






"I took six weeks with my children to take them on a trip back home to Bosnia to show them how beautiful my home country is," says Alma.

The children were born and raised in the Urbandale area, and it had been years since their first trip to their mother's homeland.

"I took Harry and Melissa to Bosnia once before, but they do not remember anything because they were so little then," says Alma, adding that she wanted to immerse them in her country of origin and its unique culture. "It was important to me to show them where I came from so that they could understand me better."

During the six-week trip, Alma also wanted her children to see "how beautiful Bosnia really is," so they visited many of the unique sights of the country.

"While we were there, we saw the wild

"Seeing the 9-11 memorial was extremely moving and a highlight for our family," says

The Wilder family also visited a few lighthouses, such as Bodie Island Lighthouse and Nubble Lighthouse, and other coastal destinations, such as the Intercoastal Waterway, Cliff Walk, Harper's Ferry and Assateague

"This is where hundreds of wild horses roam and live," says Rena.

It was the first extended vacation for the family, and they planned seeing as many sights as they could.

"Our goal was to see as much as possible in the 16 days we had," says Rena.

To plan the trip, Rena and Scott used a good old-fashioned atlas.

"Scott and I sat down with an atlas and mapped must-see destinations and calculated drive times," says Rena.

They were sure to include a visit to an old favorite: the Chesapeake Bay Bridge and Tunnel.

"Though we've been on it many times, it still amazes us," says Rena.

The Intercoastal Waterway was another must-see.

"We had the privilege of watching a huge yacht pass through. This was neat for us land-locked Iowans to see," she says.

The Wilder family rounded out their trip with stops at Currituck National Wildlife Refuge, Kitty Hawk, Outer Banks, Kill Devil Hills, Nags Head, Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge in North Carolina, and Harper's Ferry, West Virginia. They topped it off with a family reunion.

"We had a nice visit with my family in Virginia Beach," says Rena.

All in all, the Wilders were in 18 states, not counting Iowa, and logged an incredible 4,238 miles.

Rena says it is difficult to choose one favorite memory from their travels.

"It's hard to pick just one favorite memory because everything was fantastic, including the weather," she says.

Rena adds that she would have liked to spend more time as some of the many stops they made.

"What we would do differently next time would be to give ourselves more time in New York City, Harper's Ferry, Cooperstown, Maine and Rhode Island. There is so much to see, and it is all absolutely stunning, especially for this history-loving family."

The Wilders' advice for fellow travelers would be to get off the interstate and to go off the beaten path.

"Even if it takes an extra day or two," says Rena. "Some of the most beautiful parts of the country are not found on the major roadways."

Along the way, Rena, Scott and their sons wandered off the interstate to hit states they hadn't visited before.

"We had lunch in a small Michigan town, bathroom breaks in Vermont, etc. Our rule is you must take or leave something for the state to count," she says.

#### **A Chilean immersion**

Tony Bibbs of Urbandale visited the Chilean Island of Chiloé last year.

"It was an absolutely amazing trip," he says.

Tony is a small business owner who traveled to see some of his team in Argentina.

"I've also got some friends from Chile and Argentina who live in the metro. It's only natural to exchange stories about our hometowns, so I jumped on the opportunity to visit a friend's," he says.

Tony had a chance years ago to travel to Chile with one of his closest friends, Juan Pablo "JP" San Martin, but had to cancel when his dad received a cancer diagnosis.

"It took until 2023 for the stars to realign for the trip," says Tony. "It was just the two of us, though JP's family there made me feel welcome. I can't overstate how awesome it was."

Tony visited Chile in late February of 2023, the end of summer in Chile. The climate in Chile is unique, especially in Santiago.

"You will be hard-pressed to find a day where the sun doesn't come out, at least for a bit. This is an ideal time to travel there to avoid the Santiago crowds and traffic jams," he says.

Tony spent a few days in Santiago, Chile, but most of their time was on the Island of Chiloé.

Tony's favorite memory was visiting a mussel (chorito) farm in person in Chiloé.

"We were on the water in great weather, and the trip was spontaneous. We even got to enjoy eating a few choritos, which were surprisingly good, even raw," says Tony.

Tony's trip was an opportunity to immerse himself in a culture he had heard about from his friend JP.

"The trip was about taking a deep dive into Chilean culture," he says. "It was truly an honor to have JP be my host in Chile."

The two also spent some time at a ski resort.

