

So, we buy charging bricks for smart phones separately, and we hopefully realize this before we have the units at home so we don't have to make separate trips to the store. But if you do have to make another trip, at least you can do a load of laundry while you are gone. Maybe.

The Johnston Partnership provides food and personal hygiene products to those in need. Current needs going into the holidays are baby wipes, lotion, toothpaste, toothbrushes and toilet paper. Yeager started his career in the City of Dallas Center and joined the Johnston Police Department in 2015.

During Lt. 

CHOCOLATE CHERRY PECAN SNACK MIX


Prep time: 5 minutes Cook time: 20 minutes Servings: 20

- 1 large egg white
- 1/4 cup light brown sugar
- 1 1/2 tablespoons unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1 1/2 cups pecan halves
- 1 cup dried tart cherries
- 1 cup small pretzels
- 3/4 cup yogurt-covered raisins

Directions:

Heat oven to 325 F.

In bowl, whisk egg white, brown sugar, cocoa powder, vanilla extract and salt until well blended. Add water to thin mixture slightly. Fold in pecan halves until well coated. Spread mixture onto parchment-lined baking



sheet.

Bake 15-20 minutes, or until mixture is well set. Stir mixture several times during baking. Allow pecans to cool completely and transfer to bowl. Mix in dried cherries, pretzels and raisins.
