Christine Svec's daughter, Lola Svec, wears the number 999, and her roller derby name is Miss Mayhem. She is also a student at Urbandale High School.

Lola's family supports her roller derby participation and cheers her on during matches. Her coaches, Traci and Chase Fredergill, a mother-son duo, also cheer her on. The Fredergills are among the coaches with the Des Moines Roller Derby Brats. Traci is the Des Moines Roller Derby B-team coach, and Chase is one of the All-Star coaches. From the Fredergill family of coaches, many athletes have gone on to be ranked at the national level. The head coach of the roller derby team is Mark Muse.

The sport of roller derby has existed for almost 100 years, and Des Moines has one of the best teams in the country. The Derby Brats are currently ranked third in the nation in their division and have previously advanced to nationals in Washington, D.C. Lola was one of the team members who went to France for the World Cup. The team was the 2014 and 2016 Junior Roller Derby Association National

Champions.

Lola has been participating in roller derby since she was 10 years old.

"We are currently ranked No. 3 in the nation, and I have personally grown from a beginner skater to an international gold medalist," she says.

Lola says she enjoys the sport because it is unique.

"It's not your mainstream high school sport like football, volleyball or basketball," Lola says. "It's a unique, one-of-a-kind sport that allows me to meet new friends from all over the country and the world, create a bond with my fellow teammates and a great way for me to get my aggression out."

When Lola explains roller derby to people who know nothing about the sport, she uses a unique description: "I always tell people it's like football on skates but without the ball."

She considered roller derby initially because she liked to roller skate.

"My mom learned about roller derby after I attended a roller-skating birthday party at Skateland," she says, adding that others should try it if they have an interest. "You only live

once, and I know I have already made lifelong friends and have a lifelong love for the sport itself."

Lola's favorite memory is of receiving her gold medal for Team USA Open Division (guys and girls). Lola won at the 2023 Junior Roller Derby World Cup in Valence, France.

"This was an opportunity I am especially proud of as I have worked my way up in roller

derby competitions since I was 10."

Lola competed against the best skaters in the country at tryouts in Denver, Philadelphia and Chicago.

"I trained, worked out, and pushed myself physically and mentally as hard as I could for this opportunity. And my hard work paid off. I was selected to be part of Team USA," she says.

Once selected, the team had just six months to be ready to compete against other countries.

"I attended multiple practices where skaters learned to work with each other on different plays and strategies," she says.

Team USA took home the gold after playing teams worldwide, including Great Britain, France, Canada, New Zealand, Australia, Sweden and Denmark.

"I like having an activity for my dog and I to do together that we both enjoy," she says. "Oliver doesn't love to be around other dogs either, and nose work is one of the few dog sports that allows him to work without the stress of being close to other dogs."

Emily wishes more pet owners knew the fun that can be had as a family training furry family members together.

"People don't understand how great of a bonding activity it can be for the people and their dog," she says.

Emily and Oliver have also found an extended family by engaging in this activity.

"This bonding activity is also great because you get to be a part of a community of fellow dog lovers," she says.

Brothers Hunter and Henry Bagby play rugby at Urbandale High School. Their mom, Karla Rangel, enjoys watching them play.

"Seeing my boys play is one of my biggest proud moments, especially when they are on the same team," she says. "My greatest accomplishment as a mother is how they discipline and encourage each other."

Rugby is a fledgling sport in Iowa, and Karla and the other players' parents are trying to raise awareness about the sport. It's working. Hunter is now planning to continue to play rugby after he graduates.

One recent Friday, the team invited a bunch of neighbors and friends to watch the rugby games at Valley High School. Most community members who filled the stands had never been to a rugby game.

Hunter says he plays rugby because he finds it gripping.

"I like to play rugby because it is such an intense and thrilling sport," he says, adding that it is also a great workout. "The physicality and teamwork make it fun."

Rugy is also a game of strategy, teamwork and skill, Hunter says, adding he wants to put the minds of would-be players, fans and families at ease regarding the game's contactsport aspect.

"The safety precautions made by referees outweigh the dangers... Although the game's physicality may look bad, it doesn't hurt as badly as you think. It just comes down to the technique," he says. "Rugby combines the fast-paced gameplay from soccer, the physicality of football with the technique and mentality of wrestling."

Hunter is a high school senior who began playing rugby because he had heard about the sport from upper-class students. Henry, his younger brother, became interested in the game when Hunter started playing.

"My brother playing got me interested in the game," Henry says.

"It is a great sport that has brought me together with many other rugby players, and it's straightforward to fall in love with the skills



you'll pick up from rugby," he says.

"Come try rugby. It's a crazy adrenaline rush and a great way to stay fit. The discipline you get from it helps you in your life, too," Henry says.

"My favorite memories have been when my brother and I dominate the offense and the team comes together and works on strategies to improve and win the game," Hunter says.

On the ice

Sarah Kuhn Henderson often watches her husband, Todd, their son Aiden, 19, and their daughter Ainsley, 16, play ice hockey together. It's a passion for the entire family.

"Ice hockey combines the best parts of other sports into the greatest sport ever created, and we do it on ice. If you like hockey, you have joined a family of like-minded sports fans you can relate to and talk hockey forever," Todd says.

