



- 2. **Rear-Facing for Infants & Toddlers:** Keep infants and toddlers in a rear-facing car seat until they reach the maximum weight or height allowed by the seat. This provides optimal protection for their head, neck, and spine.
- 3. Forward-Facing Harness Seats: Transition to a forward-facing harness seat with a five-point harness once your child outgrows the rear-facing seat. Make sure the harness is snug and positioned at or slightly above the child's shoulders.
- 4. **Booster Seats:** Use a booster seat for older children who have outgrown the forward-facing seat. A booster seat helps position the seat belt correctly over the child's body, providing better protection.
- 5. **Seat Belt Fit:** When transitioning to a seat belt, ensure that it fits properly. The lap belt should lie snugly across the upper thighs, not the stomach, and the shoulder belt should cross the chest and shoulder, not the neck or face.
- 6. Avoid Bulky Clothing: Remove bulky clothing, such as winter coats, before securing a child in a car seat. Bulky clothing can compress in a crash, creating slack in the harness and reducing its effectiveness.

Couple finds purpose after retirement

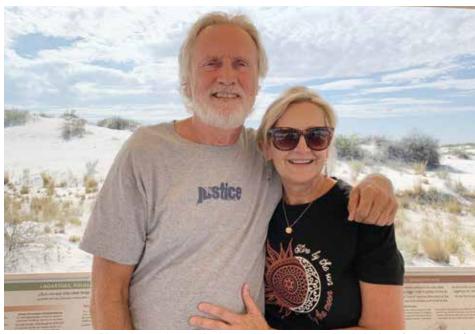
Mark and Kim Aarsvold have found joy in working after retirement.

Kim spent 27 years teaching, evolving from high school business/computer classes to middle school reading and language arts, developing a middle school reading intervention program and working as a reading specialist.

She first retired in 2019 and then again in 2021, after which she worked two long-term substitute teaching positions for 13 weeks.

During the 2022-23 school year, Kim worked part-time as a paraeducator in a fourth-grade general education classroom. She had planned to substitute teach and work as a para again this year, but her volunteer work — something she greatly enjoys — has taken up more time than expected.

"I choose to continue working and volunteering because there are needs that I am still able to help with and make a little bit of a difference," Kim says. "My working and retirement journey have been, and continue to be, all about the blessing of serving and helping to make the world a little bit better. I

feel most fulfilled when I know that I can make someone's life easier."

Kim adds that her parents were hardworking small business owners, and their work was a big part of their family life.

"To have good work is a blessing, and the rewards go beyond financial," Kim says. "Work rewards you physically, mentally and

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emotionally. Since moving to Polk City a few years ago, work has helped me to connect to the city and surrounding area."

Her husband Mark, also remains active in his retirement. Similar to his wife, Mark taught in public schools in Iowa and Minnesota for a total of 40 years, primarily at the fifthgrade level. He also coached eighth-grade girls volleyball and boys basketball throughout his career.

Since retiring in June 2017, Mark has worked in a few different capacities, all of which have been part-time. He reported and wrote columns for a tri-county newspaper while still living in Minnesota, helps with the harvest season each fall for a farmer friend and works two custodial shifts a week at the nearby rest area on Interstate 35.

"I enjoy making my own work schedule in retirement, which includes time for a few extra cups of coffee each morning," Mark says. "I've also been able to maintain current and past friendships and make some new ones along the way."

Mark is a people person, so continuing to work enables him to get his "people fix." Enjoying his extra earnings, which pay for bucket list activities, doesn't hurt, either.

"I believe purpose is important for healthy retirement," Mark says. "Whether I'm doing volunteer work or earning some income, I just feel better having a direction some days ... emphasis on some days."

Finding what's next

A few years after graduating high school in the early 1980s, Renee Blodgett joined the Iowa Army National Guard. After basic training and advanced individual training, Blodgett started working a temporary fulltime job at Camp

She later became active duty in the Guard and Reserve, which provided the same benefits as if she were active duty in the army, but, instead of potentially being stationed overseas, she would stay in Iowa. Blodgett progressed through the ranks and positions, retiring as a sergeant major on Jan. 31, 2010.

"I loved being a part of the military, but I also knew, after 25 years, it was time to retire," she shares.

Because Blodgett was only 46 when she

retired with full benefits, she knew it was likely she wouldn't stay fully retired.

She was offered a job as a civilian contractor for the National Guard Bureau while she was still in uniform and worked in that capacity until March 2014.

"It was a great transition job, allowing me to use the skills and knowledge I gained in the military until I decided what I wanted to do completely outside of the military environment," she says.

In 2014, Blodgett enrolled at DMACC to study digital marketing. A couple of years later, she received her digital marketing certificate to go along with the bachelor's degree she earned from Grand View University.

"I knew that computer programs, social media, etc., would be key to whatever endeavor I took next," she says.

