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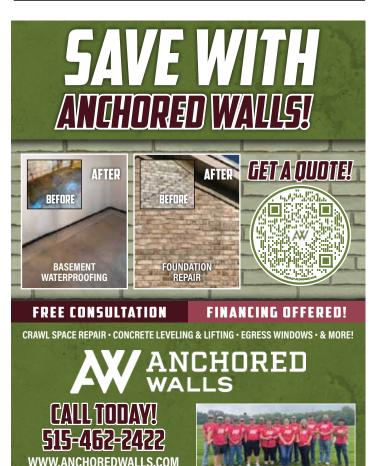

"She is 10 years old and has a team of seven racers ranging in ages 7 to 49. Can you imagine a 10-year-old with her own race team?" Calkins asks.

## **Sword fighting**

For Izaak Wadle, a Winterset High School graduate, sword fighting is not child's play with sticks or cardboard cut-out weapons. For him, it's authentic.

"I practice Historical European Martial Arts, also known as HEMA, sword fighting," he says, adding that the techniques and equipment are based on texts and manuals from 14th-18th century Europe. Like Modern Olympic Fencing. HEMA is a sport involving swords. However, HEMA is focused on sword combat using actual historical techniques and weapons rather than modern Olympic rules and equipment.

The most common weapons used are the German or Italian longsword and rapier, military sword, and sword and buckler. The

protective equipment is reminiscent of modern fencing gear but is much heavier and provides better protection. Although the weapons are made for safe sparring, they are much heavier and hit with far more force than fencing weapons.

Wadle became interested in HEMA about two years ago when a good friend of his from Indianola, Gabriel Pottebaum, introduced him to the sport.

"He has been practicing it for almost 10 years, and I have been repairing and maintaining his swords for the past four years," Wadle says.

Wadle has become so close with his friends in this sport that he says they are like family.

Wadle says HEMA appeals to him because of the sense of accomplishment he feels.

"It's the sense of satisfaction that I can get from acquiring skill in a weapon and being able to effectually use it," he says, adding that he is also a history buff, specializing in medieval and military history, specifically Polish military history.

"So, having the ability to be in a sport where I can study historical sources is appealing to me. Of course, it's not all about the history. There's a thrill that comes from combat sports that is hard to replicate," Wadle says.

Wadle practices at House of Blades HEMA in Ankeny, where he is a club officer and the club armorer. House of Blades is a subset of the House of Rogues youth organization, and the group practices at Spirit Taekwondo. The club has about 40 participants, with regular classes averaging 10 to 15.

"We have people of all types and ages that can come together over

a shared love of fighting and competition," he says. "We get a vast array of interests, ranging from people that purely enjoy the historical side of it, to people that see it as a true martial art and go to tournaments and competitions all over the United States and beyond."

A large part of HEMA's fun for Wadle is learning how to use actual historical swords, and the swords are a great source of joy and conversation to help bring people together.

"I've never been a big collector of sports memorabilia or equipment, but, as nerdy as it is, there's a sense of satisfaction that I get from my sword collection. I am also a blacksmith and sword maker. I make and sell HEMA

swords on the side, so finding HEMA also helped me find new purpose in another hobby I have done on and off for eight years."

Wadle encourages anybody interested in trying out HEMA to give it a try.

"Come join us and give it a shot," he says. "If anybody wanted to come



check it out, whether it's to get some exercise, to just see some living history, or to compete in a combat sport, you would be hard pressed to find a better community than HEMA."

The small HEMA community is a tightknit group with a sense of brotherhood, camaraderie and family.

"HEMA has made me friends with people from all over the country, from all walks of life, and of all different types," Wadle says.

## Fencing: a sport with no swimming

While most members of Melody Rose's family enjoy swimming competitively, her son, Abram Reels, decided he would prefer to try a sport that doesn't involve getting in a pool. He chose fencing.

Although Reels is no longer as nervous around water as he once was, it was that trepidation as a child that led him to find his passion for fencing.

Though fencing has its roots as a combat sport, modern fencing puts safety at the forefront with protective equipment and complex rules. It is now a sport of finesse.

Although the rest of Reels' family members are still swimmers, his siblings have been by him

to support his interest.

Reels is active at the Des Moines Fencing Club in West Des Moines.

"The people in fencing are fun, and it's cool to do," he says.

While it may have been an uneasiness about water that led Reels to look for a new means of competition, it was many of his favorite movies that led him specifically to choose fencing.

"I got interested in the sport because of 'The Princess Bride,' 'Pirates of the Caribbean,' 'Indiana Jones' and 'Star Wars.' "

He found more than just a new sport to become involved with.

"I found a club of people who are nerds like me," he says. Reels wants others to know that, just as he found out there is nothing to fear about swimming, fencing, too, is a safe sport.

"Fencing is tons of fun, and the people there are nice. It's one of the safest sports you could partake in, so there is no harm in trying it out," he says.

Reels has had success in his sport and has won medals. He's also made some lasting memories.

