Club announces another rare accomplishment for one of its members. Chaplain (Colonel) Martha Kester made history for the second time this year, and what an accomplishment it was. Earlier this year, Kester was assigned as the first female State Chaplain for the Iowa National Guard and the "co-first" in such an assignment nationwide. Now, Kester made history again by her recent promotion to full colonel in the Iowa Guard. But it doesn't stop there. Not only is this a great achievement in the Iowa Guard, she's also the first female Guard State Chaplain nationwide to be promoted to full colonel.

Chaplain Kester, like almost all Guard and Reserve members, balances a civilian career with a military career, and, unselfishly, they feel blessed with the opportunity to do so. Her unique career began when she, a native of New Jersey, assumed a position with St. Luke's Episcopalian Church, 3424 Forest Ave. in Des Moines, in 2006. Upon assuming the clergy position with St. Luke's, she joined the Guard where she has served since. "No coincidences, strictly God's plan coming to fruition in both instances," humbly states Kester.

In 2010, Kester deployed to Afghanistan for nine months, where she said she experienced a "bizarre sense of reality" but also "an incredible sense of purpose." Based out of Bagram Air Base, Kester said she traveled across the country, meeting soldiers and providing them with prayer. "The intent of the military chaplaincy is to bring God to the soldiers and to bring soldiers to God," she said.

"It's that sense that no matter where we are or what we're doing, even in the horrible and the worst situation where it seems like there's no way anything good can happen, there's that sense that God is still present."

Most of the time you'll find Martha at St. Luke's serving the members of her congregation, or she might be at the Guard Headquarters at Camp Dodge serving the members of the Guard. But, on Tuesday mornings, she's normally in Johnston, serving the community by participating with the Johnston Rotary on their community projects. We don't know what God has in mind for the Chaplain's (colonel's) next assignment, but, selfishly, we ask that it be in the great State of Iowa.

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GUARDIANSHIP for adult child with disabilities

If you are a parent of a child with a disability, and your child is about to turn 18, this can be a scary time. You may be aware that, once a child turns 18, they are a legal adult and are presumed to be capable of making decisions and exercising rights on their own. This means that you, as the parent, will no longer be able to make decisions for your child regarding their finances, healthcare or education.



In order to remain an active advocate for your child and to be included in conversations regarding their finances, healthcare and education, you should file for a guardianship over your child. A guardianship is a legal proceeding where a person, typically a family member, asks the court to find that the adult child is unable to effectively manage their affairs due to their disability.

To obtain a guardianship, you must petition the court. The petition must include all basic facts, including the petitioner's relationship to the person who will be under the guardianship as well as a brief description of the ward's disability. The description should include how the disability affects the person's ability to make decisions. Following the petition, there will be a hearing before a judge. At

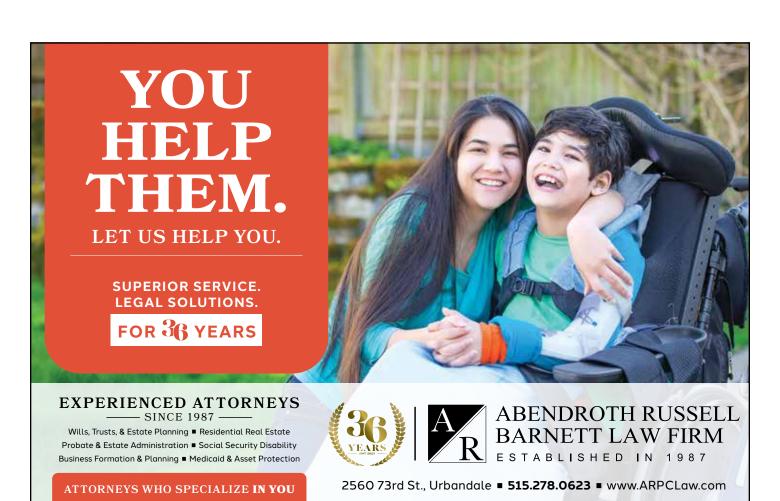
this hearing, you must present sufficient evidence of the need for a guardianship.

A guardianship doesn't completely eliminate your child's ability to make decisions for themselves; rather, it provides you the opportunity to continue to support their self-sufficiency.

Having a guardianship over your adult child allows you to continue to support them and assist them in their everyday lives. You will, with a guardianship, be able to assist them in maximizing their independence. Without a guardianship over your 18-year-old, you lose the ability to speak with their doctors and care providers, communicate with insurance companies on their behalf, coordinate benefits, and assist in managing their finances and assets.

In order to ensure that your petition is done correctly and that you are maximizing your chances of continuing to be an advocate for your child, you should speak to a reputable attorney with experience in guardianships. Your attorney will be able to assist you in the petition and in any court hearings that follow.