That "next" came in the fall of 2018, when Blodgett became a Mary Kay independent sales director.

"I knew this was perfect for me going forward because it allowed me so much flexibility, not only in my hours, but also in location," she says. "I didn't want to work a



job that required me to be at my desk a certain number of hours, have to ask permission to take time off work when we had medical issues or wanted to take an extended vacation. My husband was still working, so having one of us with a flexible schedule also made it easier to manage appointments and activities for our household. I had a few inquiries to see if I was interested in different positions, but I just couldn't bring myself to go back into that environment. Even through COVID, this has been a great fit for me."

Blodgett especially enjoys working with her customers and women in her Mary Kay unit.

"It fills my cup to see the smile on the faces of my customers when they try something new," she says. "I want to help them feel their most beautiful self, inside and out. I recently had a husband text me after his wife passed away. He said, 'I never saw anyone get as much pleasure as she did from applying her Mary Kay face creams." "

In addition, Blodgett enjoys mentoring other women who choose to become Mary Kay independent beauty consultants.

Coleen Deets retired from Sysco Foods of Iowa in December 2021 after 25 years as a sales coordinator in its credit/finance department.

After retiring, she sat at home for three months and quickly became antsy to do something different.

So, she applied for and took a role with North Polk Middle School's nutrition department, serving lunch to students. Deets' job there is only about 13 hours a week during the school year, so it's an ideal time commitment for her. But when that first summer rolled around and there were no students to serve, boredom set in again.

"Then school was out, and I stayed home for a month and was bored, so I took a job at

her third child was born, she went back to teaching part-time at West Elementary at the pre-kindergarten level. She then moved to Central Elementary, where she taught kindergarten through second graders until her retirement in 2013.

After retiring, she began substitute teaching for the North Polk Community School District, which she still does today. Sheldahl also worked part-time at an antique store in Slater, which she shared with family.

"After leaving the store, I opened a small vintage shop in Polk City called Pedal Pushers, which I have open one to two days a week," she shares. "My vintage shop gives me a place to play, create and paint furniture."

But that isn't all. Sheldahl also makes time for having a booth at the Brass Armadillo Antique Mall in Des Moines, for spending time with her grandchildren and for one of her favorite hobbies.

"Flower gardening at home is my stress reliever," she says. "I like to stay busy and hope to continue these activities as long as I can," she says. ■

Mini Greek yogurt pancakes with cinnamon-maple topping

Topping:

- 1 3/4 cups plain Greek yogurt (fat free, 2%
- 1/3 cup maple syrup
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Pancakes:

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg, lightly beaten
- 3/4 cup plain Greek yogurt (fat free, 2% or
- 1/2 cup milk (skim, 2% or whole)
- 3 tablespoons melted butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup fresh blueberries or chopped fresh strawberries

- To make topping: Stir yogurt, syrup and cinnamon. Cover and refrigerate.
- To make pancakes: In mixing bowl, stir flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda and salt. In separate bowl, whisk egg, yogurt, milk, butter and vanilla. Add yogurt mixture to flour mixture. Stir iust until combined



(batter should be slightly lumpy). Scrape batter into large plastic food storage bag.

- Oil nonstick griddle or large nonstick skillet. Heat over medium heat. Cut off about 1/2 inch from corner of plastic bag. Squeeze batter, about 1 tablespoon at a time, onto hot griddle. Cook 1-2 minutes per side, or until pancakes are golden brown, turning to second sides when bubbles form on surface of pancakes and edges are slightly dry.
- Serve warm pancakes topped with cinnamonmaple yogurt and sprinkled with berries.

A PASSION for native plants

Polk City Friends of the Park is on a mission.

The Polk City Friends of the Parks' mission is to make Polk City a place everyone can enjoy.

Board member Tanya Harrington is one of those people on the front line of making — and keeping — the city's spaces beautiful. The group has done yeoman work, helping provide a shade structure in Leonard Park, fund the Pocket Park off the square, provide a bike rack for Lost Lake Park, fund Trees for Kids at West Elementary, and develop a new pollinator garden in Lost Lake Park, among other things. Current projects include a skating rink at Kiwanis Park, connecting bike trails and the resurfacing of the tennis courts at Miller Park.

The board's long list of accomplishments is helped greatly by the diversified expertise within.

"What makes our group special is that each board member adds a different perspective when we are making our goals," Harrington says. "I am focused on adding native plants, another board member is focused on bike trails, another member wants to see more recreational opportunities for teenagers."

Harrington's passion for native plants began, ironically, with cats.

"I thought it would be fun for them to watch birds outside, and in my quest to attract birds, I provided water, cover and birdseed," she says. "It was only after reading Doug Tallamy's book, 'Nature's Best Hope,' that I found out that the birds will show up if you provide the main food source for their young — caterpillars."

