## WHAT DEFINES CLASSIC ROCK?

I asked my Amazon Alexa device to play music of the classic rock genre for me, and her first three songs were from The Rolling Stones, Blue Oyster Cult and David Bowie. The next three were from Creedence Clearwater Revival, Looking Glass and Aerosmith. I knew every song by title and artist. Many of you likely would, too.

But what really defines classic rock? The Guardian published a great article on the subject in 2020, asking if it is "a sound, an era, or just any old track with guitars on it," noting how the genre continues to be "a slippery one to define."

The article asked, is classic rock is linked to popularity or a certain era? Is it a genre in itself, or, as time plods on, has classic rock merely come to be defined as any old track with guitars on it? They added qualifications like being "guitar-led," being "intrinsically linked with the adolescence of boomers," "an

amalgamation
of the anthems
of one's
adolescence," and
even "marketing
as a means of
repackaging music
that is no longer deemed to be
directly relevant by those of a
younger generation." Ouch.

For a more local angle, I asked a friend who knows the subject better than anyone I know: the man who introduced me to classic rock in the early 1990s as co-host of the KGGO morning show "Lou & Larry," Lou Sipolt.

Lou told me, "Classic rock is the good stuff from the mid-1960s, 1970s and 1980s, in my mind. Artists who established themselves during that time period are also grandfathered in to having newer material considered from a classic rocker as well. Once the artists earn the title, they should always be able to wear that badge proudly."

Fair enough.

Best-selling writer Charles Cross told American Songwriter that nostalgia born from one's youth also plays a major force in classic rock's popularity, and I agree.

"If we looked at the charts [today], there isn't a rock act in the top 50," Cross said. "So, rock is not the dominant genre in music and has not been for some time... Rock itself indeed is dead as a commercial genre, in terms of recorded record sales. But in terms of radio, rock radio is still a very successful format."

And thank goodness for that. And Alexa. And Lou. Rock on. Have a great week, and thanks

for reading.

## **ADEL'S EARLY ORDINANCES**

Adel had some interesting ordinances on its books in the early days. A peace and quiet ordinance prohibited disturbing the quiet of any neighborhood, private family or person within the town by giving false alarms of fire; by loud or unusual noise; by ringing bells, blowing horns, or other instruments; by indecent, obscene or profane language, conversation or conduct; or by threatening, quarreling, assaulting, fighting or by any other device or means whatever. Such persons shall be subject to a fine and imprisonment.

A curfew ordinance, Ordinance No. 67, prohibited anyone younger than the age of 17 from being abroad upon the streets, alleys or public grounds between the hours of 9 p.m. and 4 a.m., but there were a few exceptions.

Ordinance No. 22 directed that all able-bodied male residents shall annually perform two days labor of eight hours each upon the streets, alleys, highways or public grounds. If you were too busy or felt that

such labor was beneath your dignity, you could pay \$1.50 per day for an exemption.

Gaming instruments were not in favor in early Adel. Any official of the town could seize any instrument, device or thing used for the purpose of gaming or by, on or with which money or other articles of value may be lost or won. This was according to Ordinance No. 17.

Sunday sales were prohibited by Ordinance No. 19. However, it shall be lawful for druggists to sell medicines at all times and dealers in milk, ice and meat could sell these articles before 10 o'clock in the morning and after 3 o'clock in the evening.

Speeding was also prohibited.

"Any person who shall ride or drive any horse or animal immediately or shall drive any horse or other animal attached to any carriage or vehicle of any description in or upon any street, alley or public ground within the town in such a careless manner or at such a rate of speed as to endanger life, limb or property shall be subject to a fine or

imprisonment."

Another ordinance prohibited kites, hoops and firecrackers. "Any person who shall fly any kites or roll any hoops on any street, alley or avenue devoted to business or cause or aid in causing firecrackers, torpedoes or other explosive things to be fired, exploded or thrown upon the public street, alley or grounds or upon any private grounds without permission of the owner, agent or occupant or shall participate in any sport or exercise likely to scare horses, injure passengers or embarrass the passage of passengers or vehicles on the streets shall be subject to a fine or imprisonment."

This last one is a bit of a head-scratcher. One can only imagine what circumstances brought it about. "Every person who shall bathe when naked or insufficiently clothed in the mill race or slough or Raccoon River in view of any house, shop, bridge or frequented street, road or railroad between sunrise and one hour after sunset shall be subject to fine or imprisonment."



- Red, green or blue glitter

#### **Directions:**

Remove lids from jars. Using hot glue gun, glue foam cube to inside of lids then glue figurines to foam cubes.

Place 1 tablespoon glycerin in jars then fill with water.
Sprinkle glitter in jars.

Seal jars by placing lids over mouths of jars and screwing rings onto lids. Flip jars over so figurines are right side up. Shake for snow globe effect.

- 1 3/4 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda





- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- crushed walnuts
- crushed pecans
- white chocolate chips
- · holiday-themed bow

#### **Directions:**

In jar, layer granulated sugar and brown sugar. In bowl, mix flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt; add to jar on top of brown sugar. Then layer crushed walnuts, crushed pecans and white chocolate chips.

Seal jar. Wrap top of jar, just below lid, with holiday-themed bow.

# RING IN THE HOLIDAYS WITH REGIONALLY INSPIRED RECIPES

(*Family Features*) When Thanksgiving hosts and their guests ponder must-have desserts, one of the most common favorites is an oh-so-delicious pie. More specifically, with nearly endless possibilities and its familiar festive flavor, pecan pie is one of America's most beloved holiday treats.

From nods to the Northeast's love of maple to celebrating sweet tastes of the West Coast with a citrus twist, the American Pecan Promotion Board is celebrating regionally inspired recipes. While the classic pecan pie is a hit at the Thanksgiving table, you can make it a perfect palette for creativity this year by enjoying local flavors that take the festivities up a notch.

#### **BOURBON BACON PECAN PIE**

Recipe courtesy of Emily Caruso of "Jelly Toast" on behalf of the American Pecan Promotion Board

Prep time: 20 minutes Cook time: 70 minutes Servings: 10

- 1 pie dough (9 inches)
- 4 strips thick-cut bacon
- 1/2 cup dark corn syrup
- 1/2 cup light corn syrup
- 1 cup light brown sugar
- · 2 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
- 2 tablespoons bourbon
- 3 large eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 1/2 cups raw pecan halves

#### **Directions:**

Place baking sheet in oven. Preheat oven to 350 F. Gently line pie pan with rolled out pie dough. Press into edges and up sides. Use fingers or fork to create decorative edge. Set aside.

In skillet, fry bacon until crisp. Remove from pan and drain on paper towels then chop into small pieces and set aside. Reserve 1/4 cup bacon grease.

In large bowl, whisk dark corn syrup, light corn syrup, brown sugar, reserved bacon grease, butter and bourbon. Add eggs and salt; whisk until



mixture is even. Fold in pecan halves and chopped bacon.

Pour mixture into pie crust and spread evenly with spatula. Gently cover edges of pie crust with aluminum foil. Place pie on preheated baking sheet and bake 60-70 minutes, or until pie is set in center.

Remove pie from oven and cool completely before serving or chilling.

**Notes:** Pie can be made 1 day ahead and refrigerated overnight. Allow pie to come to room temperature before serving.
