

CROWN POINT COMMUNITY CENTER RENOVATIONS INCORPORATE SUSTAINABILITY INITIATIVES

On Tuesday, Jan. 2, the Johnston City Council approved the Crown Point Community Center bid with Munro Construction from Johnston. The low bid came in at \$4,649,500. Renovations of the building are expected to begin in mid-January with a series of sustainability initiatives to promote eco-friendly practices.

"We are excited to take a significant step toward promoting sustainable practices within our community and reducing our carbon footprint," said Mayor Paula Dierenfeld. "These initiatives will help us become more eco-friendly and reduce energy costs in the long run."

Sustainability initiatives that will be put into the renovations include:

- Solar panels on the roof, which will generate around 30-40% of the building's total electricity.
- A new, energy-efficient HVAC system.



- Upgraded energy-efficient lighting equipped with sensors to minimize waste.
- New, energy-efficient windows that provide more natural and birdfriendly light.
 - More insulation.
- Energy and water-saving toilets, sinks and other fixtures.

The city is taking steps to make sustainability a priority by implementing eco-friendly initiatives while remodeling public buildings in the community. The Crown Point Community Center will also undergo a remodel, requiring it to close temporarily starting Friday, Jan. 19. No reservations will be taken during 2024. Additionally, the senior community meal service will end on Jan. 19. However, those who rely on this service can still receive their meals in Northwest Des Moines or Grimes. Polk County is finalizing details on additional bussing to the Northwest Des Moines site.

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MAYOR RUNS 2,328 MILES FOR THE FOOD PANTRY

Mayor Paula Dierenfeld embarked on an inspiring journey on Dec. 31, fueled by the incredible generosity of the Johnston community. Determined to cover 2,328 miles, Mayor Dierenfeld has set an ambitious goal to complete this extraordinary challenge by fall. However, additional miles could be added if any checks arrive later because of the holidays.

The "Mayor's Run for Food" initiative kicked off on Dec. 1 with a unique challenge from Mayor Dierenfeld. For every bag of food or \$10 donated to the Johnston Partnership for a Healthy Community, she pledged to run one mile. The response has been incredible, with an outpouring of food and monetary contributions from the community.

This marks the 10th consecutive year of the Mayor's Run for Food, and Mayor Dierenfeld has been a driving force in collecting support for the Johnston Partnership. To date, more than \$78,000 has been raised through this annual initiative, showcasing the community's commitment to making a positive impact.

In 2022, Mayor Dierenfeld covered an impressive 1,850 miles, demonstrating her dedication to the cause and motivating the community to contribute. The Mayor's Run for Food has grown exponentially over the years, as illustrated by the increasing mile totals: 2014: 31 miles: 2015: 191 miles: 2016: 316 miles: 2017: 381 miles; 2018: 514 miles; 2019: 580 miles; 2020: 790 miles; 2021: 1,132 miles; 2022: 1,850 miles; 2023: 2,328 miles.

Mayor Dierenfeld sincerely thanks everyone who generously contributed to this year's campaign. The support from the Johnston community has played a pivotal role in reaching this year's goal and addressing the food insecurity needs within our community.

QUICK, EASY RECIPES TO ADD TO YOUR DINNER ROTATION

Making time for meals together shouldn't require spending all night in the kitchen, however. A simple-to-prepare ingredient like eggs can help you spend less time cooking and more time with family. ■

POBLANO FRITTATA

Servings: 4 (2 wedges per serving)

- 4 large eggs
- 1/4 cup fat-free milk
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 2 medium poblano peppers, seeds and ribs discarded, chopped
- · 2 cups frozen whole-kernel corn, thawed
- 2 medium green onions, chopped
- 1/4 cup finely shredded Cotija cheese or crumbled queso fresco
- 1 medium tomato, chopped
- 1/4 cup fat-free sour cream

Directions:

In medium bowl, whisk eggs, milk and cilantro. In medium skillet over medium heat, heat oil, swirling to coat bottom of skillet. Cook poblano peppers 3 minutes, or until browning on edges, stirring frequently.

Stir in corn and green onion. Reduce heat to medium-low and carefully pour in egg mixture. Cook, covered, 10 minutes, or until mixture is just set on edges and still soft in center. Avoid overcooking. Remove from heat.

Sprinkle with cheese. Cut into eight wedges. Place



two wedges on each plate. Top with tomatoes and sour cream.

The Johnston Partnership provides food and personal hygiene products to those in need. Current needs are shampoo and conditioner, dish soap, laundry soap and dog and cat food. Donations can be dropped off at 5870 Merle Hay Road, Suite C, Tuesdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 4-6 p.m., and on Thursdays and Saturdays, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Every third week of the month, they collect for the Friday food bag program that serves food insecure students at all nine Johnston schools. They are currently providing about 200 bags per week. Their needs are: Ramen noodles, macaroni and cheese, granola bars, individual shelf stable milk, individual peanut butter and fruit cups.









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
