

POLK CITY INITIATES SPECIAL CENSUS

Polk City is growing. The mayor and city council have decided to take the steps necessary for a Special Census. As of 2020, the population was 5,543 residents. City officials estimate the city has grown with more than 1.000 additional residents since March of 2020. Polk City receives road use tax money based on its official census. The additional money Polk City can receive in road use tax will significantly offset the cost of the special census. The special census is scheduled for Sept. 16.



All residents will receive information in the mail beginning in August. The city encourages everyone to participate, as the additional road use tax funds help reduce the property tax burden on residents. For more information and timeline, visit www.polkcityia.gov.

THE AMERICAN LANGUAGE

Signs. Signs. Everywhere there are signs. And, at least in Iowa, they are mostly written in the English language. For me, that's a good thing, as what I learned in three years of Spanish classes didn't stick very well. But, for those who can't read the English language, it's certainly not easy.

Imagine moving to a foreign country and having every street sign, every store sign, every menu, every single word in a language you are unable to read. And then imagine having to communicate with those who speak another language to get instructions on how to do the simplest of tasks and not break the law. It would not be easy.

The solution through the years on how to address this in America has clearly changed. In the earliest days of the United States, and through most of its history, those who were new to the country were expected to learn the English language and realized the need to do so to

survive. In recent decades, in many parts of America, signs and other communication tools are provided in two or more

languages. What changed?

Asking for the answer to that question simply leads to fingerpointing and creates a deeper divide in America. Maybe it's time for another solution. Maybe it's time to work toward creating an answer that could accommodate most everyone in a positive way. What if we simply gave the English language back to the English, and we devised a new language — the American language? We are kind of doing this now anyway, so why not make it formal? I realize it would be a lot of work, but imagine a new language that would be a combination of the many vernaculars spoken here now. It would likely be quite similar to the English language but with

words and phrases from other tongues, too.

I am convinced that we would be better off as a society if we focused more on how we are alike rather than how we are different. We are spending an incredible amount of both public and private money and time right now to deal with the language barriers. What if we used that money and time to create one language and then hold all Americans accountable for using it?

It may be a pollyannaish idea, but it also just might help to extract at least one wedge that divides our country — and we all might learn a little more about each other, too.

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MCCANN TO SPEAK ABOUT HER BOOK AT LIBRARY

Iowa native Linda Betsinger McCann will be speaking about her newest book, "Rosie the Riveters of Iowa," at the Polk City Library on March 20 at 6 p.m. Everyone is invited, and there is no admission charge. Rosie the Riveter was the nickname given to the women who worked during World War II. The women were needed in factories and other companies to take the place of the men gone to the war. Iowa had 70 companies with military contracts during the war, so women were very much needed to assist in meeting the needs of the military. Linda was able to speak with 35 women who had worked as Rosies, and she shares their memories. Linda will have copies of her books for sale. The books are \$20 each, and she can only take cash or checks.

She will also speak March 23 at 10 a.m. at the Iowa Gold Star Military Museum at Camp Dodge in Johnston about her book about prisoners of war in Iowa.

RECIPE

CELEBRATE ST. PAT'S WITH A TRADITIONAL IRISH DISH

(*Family Features*) If St. Patrick's Day inspires feelings of hearth and home rather than leprechauns and green beer, you can celebrate tradition with warm, filling recipes that harken back to Irish heritage.

Share a sweet way to complete the meal in style with Irish Apple Cake, a classic dessert to top off a filling celebration. This version is easy enough to prepare with a handful of everyday ingredients for the cake, a crumbly topping and homemade custard for the finishing touch.

IRISH APPLE CAKE

Cake:

- 3 cups self-rising flour
- 1/2 tablespoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1 stick butter, cubed
- 3/4 cup sugar
- · 4 apples of choice, peeled and cubed
- 2 eggs
- · 1 cup half-and-half

Topping:

- 1/2 stick butter
- 3/4 cup flour
- · 1 cup brown sugar

Custard:

- 6 large egg yolks
- 6 tablespoons sugar
- 1 1/2 cups half-and-half
- · 2 teaspoons vanilla

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375 F. Grease and flour 9-inch round springform pan.

To make cake: In large bowl, sift flour with cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg and ginger. Using fork, cut butter until mixture resembles crumbs. Add sugar and apples; mix



well. Stir in eggs and half-and-half until mixture reaches thick, dough-like batter. Pour batter into prepared pan.

To make topping: In bowl, mix butter, flour and sugar to create crumbled mixture. Sprinkle on top of batter in pan. Bake 1 hour. Check with toothpick to make sure middle is completely done. If not, bake 5-10 minutes. Let cool on rack.

To make custard: Whisk egg yolks and sugar. In saucepan, bring half-and-half to boil. Add one spoonful half-and-half at a time to egg mixture, whisking while adding. Once whisked together, return to saucepan and stir over medium heat until thickened, about 4 minutes. Remove from heat and whisk in vanilla.

Serve custard over cake.
