Making a house

Residents share their home improvement experiences

Ever think how much nicer it would be to sit in your comfy chair in the evening if only your living room weren't drab — and you didn't have orange shag carpet? Or imagine stepping into a roomy shower instead of that tiny pink bathtub like the one in Grandma's house? Or dream of a laundry room on the main floor instead of in the musty basement? Or maybe turning that basement into a family room and entertainment hub? Residents with similar dreams decided it was time to make some changes, and they share their home improvement experiences to inspire others.

Basement

When Ryan and Jolisa Davis combined their households, each brought two kids to the family. Their search for a home right before the 2022 school year lead them to a house in Waukee; however, it was only a four-bedroom home. They knew they needed a fifth bedroom and that it would have to go in the unfinished basement.

"We wanted a five-bedroom, but it's hard to find any house with five bedrooms," Ryan says.

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Their son used the couple's home office as a bedroom for more than a month while a new bedroom was being finished downstairs.

The Davises called contractor Cody Bailey Construction and Remodel. They explained their dilemma about needing a quickly finished basement.

"Cody was Johnny on the spot," says Ryan. "We needed it super quick, and it was done in 30-40 days."

As the upstairs already had new carpet, they

chose to match the basement's colors with the rest of the house.

With about 900 square feet to work with, a bedroom and bathroom were top of the list for the basement. Next, they added a game/ playroom and recreation spot for the couples' four children.

"The kids love to play video games, watch movies and sports on TV," says Ryan.

The family watches Iowa State football games. Jolisa prefers the Kansas City Chiefs, while Ryan likes the Dallas Cowboys.

After the family room was completed, they added a ping pong table.

"The game room is a great addition," says Jolisa.

To finish the look, they created a small bar area with seating close to the big-screen television set.

Ryan says the remodel was smooth and quick.

"It was a blank slate. When we moved in here, there were no walls. It was nothing. I don't think I could see it for what it might be," recalls Ryan.

Ryan and Jolisa are happy with the outcome

and surprised they stayed within their budget.

"We made all the right choices," says Ryan. "There were a lot of contractors backed up. Ours was here almost every day. They had a really good crew with super reliable workers."

Jolisa adds, "The kids love the ping pong table. This is our own chill space to hang out with the kids or to watch movies and sports."

New dock overlooks pond

When Martin Wiesley returned to Iowa from serving in the Marines and living in California, it was to care for his aging father, who moved into a care facility. When he arrived at his childhood home in Waukee, not much had changed. The home, built in 1986, was great to grow up in; however, the place needed updates, including the patio that had rotted.

The home and patio overlook a small private pond shared with neighbors. Martin wanted to capitalize on the view of the water, along with the large mature trees.

He enlisted the help of Hansen Home Renovations of West Des Moines. Owner Aaron Hansen replaced the patio a few years back. The pair then brainstormed about other

updates. Why not install an all-season dock just off the pond? Both agreed it would be a great addition, highlighting the pond.

The beach was formerly located just off the property, but it proved to be too much maintenance. Aaron installed a new dock over the former beach. The dock includes a large space with casual seating. A gazebo provides shade, while a hammock offers a relaxing vibe.

Metal sculptures throughout the back yard,

including a palm tree, are made from rusted old machinery welded together.

A few years prior, a large deck completed by Aaron was extended with a few built-in seating areas. A firepit was made with the spare wood. Martin told Aaron he likes to sit outside in the mornings, eating his breakfast. So, Aaron

"I like sitting out here. This was perfect,"

The large patio and dock are perfect for hosting parties. Martin volunteers for the

National Alliance on Mental Illness and recently hosted a fundraiser in his backyard, raising \$9,000.

"It was my first event with the new dock," he says. "It just keeps getting bigger very year."

Martin also hosts events, such as a hockey tournament on the pond, for his business,

"My father, who served in Vietnam, was a Methodist minister. He and my grandfather both instilled a service to help others," he says. "By having a large, welcoming home, I can host a positive atmosphere for people. It's a blessing to have this space for others."

Martin also assisted with the renovations.

"It was one reason I chose Aaron because I was able to help with the renovations. I did the grunt work whenever I could help out," he says.

He says Aaron was incredible with his vision.

"He was extremely willing to work with me. He was honest if he couldn't do something," he says. "But, now that I think of it, he was able to do everything."

Besides providing a space for entertaining, Martin likes his backyard oasis.

"It's relaxing to sit here. I like the tranquility."

He is already thinking of his next project, which involves a playful space.

"I always wanted to build a tree fort. It's been a childhood dream of mine — even at this age," he reflects.

