

BELL WINS NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

Jaida Bell of Johnston recently competed in the Track & Field Nationals at Eugene, Oregon, for the second year in a row and came home as the USATF Junior Olympics National Champion in the triple jump with a jump of 39'0.25. This tied her personal record jump, which broke the state record.

"What makes this story so special is that she might have become Iowa's first USATF Junior Olympics National Champion in triple jump," says Jeff Johannes, head coach for the Tornado Track Club, sprints, relays and horizontal jumps, in which Bell participates. "This event we do not have in our high school season. We are one of the few states that doesn't give our high school athletes a chance to learn it, so when we have an opportunity to do this event in the summer, we are usually at least three

to four months behind the rest of the country in practicing it."

This was Bell's first year

participating in summer track and competing for Tornado Track Club. In three weeks, she broke the state record by more than four feet, making her Iowa's all-time triple jump leader, said Johannes.

"It was exciting to see her step up when a girl had passed her in the first round of prelim jumps," says Johannes. "This was new territory for her to see someone out-jump her. She looked in the stands at me and said, 'Oh, no, you are not going to take this away from me.' She gave everything she had in the second jump to take first overall."

Bell also competed in the 100m and finished in 12.71 to improve on her ranking.

Previously, Bell won a bronze medal at the AAU Junior Olympic



THANK YOU FOR BEING A FRIEND



But what exactly does it mean to be a friend? I recently heard Father Ray Higgins offer a version of the following story as part of his sermon. I had not heard the story before, and I was touched so much by it that I wanted to pass it along to each of you. Here it is.

Two soldiers were great friends. One evening, one soldier comes back to the trench but finds that his friend had not returned. Many soldiers had been killed on the front. He became worried that his

friend was one of them.

He asked about his friend, and another soldier said, "We don't know if he was



The day was turning to night, and the enemy was still firing madly, but the soldier wanted to search for his friend.

His commanding officer said, "No, that would be foolish," but he disregarded his officer and left the trench. It was dark, and there were thousands of corpses all around. He searched diligently, and in the middle of the night, he returned — dragging his friend's dead body on his back.

He, himself, was now mortally wounded and could not survive.

His commanding officer approached him and said, "I told you not to be foolish! It was not worth it. Your friend is dead, and you are dying!"

The dying man opened his eyes and said, "But it was worth it — because when I went there, he looked at me and said, 'I knew you would come.'"

If that story doesn't make you think about how much you are willing to do for a friend, then I don't know what will.

HAROLD RAY BERGMAN

Harold Ray Bergman died on Sept. 3, 2023, at Edencrest of Green Meadows in Johnston. His funeral was Saturday, Sept. 9, at The Bridge in Johnston. Interment was Monday, Sept. 11, at Oak Hill Cemetery in Parkersburg.

Harold was born on Sept. 25, 1924, on a farm home near Stout. He graduated from Parkersburg High School in 1942. He was deferred during World War II to farm with his father and three uncles and was eventually drafted in 1945. As an



occupation troop in the Army Ordnance Corps, he reached the rank of staff sergeant, serving a total of two years in France, Germany and Austria. In 2009, he was on an Honor Flight with fellow veterans to Washington, D.C.

In 1946, he resumed his education at the University of Iowa and finished in August of 1950 with a degree in mathematics and a teaching certification. On Aug. 21, 1950, he married Frances Jean Kalkwarf, daughter of Henry and Elizabeth (Mulder) Kalkwarf, in Parkersburg. He taught for a brief time then became a field manager for the Iowa Farm Bureau, for which he worked for 37.5 years in numerous locations. He retired in 1989, and the couple moved to Des Moines.

An avid cyclist throughout his life, he competed in the Senior Games Time Trial in 2004. He was a member of Reformed Churches of America, served as an elder, was on several committees and sang in the church choir. He was also a member of the American Legion and the Audubon Lions Club. During his retirement years, he was a volunteer tutor and a member and president of the Golden K. Kiwanis Chapter in 2000-2001.

He and Frances were the parents of three sons: Michael and Ellen (Brandt) Bergman, Timothy and Kenna (Taylor) Bergman and Philip and Donna (Der) Bergman. He has four grandsons: Alex and Brandt (Michelle Kuei) and Brett and Kenny. Harold also claims foreign exchange students Bassam Mourad of Brazil and Anne (Moitry) Vacant of France as their American Field Service children. Harold is survived by siblings Marlyn, Mid, Mary Ann (Larry) Jansen, and Jim (Jan). He was preceded in death by his wife, Frances; a sister who died in infancy; brother, Bob; brothers-in-law John Bode, John DeGroot, Johnny Kalkwarf and Harold Kalkwarf; and sisters-in-law Bonnie Bergman, Eunice Kalkwarf and Dorothy Kalkwarf.

SIMPLIFY SCHOOL NIGHTS WITH EASY, CHEESY MEALS

(Family Features) Putting a delicious, kid-friendly meal on the table in an hour or less is goal No. 1 for many families. When the hectic schedules of back-to-school season are in full effect, saving some precious time in the kitchen can make all the difference.

Take a homework timeout and bring loved ones running to the dining room for family favorites like Sweet Heat Pickled Beet Grilled Cheese. This modern take on a childhood classic pairs sourdough bread with brie cheese, a spicy-sweet hit of hot honey and juicy Aunt Nellie's Diced Pickled Beets.

SWEET HEAT PICKLED BEET GRILLED CHEESE

Recipe courtesy of MacKenzie Smith of "Grilled Cheese Social"

Prep time: 5 minutes Cook time: 12 minutes Yield: 2 sandwiches

- 4 slices (3 ounces each) sourdough bread
- 2 tablespoons hot honey
- 1 small wheel (8 ounces) brie, at room temperature, cut into thin strips
- 8 ounces Aunt Nellie's Diced Pickled Beets (1/2 jar or 2 individual diced pickled beet cups)
- 2 tablespoons fresh basil, cut into thin strips
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt, or to taste

Directions

Place two bread slices on cutting board. Drizzle with hot honey then add 4 ounces brie evenly across bread

Drain beets and pat dry. Add evenly on top of brie followed by basil and remaining brie.

Spread 1 tablespoon butter on one side of remaining bread slices. Sprinkle with 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt. Place top piece of bread on each sandwich.



Heat cast-iron or frying pan over medium-low heat then add sandwiches butter sides down. Butter top sides and add remaining garlic salt.

Cook about 5 minutes on each side, or until bread is golden brown and cheese has melted, flipping halfway through.

Once sandwiches have cooked on both sides, remove from heat and serve.

Games at Drake Stadium with a personal record jump of 39'3. "Unfortunately, she only got two jumps in before she pulled her quad," says Johannes. "So, in two months of learning this event, she became National Champion and two-time All American."

With two more years of competing with Tornado Track Club, "the sky is the limit" for Bell, says Johannes.
