

"After my wife and I married, we bought season tickets to football games with her family. My die-hard fandom grew organically from there," he says.


Once Justin and Stephanie started having

mine," he says.

Justin also has multiple fond memories related to the Iowa State University Cyclones.







Cyclones, Cardinals and Leicester City

Jared Leeper says he has been an Iowa State fan as long as he can remember, which may not be surprising since he grew up so close to Ames.

"Growing up in Nevada, just 10 miles away from Iowa State University in Ames, I went to several games at ISU as a kid. I'm 35 now, so I've been a huge ISU fan nearly all 35 years," he says.

ASSESSING life insurance needs

Short-term needs: Which funds will need to be available for final expenses? These may include the costs of a funeral, final medical bills, and any outstanding debts, such as credit cards or personal loans. How much to make available for short-term needs will depend on your individual situation.

Long-term needs: How much will it cost to maintain your family's standard of living? How much is spent on necessities, like housing, food and clothing? Also, consider factoring in expenses, such as travel and entertainment. Ask yourself, "What would it cost per year to maintain this current lifestyle?"

New obligations: What additional expenses may arise in the future? What family considerations will need to be addressed, especially if there are young children? Will aging parents need some kind of support? How about college costs? Factoring in potential new obligations allows for a more accurate picture of ongoing financial needs.

BEUKEMA among FFA Leadership Scholars

DMACC announced its 2023-24 class of Mark Pearson FFA Leadership Scholars, which includes a total 24 outstanding students from across Iowa. The group features 13 firstyear students and 11 returning students, with each attending DMACC on a full-tuition scholarship during the 2023-24 academic year through the competitive scholarship program. Among the returning students is Valerie Beukema of Bondurant, veterinary technology.

The Mark Pearson FFA Leadership Scholars Program has awarded nearly \$2.4 million in fulltuition scholarships to qualifying DMACC students since its

founding prior to the 2016-2017 academic year at the College. The scholarship program was established in honor of beloved ag broadcaster Mark Pearson, who passed away suddenly in 2012 at the age of 54.

"Some of the greatest leaders in Iowa, across a variety of career fields, have an FFA background," said DMACC President Rob Denson. "DMACC is proud to play a role in helping the next generation of leaders prepare themselves for their careers, and we are honored to continue sharing Mark's legacy and passion for his profession with today's students."

Each year, up to 15 eligible, first-year students at DMACC are awarded a Mark Pearson FFA Leadership scholarship, including one student from each of Iowa's six FFA districts. The scholarship recipients can enroll in any degree program at DMACC, and the scholarship will pay for the completion of their degree. After completing their first year at DMACC, Mark Pearson FFA Leadership scholars are then eligible to maintain their scholarship for a second year.

To qualify for the competitive Mark Pearson FFA Leadership Scholars Program, students must 1) serve as president of their FFA chapter during either their junior or senior of high school; 2) apply for the program during their senior high school; and 3) commit to attending DMACC the fall following their high school graduation. MEDICARE open enrollment

It is open enrollment season. It is the time of year to ensure you or your loved one are signed up to receive Medicare benefits. If you are 65-plus and enrolled in Original Medicare (not an Advantage/ replacement/Part C plan), your plan will renew automatically. If you are just turning 65, you can sign up for Medicare benefits as early as three months before your 65th birthday and as late as three months after. To sign up, contact Social



Security either online or via phone. Open enrollment runs from Oct. 15 through Dec. 7 each year.

Medicare is federal health insurance for people 65 and older, as well as some younger people with disabilities, or people with end-stage renal disease. There are two coverage options: Original Medicare and a Medicare Advantage plan. In Original Medicare, there are three major parts,: parts A, B and D.

Per Medicare.gov, Part A Medicare coverage covers inpatient hospital stays, care in a skilled nursing facility, hospice care and some home health care. Part B covers certain doctors' services, outpatient care, medical supplies and preventive services. Part D helps cover the cost of prescription drugs (including many recommended shots or vaccines). As with most insurance, you will still pay a deductible with Original

Medicare, and it does not cover all health care services costs. Obtaining a Medicare Supplement Insurance or "Medigap" policy can help cover services that Original Medicare does not cover.

Medicare Advantage plans are Medicare approved plans from a private insurance company. These alternative plans offer coverage for health and drug coverage. These plans have contracts with Medicare and must follow Medicare guidelines, and they must notify you if there are any changes to your coverage before the next enrollment year.

There are advantages and disadvantages to both Original Medicare and Medicare Advantage plans. Medicare Advantage may have benefits such as vision, hearing and dental services that Original Medicare does not cover. However, you can only use doctors and other providers who are in the Advantage plan's network. With Original Medicare, you can go to any doctor or hospital in the U.S. that takes Medicare. In most cases, with Original Medicare, you do not need a referral to see a specialist and do not need preauthorization for skilled care. With an Advantage plan, you may need a referral to see a specialist and a preauthorization for skilled care.

