





#### SWEET POTATO BREAKFAST BAKE

Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 15 minutes

Servings: 12

#### **Ingredients:**

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 1 cup sweetpotatoes, shredded
- 1/2 cup cooked turkey sausage crumbles or cooked turkey bacon
- 1/4 cup green onions, sliced
- 1/2 cup bell pepper, diced
- 9 eggs, beaten
- 1/2 cup cheddar cheese, shredded
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper

#### **Directions**

Heat oven to 400 F. Spray 13-by-9-inch baking



dish with nonstick cooking spray.

Evenly spread sweet potatoes, sausage or bacon, green onions and bell peppers in dish. Pour eggs carefully into baking dish. Sprinkle shredded cheese and black pepper over eggs.

Bake 15 minutes.

Slice into 12 pieces and serve hot.

#### **JOHNSTON PARTNERSHIP NEEDS**

The Johnston Partnership provides food and personal hygiene products to those in need. This week their main needs are bar soap, toothpaste, new socks and new underwear. They are also switching the clothing closet over to spring and summer clothing if people would like to start bringing those clothes to donate. Winter items, except winter coats, will not be accepted due to limited storage space.

Donations can be dropped off at 5870 Merle Hay Road, Suite C, Tuesdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and 4-6 p.m., and on Thursdays and Saturdays, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Every third week of the month, they collect for the Friday food bag program that serves food insecure students at all nine Johnston schools.
