

RIVER TO RIVER RETRO ROAD TRIP VISITS ADEL HISTORIC MUSEUM

The River to River Retro Road Trip, which starts in Davenport and ends in Council Bluffs, following Historic U.S. Route 6 across the state of Iowa, made a stop in Adel. This year's trip, held Sept. 14-17, included about 40 cars with drivers and some passengers. They do not travel on interstate highways and do not stop at chain restaurants, just at mom-and-pop places along two-lane blacktop.

One of their stops this year was at Adel's Historic Museum Saturday morning to tour the two-story building and the Clarke-Kinnick addition. The Museum found it had a copy of a booklet of a previous River to River Retro Road Trip from 1910, surprising Trip organizers Casey McCallister and Vince Wallerich. While the visitors enjoyed tours of the museum, area residents could view the many antique cars parked

old car guys. The old guys yearn for the days when engines were simple and a car could be worked on without hooking up a computer to it to explain what is wrong. The young guys love the technology and seem to crave for more. I just want my car to run properly, but we must all admit that we have become accustomed to the modern "power" gadgets we now take for granted.

Power steering. Power brakes. Power windows. Power locks. Those are givens today.

So are automatic transmissions, all-wheel drive, cruise control,



back-up cameras and Bluetooth connections.

Then there are the truly amazing features like adaptive cruise control, parking assist, headup displays, driver drowsiness detection, gesture and voice controls, autonomous driving, blind spot warnings, heat and massage functions and ambient lighting. If you don't know what these are, you will soon, along with many more.

Just expect to continually replace more of those \$100 sensor things.

2023 MADISON COUNTY COVERED BRIDGE FESTIVAL

Oct. 14-15, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Madison County Covered Bridge Festival features family fun, including parade and tours of the namesake bridges. Vendors, demonstrations, kids zone, live entertainment, car show, quilt show, Madison County Historical Complex tours, and much more are sure to please crowds. Festival admission is \$3 or two for \$5 and free for children younger than 11.

The craft booths display hand-made goods made by local artists: pottery, quilts, doll clothes, paintings, drawings, photographs, jewelry, woodcrafts, fiber arts and more. Organizers are expecting 150 vendors and demonstrators.

Most booths, as well as the food, live music and entertainment, will be at the Madison County Courthouse Square in Winterset with about 20 vendors inside the Winterset Livery.

Demonstrations and old-time activities include

antique tractor rides, a Civil War fashion show, sheepshearing, wool spinning, a corn box for kids to play in and marble shooting.

Passport to the Past activities offered at the Madison County Historical Complex at 915 S. Second Ave. will include penny candy sales, horse and wagon rides, old-fashioned school lessons, a Civil War reenactment, blacksmith demonstrations and more.

Visitors can also enjoy an old-fashioned spelling bee and an antique car show Sunday only off the square.

A festival highlight is the annual Antique Vehicle and Covered Bridge Festival Parade, which begins at the high school at 3 p.m. on Sunday and heads north on Eighth Avenue until turning east on Court and continuing to the other side of town on Court and Washington streets.

For the kids, the event boasts inflatables and a carnival. A face painter will be available on E. Court Street with free face painting from 9 a.m. to noon on both Saturday and Sunday.

Enjoy one of the bus tours of the bridges offered by the Winterset Rotary Club Saturday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Sunday from 10 a.m. to noon. The price is \$15 per person, and the tour is approximately two hours long. With a knowledgeable guide full of covered bridge history and lore, you'll visit the Roseman, Hogback and Cutler-Donahoe bridges and the North River Schoolhouse.

Tickets for the tours can be purchased at the Rotary booth on the festival grounds, near The Cellar coffee shop on First Avenue. Tours depart from First Avenue and Washington Street, near the George Stout public art project. It's a great way to see the bridges without navigating festival traffic and gravel roads.

Directions:

Heat oven to 350 F. Melt butter and set aside. Cut entire pack of rolls in half horizontally, keeping all top and bottom halves intact.

In 9-by-13-inch pan, place bottom halves of rolls and cover with ham and cheese.



Cover ham and cheese stacks with top halves of rolls. Drizzle butter mixture over tops of rolls. Bake, uncovered, 15-20 minutes. Separate rolls for serving.