Self-taught homeowner

Early on as a homeowner, Larrey Bankole wanted to save money on home repairs and remodeling. He worked construction while attending college for an aviation degree, so he had some experience.

However, when it came to home repairs he wasn't experienced doing, he consulted the Internet.

"I learned how to do repairs and went to YouTube college," he laughs. "I watched for 10 hours how to tile a floor."

His first remodel was a red kitchen with patterned wallpaper that needed updates. Prior to the remodel, everything was demolished.

"There was nothing left," Larrey says. "It was a blank kitchen. It was hideous."

He pondered what to do with a door that had a 4-foot drop to the garage.

"We decided to close the door and refinish the walls," he says.

He put in a new ceiling and walls. However, the design was done by his wife, Megan.

"Ladies have better taste. She picked out all the stuff and the design work," he recalls.

When finished, they were ready to move in,

Since then, they have made various renovations to their homes. Larrey says he tries to do work himself, not only to save money but save time. This summer, he intended to install a putting green in his back yard in Waukee.

"They put us on a six-month waiting list,"

"I'm not an expert," says Larrey. "I try to do most of the stuff myself. There's a sense of pride when you do it by yourself." ■

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THIS MEDICARE step could save you money

Whether this is your first year on Medicare or you've been on it for several years, you should look at your plan each year.

Revisiting your coverage and supplements could save you money and prevent surprises when you visit the doctor or pick up a prescription.

The Medicare Annual Enrollment Period runs from Oct. 15 to Dec. 7. That's when you can join, drop or switch to another supplement plan or add or drop drug coverage.

I know what you might think: "I like my current coverage; no change needed." That may be true. But each insurance carrier frequently renegotiates provider contracts, which can ultimately change the terms of your supplement plans — impacting premiums, copays, deductibles and covered services plus the ancillary benefits like x-rays, prosthetic devices and physical therapy. Carriers can add and drop benefits like gym memberships, chiropractic visits, and meal deliveries to and from plans. That's why it's a good idea to review your providers, your prescriptions and your pharmacy each year to ensure your preferences

Some of the most heartbreaking stories I've heard are when someone



goes to the pharmacy to pick up medication and finds out it's no longer covered or has changed. That's when out-of-pocket costs can skyrocket, and the medicine can cost hundreds more than the last time they went to the pharmacy.

During the annual enrollment period last year, I ran the numbers for one of the individuals we work with and found that Meloxicam, an arthritis medicine, costs \$12 for a 90-day refill at their in-network pharmacy and \$1,117.80 at one that was not in-network. That is not the kind of surprise you want to get when you go to pick up your medicine and the reason I run the numbers for them before making any changes.

You can switch to an Advantage Plan from a traditional Medigap supplement (like Plan F or Plan G) during annual enrollment. You can also move from one Advantage Plan to another or from one prescription drug plan to another.

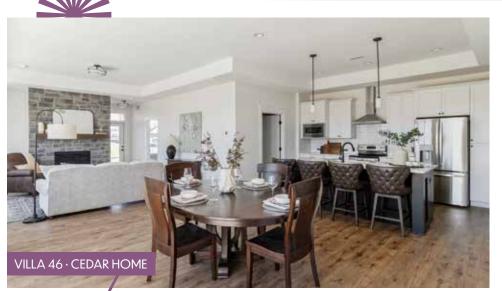

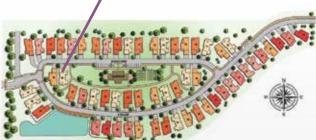

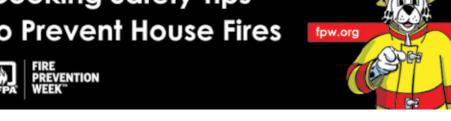

Cooking Safety Tips to Prevent House Fires



Did you know that cooking fires are the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries? That's why this year's theme for Fire Prevention Week is "Cooking Safety Starts with You. Pay Attention to Fire Safety."

This daily activity comes with potential fire danger, but you can take simple steps to prevent a fire – and the burns or home damage that comes with it.

- Never leave pots or pans unattended on the stove. Leaving the kitchen makes it easy to get distracted and forget to come back.
- Turn pot handles toward the back of the stove, so they don't hang over the edge where you could easily bump them.
- Use a timer to remind yourself that you're cooking. Make sure it's loud enough to be heard in other rooms if you're baking or roasting for a long period of time.

If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire:

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled. Don't put water on the grease fire!
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 from outside the home.

Outdoor Tips for Summer's End

Reduce or Turn Off Sprinklers: Save water and money by reducing run days and length or turning off your sprinklers for the season.