MAYOR Dierenfeld inducted into Hall of Fame

The 2023 Iowa Women's Hall of Fame inductees were recently announced by the Iowa Commission on the Status of Women. Johnston Mayor Paula Dierenfeld was among the inductees. She is currently the longest-serving female mayor in Iowa, having served since 2008. An induction ceremony for the honorees was held Saturday, Aug. 26, at the State Capitol Rotunda.



Mayor Paula Dierenfeld has a long and distinguished career in law and public service. She spent 15 years working in state and federal government positions that included being a staff member to a U.S. Senator, legal counsel to the governor of Iowa, an Iowa Utilities Board Commissioner and staff director in the Iowa Legislature. She went on from government to practice law for 22 years at the Nyemaster Goode law firm.

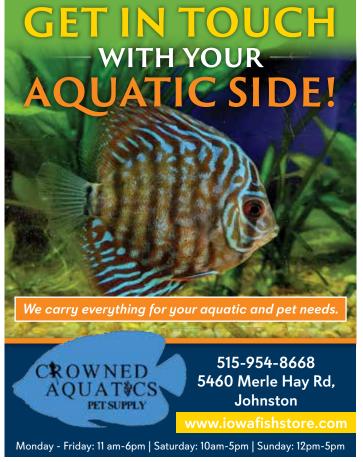
She was elected to the Johnston City Council in 1999, where she completed two terms before being elected as mayor in 2008. Over the course of Mayor Dierenfeld's leadership, Johnston has flourished with substantial growth and prosperity. The city's population has swelled from approximately 8,000 to more than 26,000 residents, accompanied by a 25% expansion in land area. During her tenure, vital infrastructure projects were accomplished, including a new public safety building, city hall, Town Center, a sprawling 200-acre city park, and an extensive network of 50 miles of recreational trails.

Mayor Dierenfeld has led efforts at the local level to wipe out sextrafficking massage parlors in Iowa cities. She drafted the first city ordinance authorizing a city to investigate and verify the legitimacy of a massage business before its operating in a community. The Johnston ordinance has become a model for other Iowa cities to follow.

She has become an inspiration for females of all ages, promoting participation, competition and excellence in sports. A dedicated runner since her early 20s, she has completed more than two dozen marathons. Her passion for running has also translated into significant philanthropy. She has raised nearly \$58,000 over nine years for the Johnston Partnership Food Pantry through the annual Mayor's Run for Food. As if her running isn't enough, at age 60, she learned to swim and has become an advocate for people of all ages to learn this life-saving skill.

Now retired from her law practice, she manages her family's farm in Sac City while continuing to serve as Johnston's mayor. This phase of life allows Mayor Dierenfeld to spend more quality time with her husband, three children, 13 grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren.

SO... they say things will cost more?

When it comes to inflation, I can say that it affects everyone a little differently. When I was a teenager in the 1990s, this was not a term I understood. However, as this version of inflation was happening in circa 1995, we were seeing a different world than the early 1990s and 1980s. I remember 85-cent gasoline, I remember that KwikStar's donuts still cost a dollar. Inflation didn't concern me when I



So, why is inflation relevant? Let's look at some figures.

Core CPI, which excludes volatile food and energy prices, rose just 0.16 percent for the month, the lowest reading in more than two years and a significant downside break. There are a number of reasons why it was such a big deal, including:

- It was a downside surprise compared to the consensus estimate of
- On a year-over-year basis, 0.16% translates to 1.92% inflation on an annual basis. Whoa!
- It may give the Fed some flexibility with interest rates in the second half of 2023. This is not good news for you homebuyers; great news for you stock market investors.
- June's Producer Price Index, released the day after the June CPI report, rose less than expected, building on the optimism about inflation. (Greek. Basically, the FED is trying to speed up the train to get us to where our station is faster.)

I don't put too much stock on individual reports, so, at this point, I'm looking for more information before drawing any conclusions about the economy, inflation, and interest rates. Generally speaking, let me take you into my time machine back to the mid-90s. We historically have seen an inflationary market followed by a recessionary turn. Now, don't get nervous. If you have read previous blogs that I have written, you will notice that I was witness to the moments of inflation/recession transition. And, let me build some confidence; we will all be fine. The job market will improve, the price at the pump should reduce, and I will get a 2x4 for less than \$4. Fear generally drives change. And the move from an inflationary market to any other type of environment is not less scary for people.

Allow me to duplicate my daily joy and leave you with some positivity. This economic transition is a good thing. We should wish for it. The stabilization that will come from this economic cyclical turn will help everyone. We will look around and see that the grass is greener, the flowers smell better, and stuff will cost less. How do we ask for better. "Strawberry fields forever" ... thank you, John Lennon. Hang in there. The best is yet to come. Reach out to a financial planner if you have questions and concerns.