"We went 9,842 feet above sea level to the Valle Nevada Ski Resort just east of Santiago in the Andes Mountains range," says Tony. "I saw Andean Condors, the national bird of Chile with a wingspan of 10.5 feet. Then we went to Cerro El Plomo where, in 1954, a well-preserved Incan boy was discovered."

Tony fondly remembers the Chilean food he ate, like fresh ripe avocados, completos (similar to hot dogs), dobladitas (breakfast bread), provoleta (cheese and crackers), crudo (like steak tartare), prieta (blood sausage) and pisco sour (whiskey sour).

The travel companions stayed at Coo Lodge while at Chiloé.

"It's an amazing place, sitting right on the Gulf of Ancud, where we saw all the way out to mainland Chile and up to the Michinmahuida

Volcano, which was still capped with snow," says Tony.

While at Chiloé and visiting Tepuhueico National Park, Tony saw penguins, dolphins, and other wildlife like pudu (the world's smallest deer) and nalcas (giant rhubarb with leaves as broad as 8 feet).

"Only the pictures and video I have can express the vast wildlife diversity in and around the waters of Chiloé," he says.

Tony also visited the wooden churches of Chiloé.

"Those beckon to a time when missionaries came to Chiloé," says Tony. "Today, there are roughly 60 wooden churches, but, at one time, there were as many as 150, all of which are unique and hand-crafted, blending the skills and resources of both the missionaries and the locals."

While at Chiloé, Tony enjoyed local cuisine such as the curanto (which includes mussels), fresh choritos (mussels), lamb cooked over a firepit at an outdoor picnic, chupe de locos (abalone — mullosks — in a creamy cheese sauce) and wild blackberries.

Tony wanted to visit Patagonia — the southern-most region of South America — but reserved this for another time.

"I believe Patagonia is a trip requiring a lot of planning," he says. "If I ever return to Chile, I hope to add Patagonia to the itinerary."

Tony recommends those planning to visit Chile spend some time getting to know the language.

"My Spanish is good enough to get around, order food, and get the gist of conversations, but I couldn't fully participate in conversations with many of the people I encountered," he says.

Fortunately, JP was able to act as a translator when needed.

"If you don't have access to someone who can translate for you, then come prepared with apps on your phone to help you," Tony says.

Tony also recommends traveling in the summer months for Chile, November through February.

"If you are going to Chiloé, I'd recommend you rent a car to appreciate all that Chiloé has to offer." ■

# A SENSE of community

# THE \$12 million disappointment

We also like to use conservative stock market rates of return assumptions, like 4-6%, then, if the

market is great, you are ahead, but if the market is down, the plan still works.

Though our comprehensive plan showed them with more than \$10 million less at age 100 (even running out of money in one scenario), they felt better about the numbers. Why? We laid out a clear plan that includes how they are going to fund their retirement lifestyle, invest for growth, take steps to reduce their retirement tax bill, pay for health care, and leave a legacy with whatever is left when they are gone.

Now, they are heading into retirement with a clear understanding of how they could live comfortably, protect their nest egg, AND grow their investments.

# **URBANDALE COUNCIL RECAP**

#### March 5, 2024 - Council Meeting

The Mayor and City Council met on Tuesday, March 5, and began with a proclamation for Women's History Month. March is a time to celebrate and honor the countless contributions of women, including Urbandale residents Vada Wilson, Elizabeth Williamson, Iyleene Lemon, Miriam Cline, Marilyn Kollmorgen, Susann Siebke, and Mary Polson, who have served on the Urbandale City Council; as well as Bridget Carberry Montgomery, Amy Croll, and Patricia Boddy, who are currently serving on the City Council.

The Council approved a bid to patch 91 locations on various streets that are generally located north of Aurora Avenue and East of 86th Street; approved two bids for the

purchase, delivery, and installation of playground equipment at North Karen Acres Park and Days Run Park for \$100,000 and \$70,000.00 respectively; and approved purchasing a Toyota Hybrid SUV for \$35,000 for use by the Police Department.

The annual Spring Cleanup event is scheduled for the week of April 15, 2024. The City hires outside contractors and rents additional equipment to help collect the approximately 800 tons of trash that will be set at the curb this year. The City Council accepted a \$29,000 quote for garbage trucks, equipment, and operators to help with Spring Cleanup.