Store Portable Irrigation Meters: Take your portable meters inside for the winter and report your final meter reading at Waukee.org/UtilityBilling.



Empty Your Pool or Hot Tub with Care: Chlorine and other chemicals used to keep your pool or spa clean cause BIG problems for fish and other aquatic life. As you prepare to drain your pool or hot tub/spa, allow the pool or spa to sit for at least 7 days without adding chlorine or other chemicals; the chlorine content should be 0.1 milligrams per liter. Ensure the pH of the pool or spa water is between 7 and 8. Drain water through at least 15 feet of a grassy landscape first (i.e., not directly onto concrete) to allow remaining chemicals to dissipate before reaching the storm drain. Keep the flow of water low (aim for 700 gallons per hour = about 12 gallons per minute) to prevent erosion or damage to landscaping. If you have a saltwater pool, discharge water into the sanitary sewer, so the water can be treated.

Safely Dispose of Unneeded Prescription Drugs on Saturday, Oct. 28

Prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding your home of potentially dangerous prescription drugs that you no longer need. For National Prescription Drug Take Back Day, police officers will collect pills and patches on Saturday, October 28 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Waukee Public Safety Building (1300 SE L.A. Grant Parkway).

Funding is currently available through the Dallas County Local Housing Trust Fund (DCLHTF) to help low-income residents complete house repairs and fix code violations. Dallas County residents in single-family houses who meet certain income thresholds can apply now for a 5-year forgivable loan for eligible repairs, such as basic structural repairs, building systems, weatherization and handicap accessibility.

This assistance is only available for the applicant's primary residence. Mobile homes, homes being bought on contract, duplexes or rental units are not eligible. For more information, call 515-273-0770 or visit https://www.wdm.iowa.gov/housing.

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A SPACE for school

Vowles family chooses home with bright, central space for homeschooling.

When Amy and Brett Vowles' oldest daughter was 18 months old, they decided they wanted to homeschool her. At the same time, they were looking for a new home. The biggest must-have was a space on the main floor that could be a dedicated home school.

"If the ground floor didn't have a space for that, it just wasn't a house that we were interested in," says Amy Vowles.

The couple decided on a home with a formal dining room located right off the entryway and next to the kitchen. The central location, combined with ample natural light, creates a perfect space for learning.

"For me, it's my favorite room in the house," says Amy. "The way the sun comes in, it's always bright and cheery in there. Everybody is kind of together, but it's still a secluded place where we can go and also where we can make messes and not have it spill over into the whole rest of the house."

Nowadays, the Vowles homeschool two of their three kids. They participate in a home school co-op through West Des Moines Community Schools. They typically

spend one full day a week there with the rest of their learning done at home. Each day looks a little different for the family, but most days consist of running through each subject.

"We always start the day with math for both of them," Vowles says. "Just because we know, if we wait till the end of the day to try to start math, it doesn't go very well for any of us."

One of the biggest challenges of living and learning in the same space is potential distractions in the home. However, having designated times and space for school helps to create a productive learning environment, she says.

"There's not really much else that we do in that space," said Vowles. "So, the kids kind of know to focus a little bit more when we're in there."

When looking for a space to homeschool kids, Vowles recommends finding a space that flows with the rest of the house.

"It's right here in the mix of everything," she says. "I can even be doing other things while the kids are working, and I can pop in and check on them. If we had a home school space, say in the basement, or totally separate from the living space somehow, I don't think that would work as well for us."

Using their home for schooling offers a lot of freedom and flexibility

for the family, she says. Keeping their kids at home means they can flex and alternate their schedules.

"Because we are on our own schedule, we can take a week off and travel and then come back and get to school," Vowles says. "And even just flexibility throughout our week. So, if there are fun things we want to go do during the week, we can take a break during the daytime and do that and then schedule our school hours around that.

"I feel like there's been a lot of positive memories," she adds. "Just being able to spend the extra time together at home — we wouldn't get to do that as much if the kids were in school."

- · 8 ounces cavatappi pasta
- 1 teaspoon salt, plus additional for salting pasta water, to taste
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 block (8 ounces) cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup raw pecan pieces
- 15 ounces part-skim ricotta cheese
- · 4 tablespoons sour cream
- 1/4 teaspoon ground pepper
- 1 large egg, lightly beaten

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven to 375 F.
- Cook cavatappi in salted boiling water. Drain, reserving 1/2 cup pasta cooking water. Return pasta to pot and stir in butter.
- · Using box grater, shred cheddar cheese.
- · Using food processor, combine 1/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese with pecans. Process to coarse breadcrumb consistency.
- Add remaining cheddar cheese, ricotta, sour cream, 1 teaspoon salt and pepper to warm pasta. Stir until thoroughly combined. Add egg; stir. Add 2-4 tablespoons reserved pasta water to loosen mixture; stir until smooth.
- · Pour into buttered 9-inch square or round casserole dish and top evenly with pecan topping.
- Bake 30 minutes.