Recently the NAR reached a proposed settlement resolving various claims. The biggest change to come out of this settlement is Realtors will no longer be able to offer compensation on the MLS. This means agents may have to call listing agents before showing homes and ask if the sellers are willing to pay the buyer's agent. Which leads to the question: Do I have to pay a buyer's agent when I sell my home? The answer is no, and it has always been no. Commissions



are negotiable. The next question is, should I pay a buyer's agent? Here are a few things to consider:

• Buyers are strapped for cash – Typically it's first-time homebuyers who are strapped for cash. They will not be able to pay a Realtor a fee for showing/selling homes. All buyers need representation, but this is especially true for first time homebuyers who have never been through the homebuying process before.

1. Thoroughly clean the car, inside and out. There's nothing like a good spring cleaning. A thorough wash and wax is the most important thing to do with your car once the winter ends.

2. Check your tire pressure. Tire pressure is especially important in the spring. If you added air



during the winter, it can lead to overinflation as spring temperatures rise, which can cause premature tire wear.

Dr. Jim Pottebaum is the owner and veterinarian at Winterset Veterinary Clinic. He and his wife, Cindy, have also been involved in many efforts to serve the local community.

"There's no shortage of needs for volunteering," he says. "There are a lot of things that need to get done, so you just get them done."

Some of Pottebaum's community service has directly related to being a parent.

"We raised three kids in Winterset. All three of them graduated from Winterset High. They're all in their 30s now. But in doing so, you're involved in softball, band, band boosters, Little League, you run the concession stand, just a lot of things, so you get to meet the kids that your kid is hanging around with," says Pottebaum.

Pottebaum has also served as a coach and judge for many 4H events at the Madison County Fair, and he's taught religious education classes to youth. He also tells of a unique project that he began with his son years ago.

"Another hobby that I have is repairing old gravestones here in Madison County. In my mind, history is important. So, when my son was in high school, I used it kind of as a bonding thing," says Pottebaum. "In the evenings and weekends, he and I would go out to many of these country cemeteries, and we would straighten headstones that were about to fall over, or headstones that had snapped in two, we had all the clamps and braces and glue to get them back together and get them back upright again, just so we could preserve some of that history.

"It's still something that I enjoy. I can do it when I have time, and when the weather is right. It's rewarding and I enjoy that."

Pottebaum belongs to a number of local groups, including the Rotary Club, Optimist Club, Knights of Columbus, and the Madison County Cattlemen's group. Some of these organizations give scholarships to area students going on to college, and Pottebaum says there is a strong emphasis on encouraging youth to give back to the community as well.

"We really target kids that have done a lot of community service and volunteerism," says Pottebaum. "Those are the kids that we try to reward with scholarships."

Pottebaum takes satisfaction in knowing his efforts have made a difference to people. He recalls one particularly vivid example.

"Through the high school years of my kids, my wife and I were involved in the band booster club. For five or six years, continuously, we were at the halftime show of every football game, helping them get the marching band stuff set up and then put away," Pottebaum says. "One thing that I really remember strongly was, a young girl who was probably a junior or senior in high school, and when we were all done one time, I was leaning on the fence watching the third quarter of the football game, and this girl came up to me and out of the blue she says, 'You know, if I had a dad, I would want him to be just like you.' I have never forgotten that." 🔳

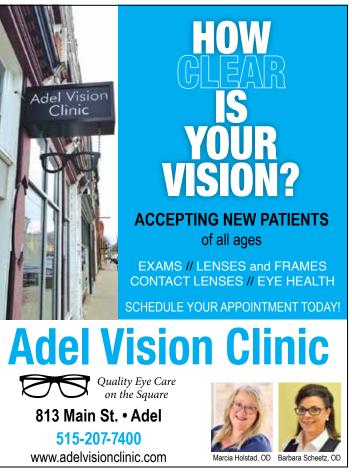

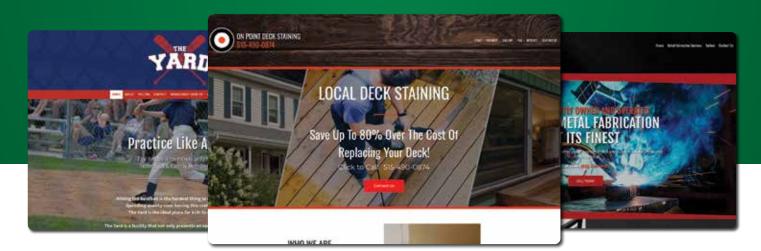

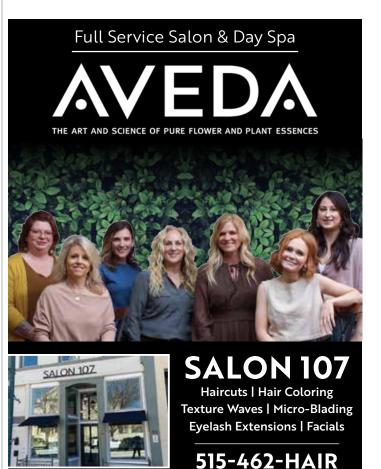