- 1/2 cup raw pecan pieces
- 15 ounces part-skim ricotta cheese
- 4 tablespoons sour cream
- 1/4 teaspoon ground pepper
- · 1 large egg, lightly beaten

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven to 375 F.
- Cook cavatappi in salted boiling water.
 Drain, reserving 1/2 cup pasta cooking water. Return pasta to pot and stir in butter.
- · Using box grater, shred cheddar cheese.
- Using food processor, combine 1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese with pecans.
 Process to coarse breadcrumb consistency.
- Add remaining cheddar cheese, ricotta,



sour cream, 1 teaspoon salt and pepper to warm pasta. Stir until thoroughly combined. Add egg; stir. Add 2-4 tablespoons reserved pasta water to loosen mixture; stir until smooth.

- Pour into buttered 9-inch square or round casserole dish and top evenly with pecan topping.
- Bake 30 minutes.

Substitutions: Use pre-shredded cheese in place of cheddar cheese block. Use pasta of choice in place of cavatappi.

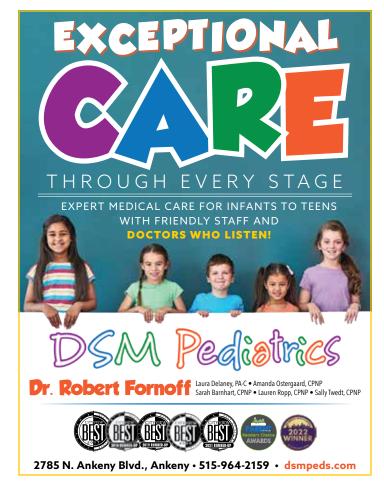

WAYS to help your kids open up more

School is starting, and kids' schedules are about to get more hectic. So, now is the time to talk with your kids and check in with them about how their days are going. This can be as simple as using open-ended questions about their day to get the information you are looking for. Instead of asking, "How was your day?" and getting the blah answer of, "Fine," ask questions that require more thought. For example, "What was the best part of science today?" "Who



did you sit at lunch with today?" "What was the funniest thing you heard today?" This way, the answers are more than one word and give you something to continue the conversation. When they answer who they sat with, add on to that conversation with, "Who had the best lunch? What was in it?" or "Where was ____ today?" BEST USES of popular apples

Did you know there are more than 750 varieties of apples to choose from? So, what's the difference between Fuji, Honey Crisp and Granny Smith? How do you know what to use to bake with, serve up raw or put into cider?

Not all varieties of apples are meant to be eaten straight off the tree or off the grocery store shelf. Some are meant for baking into pies or brewing into ciders, while others are ideal for snacking or savory dishes. Here are some popular varieties and their best uses:



- McIntosh Apple. If you're looking for a creamy, softer apple, McIntosh is the apple for you. They're perfect for applesauce or soup. In terms of flavor, they're juicy and often tart. Since they're a bit mealy in texture, I wouldn't suggest baking with them.
- Fuji. The Fuji, named for its hometown of Fujisaki, Japan, is world famous for its sweetness. They are a lovely light rose or a rich crimson, ultra sweet, flavor forward, refreshingly juicy. Though not a standout in any specific arena, its versatility makes it a welcome addition to snacks, salads, pies, ciders and whatever else you've got planned.
- Jonagold. Tart-sweet flavor and high in fiber, Jonagolds (and all apples) can help lower blood pressure, cholesterol and the risk of colon cancer. Due to their softer skin, these apples are great in juices, soups, smoothies and cider.
- Galas Galas are a popular choice and can be found anywhere. They feature mildly sweet flavors with hints of vanilla. For a mellow, easyeating apple, you're in the right spot. They are great for dipping, as part of a snack spread, or tossed with salad. They are better fresh than baked.
- Granny Smith. The quintessential tart apple. Beyond the iconic light-green skin of this apple awaits a lemon-like acidity with just enough sweetness to satisfy. This apple was discovered by none other than Granny Smith on her farm in Australia and is now available all over the world. This apple is all-purpose when you want an extra tart apple flavor. It pairs well with a flavorful cheese and bakes exceptionally well in pies and desserts as it balances out the sweetness.
- Honeycrisp. Crisp and famously sweet. The name really says it all. This popular, versatile apple can satisfy most anyone. The best Honeycrisp apples are yellow with a red blush covering the whole fruit. Look for them earlier in the season. This apple is best eaten out of hand or pressed into juice or cider.
- Pink Lady. Notably pink in color, this apple's acidity and sugar give it an initially tart flavor, which develops nicely into a sweet and floral finish. The acidity also provides a refreshingly bright "fizzy" sensation on the palate, leaving a lingering floral aftertaste. Popularly eaten out of hand for its effervescence, it also holds its shape exceptionally well when baking. It is also great in savory recipes. ■

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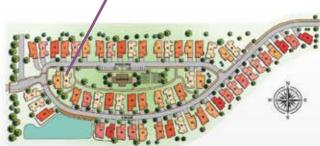


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