Substitutions: Use pre-shredded cheese in place of cheddar cheese block. Use pasta of choice in place of cavatappi.

Superfood Pecan Energy Bars

Cook time: 40 minutes Servings: 14

- 15 Medjool dates (9 ounces)
- 1 cup pecan pieces
- 1/2 cup gluten-free oats
- 1 tablespoon chia seeds
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt

DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven to 200 F.
- In food processor, process or pulse dates until chopped
 - and rough texture forms. Add pecan pieces, oats, chia seeds, vanilla extract, cinnamon and kosher salt; process about 1 minute until crumbly dough forms.
- Line baking sheet or jelly roll pan with parchment paper. Dump dough into center of parchment paper and use rolling pin to roll into 6-by-10 1/2-inch rectangle. Cut dough into 14 bars about 1 1/2-by-3 inches or into desired shapes.
- Bake bars 30 minutes. Cool bars to room temperature then refrigerate in sealed container between sheets of wax paper.

INHERITANCE tax and estate planning

Are you worried about your family paying extra taxes when you die? There is some good estate planning.

news that can affect your Every estate is liable for a few different kinds

of tax. Whether it is

federal estate taxes, income taxes, inheritance tax or capital gains tax, your heirs may be writing checks to the government. Iowa is one of six states that still implements inheritance tax. But that is changing as Iowa phases out its inheritance tax law.

In general, inheritance isn't taxed as income; you won't pay income tax on a bequest. But when you inherit money or property from someone, you potentially owe tax to the state of Iowa. Inheritance tax is owed on all assets

passing to an individual. Some beneficiaries are exempt: a spouse, children, stepchildren, grandchildren and parents all have a 100% exemption from inheritance tax.

Other beneficiaries have no exemption. Siblings, sons- or daughters-in-law, nieces and nephews, and friends all owe inheritance tax. The tax rate can be as much as 15%. For this reason, some clients avoid leaving money to a family member because of the tax implications.

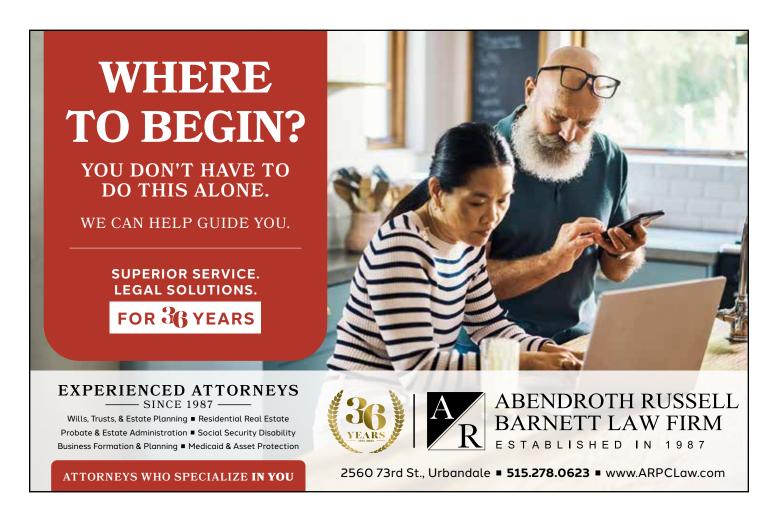
New legislation changes this by phasing out the inheritance tax. For deaths occurring in 2021, the tax rate is reduced by 20%. The rate will continue to be reduced by 20% each subsequent year until Jan. 1, 2025 when the exclusion will be 100%. No inheritance tax will be owed for individuals dying after Jan. 1, 2025, regardless of the relationship of the beneficiary.

This change to the law presents an estate-

planning opportunity for many clients. Clients can include a sibling or beloved son-in-law or daughter-in-law in their will or trust without worrying that the State of Iowa will take some of the inheritance. Nieces and nephews are now viable beneficiaries, without the risk of having tax imposed.

Your legacy to your loved ones can now be more inclusive. Many clients are now looking at their options for revising and updating their estate planning documents. If you have a last will and testament or a revocable trust and would like to include new beneficiaries, make sure that you contact an attorney who specializes in estate planning and who understands the new tax laws. ■

Michael Schrodt is passionate about serving his community of Waukee. One way he does that is by serving a monthly meal called The Table.