At the end of the meeting, the Mayor and City Council discussed the Complete Streets Master Plan for Aurora Avenue and 70th Street.

#### February 20, 2024 - Council Meeting

The Mayor and City Council met on Tuesday, February 20, and the meeting began with a presentation on the upcoming \$118 million I-35/80 Hickman Road Interchange Reconstruction Project. Residents may notice some preliminary utility relocation work starting soon. The project is separated into three main phases and will begin this July. Phase I will widen the interstate, Phase II (planned to start in July 2025) will finish the reconstruction of the interior interstate lanes, and Phase III (planned to start in September 2026) will include most of the work on Hickman Road. The project is expected to be complete in the spring of 2029. You can view renderings of the interchange at www.Urbandale.org/CouncilRecap.

The Council approved a bid to patch 65 locations on various streets that are generally located near the northeast corner of Meredith Drive and 72nd Street. The Council also approved a bid to patch 29 locations along Douglas Parkway generally west of the roundabout at 142nd Street.

The City Council set a public hearing for Tuesday, April 2, 2024, to consider the proposed property tax levy rate for the upcoming fiscal year. The City's proposed rate is 7 cents higher than the current fiscal year at \$10.08. Although an increase is proposed, the City of Urbandale still maintains one of the lowest tax levy rates in the Des Moines area.



# **EMOTIONAL** granularity

The way we describe our emotions has a strong influence on how much relief we get from talking about them. For instance, simply acknowledging "I was mad" isn't likely to change our feelings much, whereas something more specific has a much higher likelihood of creating insight and consolation, such as: "I felt disrespected because I had previously explained why I didn't want a surprise birthday party, so when my friends threw me one anyway,



it seemed like they were disregarding my wishes, on my birthday of all days. It also made me worried I couldn't trust them to respect my feelings going forward." Lisa Feldman Barrett explains this phenomenon in her book "How Emotions Are Made," and she terms it emotional granularity. She also explains research she has carried out showing that, when people use more specificity (higher emotional granularity), this has the effect of heightening positive emotions and down-regulating the intensity of negative ones. Therefore, a simple (but not always easy) principle for enhancing our emotional wellness is pushing ourselves to be more detailed in how we label and explain our feelings. If this is something you are struggling to do on your own, a licensed mental health professional can help expand your emotional vocabulary and understand the source of troubling feelings.

#### Easter roast

Yield: 1 roast

- Salt
- pepper
- garlic powder
- 1 roast (3 pounds)
- 1 bag (1 pound) baby carrots
- 1 bag (1 1/2 pounds) trio potatoes or potato of choice
- 3 cups beef broth
- 1 can (10 ounces) cream of mushroom
- 1 tablespoon garlic pepper
- 3 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 onion, roughly chopped
- · 1 bundle asparagus

#### **Directions**

- · Preheat oven to 350 F.
- Sprinkle salt, pepper and garlic powder over roast and rub into front, back and sides. Place seasoned roast in middle of large roasting pan.



- Place carrots on one side of roasting pan and potatoes on other side.
- · In large bowl, mix beef broth and cream of mushroom soup with garlic pepper. Pour mixture over roast, potatoes and carrots. Sprinkle brown sugar over carrots and add chopped onion. Cover and cook 2 1/2 hours then remove from oven, add asparagus and cook uncovered 30

Human beings are naturally "hostile towards God...unable to please" Him (Romans 8:7) and destined to experience His just punishment. "The wages of sin is spiritual death (Romans 6:23a). God's morally perfect Son voluntarily suffered the penalty of death for us so that all who believe in Jesus would be counted righteous and forgiven (Romans 3:22-25).

When a parent pays for their child's parking ticket, the guilty party is considered righteous and guiltless before the law because the innocent party paid their fine. The parent is a picture of Jesus.

Christ's resurrection showed God's acceptance of Jesus' sacrifice as the sufficient payment for our sin. In His death and resurrection, Jesus secured pardon (Ephesians 1:7), ensured possession of eternal life (Romans 6:23), provided purpose (Galatians 2:20), gave power for godly living (Romans 6:4-6), and guaranteed the promise of being raised like Him (Romans 8:11) to all who truly believe.

Easter excitement centers on the glorious good news that Christ died and rose again so that everyone who trusts in Him will escape God's wrath and live eternally. Embrace the real excitement of Easter by turning from your rebellion and trusting Christ for deliverance from God's condemnation.
