GET A LOAD OF THIS!

Those five words were the marketing slogan for a concrete company in my hometown when I was a kid. The words were painted on the rotating mixer tank of the truck that my friends and I were so fascinated with. It helped that the truck drivers would almost always respond to our arm-pump requests by honking their horns. They smiled as much as we did.

Years later, I found myself getting up close and personal with concrete. As a young man, I worked for some great guys who taught me how to do concrete work. To be honest, they taught me how to push a wheel barrow full of concrete. If I had paid more attention, I might have learned how to frame and finish and could replace my own driveway now. But I was focused on other things back then. I did learn one steadfast rule, though: If I dumped a wheel barrow of concrete, I had to buy a case of beer for the crew after work. That one I learned quickly.

As much as I worked with

this construction material, I never truly knew the difference between concrete and cement. Like many of you, I thought

the words were one and the same. For years, I believed that the wet stuff was cement, and the hard stuff was concrete. I thought wrong.

I now know that cement is actually an ingredient in concrete, kind of like milk being an ingredient in ice cream. Concrete is a mixture of cement, aggregate and water. The aggregate — such as sand, stone and gravel — makes up about 75% of concrete.

Cement is manufactured from a mix of iron, aluminum, silicon, calcium and other substances that are found in limestone, shells, chalk, clay, iron ore and silica sand. These "ingredients" are heated to a high temperature to create a rock-like substance that is ground into fine powder, which is cement

Now you know. Meanwhile, concrete is among the most widely used construction materials in both residential and commercial applications. It is strong and durable and practical and, as such, desirable.

Like most things in life, pouring concrete properly is a learned skill, even an art. Malcolm Gladwell's 10,000 hours theory holds true, which is apparent by the three-year-old crumbling concrete in my driveway that was completed by some guys who thought anyone could pour concrete. Their work may have been faulty, but I hope they at least honked their horns and made the neighborhood kids smile.

KIWANIS OF JOHNSTON LUNCH MEETING

The Kiwanis of Johnston lunch meeting will be Tuesday, Jan. 9, 11:30 a.m. at Cozy Café in Johnston. Note the change of date due to the New Year holiday. Speakers will be Bob Mitchell and Caroline Peterson. Bob is past Kiwanis Nebraska/Iowa Governor and he holds a Permanent Professional teaching certificate from the Iowa Department of Education. Caroline Peterson is a retired teacher who also owned a kitchen store and cooking school in Sioux City and Sioux Falls. She is the leader of the newly created Building Lives through Reading group. She was living in Sioux Falls when she learned of Promising Futures, a group in Sioux Falls that was providing books to elementary students to promote reading, and she brought the idea to Des Moines.

Did you know that 66% of students in DMPS elementary schools are not reaching third-grade reading proficiency level by the end of their third grade? This is an urgent problem that needs our help in correcting. Our "Give a Book a Month" program is an attempt to make a difference.

The newly created Building Lives through Reading group is soliciting money to buy a book-a-month for students in K-5 in several of the DMPS elementary schools. As a recently approved participant through the District's Community Partners Program, we are designating Capitol View and Edmunds as 2023-24 school year recipients.

We have now distributed books to K-2 at Capitol View elementary and K-5 at Edmunds through December. We have five months of books yet to acquire and distribute for the remainder of the school year. By the end of the school year, we will have distributed 5,000 books to more than 550 students.

RFCIPE

SIMPLE, NUTRITIOUS MEALS TO MAKE MORE TIME FOR FAMILY

(Family Features) Making time for meals together shouldn't require spending all night in the kitchen. A simple-to-prepare ingredient like eggs can help you spend less time cooking and more time with family. ■

POACHED EGG TOSTADAS WITH AVOCADO-TOMATILLO SALSA

Servings: 4 (1 egg and 1/2 cup salsa per serving)

- 2 Nonstick cooking spray
- · 4 corn tortillas (6 inches each)
- 4 cups water
- 1 tablespoon white vinegar
- 4 large eggs

Salsa:

- · 1 medium avocado, diced
- 1 medium Anaheim or poblano pepper, seeds and ribs discarded, diced
- 1 medium tomatillo, papery husk discarded, washed and diced
- · 1/2 medium tomato, diced
- 1/4 cup diced red onion
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh cilantro
- 2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- 1 medium garlic clove, minced
- 1/8 teaspoon salt

Directions:

Preheat oven to 400 F. Line baking sheet with aluminum foil. Lightly spray foil with nonstick cooking spray.



Arrange tortillas in single layer on foil. Lightly spray tortillas with nonstick cooking spray. Using fork, pierce tortillas to prevent from filling with air. Bake 5-6 minutes on each side, or until golden brown. Transfer to serving plates.

In large skillet over high heat, bring water and vinegar to boil.

Once water is boiling, reduce heat and simmer. Break egg into cup then carefully slip egg into simmering water. Repeat with remaining eggs, avoiding eggs touching in water. Simmer 3-5 minutes, or until egg whites are completely set and yolks are beginning to set but aren't hard. Using slotted spoon, drain eggs. Place each egg on tostada.

To make salsa: In medium bowl, gently stir together avocado, pepper, tomatillo, tomato, red onion, cilantro, lime juice, garlic and salt. Serve with tostadas.
