RABBIT EARS

You likely had some version of a dipole antenna on a television set at one point or another. These, of course, were the days before cable TV or streaming. One had to patiently position the antenna to get just the right angle to pick up a local station. Some would touch it to a metal object or add tinfoil for additional strength. By today's standards, that seems ridiculous. Antennas have come a long way.

According to antenna-theory.com, the first experiments that involved the coupling of electricity and magnetism were by English scientist Michael Faraday in the 1830s. The site says he slid a magnet around the coils of a wire attached to a galvanometer, creating a timevarying magnetic field. The coil acted as a loop antenna and received the electromagnetic radiation, which was detected by the galvanometer. Makes perfect sense, right?

All I know is that we had a big antenna on top of my childhood home to get the four or five channels that were available. Windstorms

that antenna, and
it eventually came
down, about the
time that cable TV
became mainstream.



I also recall those long CB radio whip antennas that were on many vehicles in the 1970s. In a nostalgic moment and despite my wife's pleas against it, I decided to install a CB radio in my truck. I didn't want that big whip antenna, so I bought a magnetic version that mounted on top. That sounded great, until the wind blew it off and it banged against the side of my truck while driving down the interstate.

Our cell phones used to have antennas. Many of you remember flip phones with the retractable antennas. Do you ever wonder why today's phones don't have these? The short answer, according to MIT School of Engineering, is that modern electronic devices communicate at frequencies that can be detected by smaller antennas. In

1993, the Federal Communications Commission began auctioning off a range of new carrier frequencies to wireless service providers. The first were a range of frequencies close to 900 megahertz and were typically used by early cordless phones. By the end of the 1990s, major providers had acquired many more communications bands at frequencies greater than 2 gigahertz.

Meanwhile, with the popularity of streaming today, some folks who still want local channels have been searching for rabbit ears. Today's versions are fancier, though, with longer ranges, tabletop designs, extendable dipoles and power adaptors. And they pick up a lot more than four or five channels. Sometimes.

This has been a tough year for many, and you have helped us make a difference for those in our community. Without your support, we could not have continued to serve the basic needs of so many — a 53% increase in pantry services over this time last year. As we look to 2024, I am optimistic that this work will continue with all of you alongside us.

DONATIONS RECEIVED

Johnston Rotary donated \$3,000 from their golf outing. The American Legion Riders from Johnston Post 728 donated \$300 to the Johnston Partnership in honor of Richard Lewier, who was killed in action and for whom Post 728 is named. Other donations included birthday cake kits from the Johnston volleyball team, 2,900 pounds of produce this season from St. Timothy's Garden, 113 pounds of personal items from the Northglenn Birthday Club, and 1,000 pounds of food from Midwest Miss United States Agriculture Pageant contestants. Wells Fargo volunteers helped out, Herrmann Chiropractic donated 212 pounds of personal care items. Friday Friends notes were made possible by Community State Bank, Kenny donated Brooks shoes and Thrivent donated socks. Cadence Apartment also donateded food.

Donation drives held at the schools resulted in 2,233 pounds of food collected through November by Timber

Ridge students, staff and PTO; 672 pounds of food and \$231 by Johnston Middle School; and 332 pounds of food, 232 pounds of personal items and 130 pounds of clothing from Summit Middle School. The Johnston High School Student Council's Give All You Can Drive, in which students went door to door to collect food, was also held. The Johnston Show Choir donated new socks and members volunteered at the pantry. The JHS National Honor Society donated \$800 from their pancake breakfast.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

CURRENT NEEDS

The Johnston Partnership provides food and personal hygiene products to those in need. The biggest current need is winter coats. They have given away more than 600 and are in need of 600 more to make it through the winter months. The goal is to ensure each of their clients gets a warm winter coat. People can donate used coats of all sizes or shop their Amazon wishlist. Also needed are baby wipes, lotion, toothpaste, toothbrushes and toilet paper. Donations can be dropped off at 5870 Merle Hay Road, Suite C, Tuesdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 4-6 p.m., and on Thursdays and Saturdays, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Every third week of the month, they collect for the Friday food bag program that serves food insecure students at all nine Johnston schools. They are currently providing about 200 bags per week. Their needs are: Ramen noodles, macaroni and cheese, granola bars, individual shelf stable milk, individual peanut butter and fruit cups.

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