In the summer of 2022, Harrington learned that the monarch butterfly had been placed on the endangered species list by some organizations. Having grown up with her mom teaching her about the butterflies and moths of Iowa and their relationship with native plants, she felt compelled to do something knowing the cause of their decline was in part due to the loss of milkweed, the only plant monarch butterfly can eat as caterpillars.

Harrington posted something on Facebook to seek volunteers for the project and met Jessica Faue, president of Friends of the Parks. And, soon, the West elementary pollinator project was born. With the help of the Friends of the Parks group, Harrington was able to obtain a grant for six native trees, which support more than 500 species of butterflies and moths. She even added a large pollinator garden and two smaller ones. By the following fall, the garden was filled with butterflies. Shortly thereafter, Harrington joined the Friends of the Parks board with the goal of adding as many native plants to parks and bike trails as possible.

Polk City is in the unique position to be surrounded by an abundance of nature, Harringon says. But that nature is, for the most part, outside of town or at least a walk or a bike ride away. But nature shouldn't be something you go "visit," she says.

"Kids and adults should have nature when they step out their backdoor," Harrington says. "When you envision your yard in the summer, do you see red, yellow, purple and green or is it all just green?"

Historically, Iowa hasn't been an all-green monoculture, she says. The animals, birds and insects are all still here, but the plants they rely on have all but vanished.

"If we don't make the choice to put natives in our yards, our kids will miss out on the amazing things our world has to offer," Harrington says. "Not just as kids, but possibly forever. The time to act is now. Nature —

and the Monarch in particular — can't wait."

Harrington says she is hoping the group will be able to add some pollinator patches to the parks that show the community that native plants don't automatically mean an "out of control mess."

"It's all about the types of natives you plant," she says. "If you plant native prairie grasses or black eyed Susan for erosion control, then you will have a patch that will be tall and look more like a prairie. But there are many, many options from 8 inches to 8 feet. Your native gardens can look planned out and well maintained if that is your preference."

Also in future works are a seed library for people to take and donate native seeds, Harringon adds, as well as adding a couple of rain gardens to the parks that have problems with standing water.

Thus far, citizens have been receptive and supportive, Harrington

"The residents of Polk City have been incredibly generous to Friends of the Parks," she says. "When we set goals for our parks, we are able to achieve them." ■

GIRLS wrestling debut

Middle schoolers "blazing a trail"



The North Polk middle school girls wrestling team is "blazing a trail" as the wrestling program looks to grow enough for the district to have its own high school team.

The North Polk Middle School girls wrestling team made its debut in January 2024, coached by Chris Silver. Silver also coaches middle school boys wrestling, which began before winter break. He says the programs are the same for both girls and boys. The style of wrestling and rules follow high school's "folkstyle" wrestling.

However, he says his approach to coaching girls versus boys is slightly different since most of the girls haven't wrestled before.

"Some girls are trying it new and others have a connection in wrestling. Some watched their brothers wrestle or their dad was a wrestler," he

"We work hard to push them. Yet, we also want to be uplifting and encouraging and focusing on being positive. At the end of the practice, we talk about what went well, and they share good things."

When coaching a first-time sport for girls, it's important to review the basics.

"Many have never stepped on a mat. It's important to break it all down and teach the techniques."

A few years ago, the elementary school began offering an introductory girls wrestling program. North Polk is hoping to build a high school program in the future. Currently, several girls from North Polk High School have a co-op agreement to participate with the Ankeny High School girls wrestling team.

Silver, a North Polk graduate, wrestled in high school. He began coaching in high school and says his North Polk coaches, Bill Taylor, Jerry Walker and Dave Middleton, were influential and supportive coaches and inspired his decision to coach.

For 27 years, he's also coached football and baseball. He likes how he can give back to the community he was raised in.

"After I returned from college, I wanted to give back. I absolutely loved the coaches," he reflects. "To see the passion these coaches put into the kids influences my coaching," he says.

Silver says it's exciting to see the new program take off, not just in sports but in the athletes' lives.

"We try to teach lessons off the mat, including integrity and service before self. We want excellence in the class and at home, not just on the mat."

He's witnessed camaraderie and enthusiasm among the girls.

"It takes a lot of courage. They are blazing a trail. It's not easy. I admire their dedication to starting something new," he says.

"Despite residing in Polk City for two years, our social circle was limited, given that we are not originally from Iowa," Lehman explains. "After I started a Facebook group, we began organizing weekly play sessions at Miller Park every Sunday throughout the summer."

Lehman and others quickly recognized the need for improved courts, so she proactively contacted Polk City Parks and Recreation, who connected her with Polk City Friends of the Parks — a volunteer-based, non-profit organization aimed at enhancing Polk City's

parks, trails and greenspaces for the benefit of the entire community.

"Following a meeting, they expressed willingness to collaborate on fundraising endeavors for the construction of the new courts," Lehman shares.