Only you know which coverage is right for you. Do your research, and don't forget to sign up for coverage.

NOTE any changes in floaters

Oh squiggly line in my eye fluid. I see you lurking there on the periphery of my vision. But when I try to look at you, you scurry away. Are you shy, squiggly line? Why only when I ignore you, do you return to the center of my eye? Oh, squiggly line, it's alright, you are forgiven. -Stewie (Family Guy)



Don't worry, squiggly lines aren't a bad thing by themselves. They aren't ghosts or worms. They're floaters. We all have them but some of us don't notice them because our brains are very good at tuning out the "noise" in our vision. Floaters are most similar to bubbles and cracks in jello. As long as they don't change, we don't worry about them. But if they change in size or number, it means something shifted in the back of the eye and could be a sign the retina shifted. We don't like retinas shifting as we call it a retinal detachment, and it can cause blindness.

So, if your floaters start changing or start being accompanied by flashes (lightning bolts or camera flash but only in one eye), then you should see an eye doctor right away. ■

Have you experienced bad breath? Have you thought, "Oh, man, I need to brush my teeth to get rid of this bad breath." Or "Does anyone have a mint or gum?" Have you ever thought about what causes bad breath? Bad breath, also known as halitosis, can come from food and drinks, poor dental hygiene, tobacco use, medical conditions or the tongue. The tongue has a rough surface with peaks and grooves, the perfect place for bacteria to settle and live. The bacteria on your tongue, when not brushed daily, can be a cause of bad breath. After brushing and flossing, brush your tongue with your toothbrush and a small amount of toothpaste. Using a toothbrush or a tongue scraper, move the brush from the back of your tongue to the front, rinse the brush, and repeat four to five times. Next time you notice the coffee breath or the bad morning breath, try brushing your tongue.



HEALTH By Elijah Evans

EMOTIONAL validation makes or breaks relationships

Emotional validation is a critical skill for healthy relationships. To validate someone's emotions is to communicate the understandability or reasonableness of their feelings. This is not the same as agreeing with the person's stance, and, in fact, this skill becomes all the more important when the feelings of the person you are acknowledging are different from your own. For example, I find coffee disgusting, but, for all the coffee lovers out there, I respect that, to you, it is an



invigorating brew in which you find genuine satisfaction. The alternatives to validation include the assertion of one's own perspective (e.g. coffee is gross) or attempts to change a person's feelings (e.g. arguing tea is the superior hot, bitter beverage). These alternatives become problematic when responding to the emotions of others because they imply there is something wrong with the way they feel, since you are either unwilling to relate to their feelings or suggesting they should be different. Instead, practicing validation communicates empathy and respect for differences, which are crucial for navigating conflict. While the coffee example is a mundane way to demonstrate validation, one can easily imagine an emotionally charged interaction in which one person expresses an important feeling, and validation is the only thing that would make them feel seen and cared for.

'I DON'T want to talk about that'

I have had the privilege of meeting with more than 100 families in the last few months. Many of them are pre-planning for their future burial needs. I have found that families are either grateful that conversations were

This conversation can avoid burdens in the future when grief and loss are already heavy enough.

I grew up on an acreage two miles outside of a small town in rural northwest Iowa. There was an old barn on the property that hadn't been used in years. The building was so old it was starting to fall apart and was dangerous to go in. My dad decided it was time to just tear it down. We bashed in the sides of the building as best as we could, and then, early one morning, we set it on fire. Our house was



close enough to the highway that people driving by could see there was a big fire. Our house was far enough away from the highway that people driving by couldn't see that it was just an old barn being burned up and that we were standing right by it. Some passers-by stopped at the local Casey's and called the fire department thinking it was a house on fire. The combination of overzealous volunteer firefighters and the scarcity of fires around our little town created a great deal of enthusiasm for the few actual fire calls they received. We could hear the sirens blaring as every single piece of fire equipment that the town owned barreled down the dusty gravel road toward our house. My dad wasn't particularly excited about all the attention, especially when living in a small town means everyone knows everyone.

In our case, it was a false alarm. However, it was nice to see that someone driving by cared enough to call in what they thought was a true emergency. It was also nice to see a group of people willing to drop everything and put themselves at risk by jumping in a fire truck and rushing off to save someone else.

Proverbs 18:24 says, "One who has unreliable friends soon comes to ruin, but there is a friend who sticks closer than a brother. "

There were people driving close enough to our farm to see there was a fire, and they cared enough not to just ignore it, but to call 911. Do you have friends driving close enough to you who would see a fire in your life? Would those friends be willing to take action to try to put out the fire?

It's easy to have friends who are close enough to do fun things with but still distant enough to not see a potential fire in your life. Having friends this close means being open and transparent, which isn't always comfortable. If you are fortunate enough to have such a friend, and if they come asking questions about a potential fire in your life, consider yourself blessed and thank them. ■