The Table is available for anyone who wants a free meal and is held at the Waukee United Methodist Church at 2075 S.E. LA Grant Parkway.

Schrodt has been a member of the church since 2008. As he served in various leadership roles, he approached the church in 2017 with a new idea to support the hungry.

"We discussed how the image in the Waukee community is that it's affluent," he explains. "But there is a pocket of need in the community. Nobody will come and say they need help. So, we wanted to step up and take action."

He took his proposal to the church council, which praised his efforts. The congregation chipped in and raised enough seed money to start the project.

Since 2017 — with time off for the COVID pandemic — volunteers have made and served a home-cooked meal, available for anyone, on the last Monday of the month. Children are welcome, and an activity is available for them.

Volunteers sign up, offering to help cook, serve and host each month. Lauren Kratz, a volunteer, says their mission is to simply serve the meal and provide fellowship.

"It's not a recruiting effort for the Methodist Church," she says. Schrodt says the meals are open to anyone who wants to share in the blessings.

"We're not here to judge. I'm not here to break into a discussion about religion. We're here to give a good meal, conversation and fellowship."

Schrodt says he feels blessed to help out.

"I recognize, in my life, I don't have as much need as others. It's important to serve and help your fellow man."

Attendance varies, with about 30 people each month.

"If we serve one or 100, it's completely worth it," says Schrodt.

Organizers would like to partner with other churches or service organizations to provide a meal every Monday at their church.

"This is a call for community. We know there's a tremendous need to fulfill," says Schrodt.

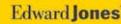

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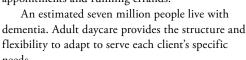

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HEALTH By Dr. Jason Brown **KEEPING** teeth healthy

As they say in golf, "give me a mulligan on that hole" - mulligan referring to a do-over or second chance because the first shot wasn't a good one. Baby teeth are considered mulligan teeth by some because we lose these teeth to make room for our permanent ones later in childhood. These baby teeth are, in fact, important in keeping the shape of our jaw bone and holding space for our permanent teeth to take their place. They also allow us to chew our food and function normally as we grow into adolescence.



Promoting healthy eating and hygiene habits should be instilled in our children as they grow up. This will show the importance of choosing the right foods to eat and how effective and often to brush our teeth to keep them as healthy as can be. A balanced diet is key — eating fruits, vegetables, grains, dairy and protein throughout the day. Minimize or eliminate empty calories such as candy or sugar-containing foods. Group acidic foods such as tomatoes with a meal. Limit snacking between meal times.

Brushing with a fluoridated toothpaste twice and flossing once daily is ideal for reducing risk of tooth decay. Brush in a circular motion at a 45-degree angle towards the gums to sweep bacteria out of the gum pockets. Flossing can be accomplished with traditional hand floss, Flosspiks, proxy brushes or Waterpiks. Lastly, always maintain at least six month routine visits to your dentist.

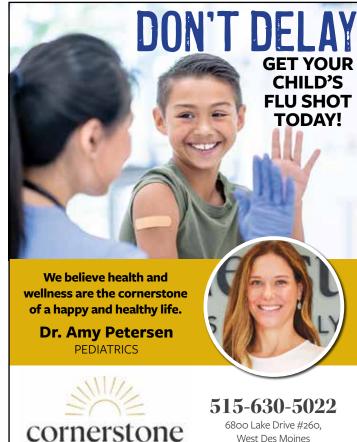

WAYS to help your kids open up more

School is starting, and kids' schedules are about to get more hectic. So, now is the time to talk with your kids and check in with them about how their days are going. This can be as simple as using open-ended questions about their day to get the information you are looking for. Instead of asking, "How was your day?" and getting the blah answer of, "Fine," ask questions that require more thought. For example, "What was the best part of science today?" "Who



did you sit at lunch with today?" "What was the funniest thing you heard today?" This way, the answers are more than one word and give you something to continue the conversation. When they answer who they sat with, add on to that conversation with, "Who had the best lunch? What was in it?" or "Where was ____ today?" This way, the conversation is continuing with your child without the child being pressured with the same questions every day.

Another line of questioning that can wrap around the child is asking, "What would you have changed about today if you could change anything?" Depending on the answer, it opens up a lot of different conversations with your child that have more than a standard "Fine" answer.

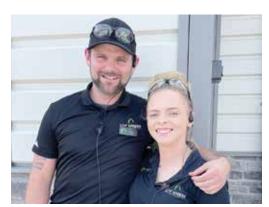