Like many sports, ice hockey's goal is to score more goals than the opposing team. But it is a game of strategy and strength.

"Hockey is so fast-paced that substitutions

are made without a stoppage of play," Todd

Todd was a long-time hockey fan before he ever participated in the sport. When a local ice rink opened, he decided to give it a try.

"Hockey has always been amazing to watch on television, especially live, but it is a game of opportunity. If you don't have a local ice rink, you don't have the opportunity to play," he says. "I started playing when I was 30 when some friends invited me to go with them to try it at the rink they had just put in. They loaned me skates and gear, and I was hooked on day one."

Todd and Sarah's oldest child, Aiden, started skating at a young age with Todd's help.

"Our son started in a parent-and-me skating class at age 4 and then learned to play in third grade," Todd says.

Aiden's first year of organized team play was in fifth grade. Now he will play for Drake University Club Hockey next year, where his dad, Todd, is the head coach.

Todd and Sarah's daughter, Ainsley, started skating in fourth grade. She has played in a women's novice hockey league and the Des

Moines High School Hockey League.

The Henderson family plays right in Urbandale.

"We are fortunate to have the Metro Ice Sports facility where we play two hours every Sunday night in the Mid-Iowa Beginners League (MIB), where I help coach and referee," says Todd.

The three play in local tournaments for Stanhope State University, "a mythical school for which our hockey team is named after," Todd says.

Todd encourages others to try hockey.

"Hockey is a sport you can play your whole life. In the MIB, we have people try hockey for the first time as young adults aged up to their 60s. It's a great group, and they all support each

GOING for it

Originally hailing from Urbandale, Run Wilson hopes to make waves in the music industry.



It was the summer of 2019. Local guitarist Max Yoder was asked to put a band together to perform at a music festival his church was putting together.

Why not, Yoder thought, so he contacted Luke Lilienthal first, for no other reason than he stood next to Yoder in their school choir at Urbandale High.

"We had 'jammed before' because we were really the only ones that played guitar when we were younger but never actually started a band," Yoder says.

Next up was Logan Ingraham.

"We knew that Logan played keys, so we cornered him in the lunchroom the next day and asked if he would play keys," Yoder says.

Yoder's friend Bella, who went to school in Ankeny, had friends Eli (Wilson) and Israel who played bass and drums respectively.

And Urban Crowns was born. The church show was rained out, unfortunately, but the fivesome continued, setting up a backyard show at Ingraham's house in Urbandale for all of their friends and family. Five months later, they were recording their first EP under the name Run Wilson. Reed Andrews was the new drummer, and things were beginning to take shape. Five years, a full album, some singles and another EP

later, the band is still going strong. They even have some road miles under their collective belts.

A 2021 national tour was completely booked independently, and the band was on the road for four weeks in a run-down van with a run-down trailer, circling the Midwest before making the trek northeast to New York City and Boston and then south to Atlanta before heading home. And just because it's Iowa doesn't mean the excitement was any less. In Ames, the band played a college party where people climbed onto roofs in order to catch a better view. Another time the band played a show in swim trunks at a pool party and took a dive into the water during a break between sets.

"Every show is memorable for its own reasons, whether good or bad," Yoder says. "We usually try to focus on the good though."

The band recently played their 60th show at xBk Live in Des Moines on May 11.

"It's an incredible feeling to be able to take the stage with so much support," Yoder says. "Nothing will ever compare to when the lights are flashing, the drums are booming behind you, and you're looking out on a crowd of dancing and jumping bodies enjoying the energy of your music."

One of Run Wilson's biggest fans is none

other than Urbandale High School Principal Tim Carver.

"Mr. Carver is like family to us, an honorary member of Run Wilson for sure," Yoder says. "Everyone besides Eli graduated from Urbandale, and we all graduated with Katie, Tim's daughter. Tim was always very involved in sporting events and choir, but we never expected him to support us so much outside of school. He would play our music through the hallways (rumor has it he still does) and wear our merch on casual Fridays. A Run Wilson show just isn't the same without Tim, and he always makes sure to shoot us a text when he can't make it. He never fails to let us know how proud he is that we're doing so well, and he really is just a genuine fan of our music."

Ideally, Yoder says, Nashville would be the band's hub, where they could look for a record deal or get support for more touring. Until then? Forward they go.

"We're in the writing/demo stages of another album, so there aren't any signs of stopping anytime soon," he says. "For me, music is my everything. There isn't a plan B. That's why I moved to Nashville to study songwriting at Belmont University. Eventually, we'd like to be playing Hinterland and 80/35. We have high hopes for where the journey will take us next."

For married couples, we often recommend a combination strategy. One spouse will take their benefit early, typically the one with the lower benefit, and the other spouse will defer their benefit — maybe until full retirement age, just

before or up to age 70. This strategy allows the couple to get some Social Security income right away in retirement and defer some for a higher income down the road and a higher survivorship benefit for the spouse who lives the longest.

That's just one strategy. There are many more. I have learned that small shifts can cascade into big outcomes in retirement planning, especially when it comes to electing Social Security. Instead of "let me know what you decide," your Social Security needs more time and attention, and so does your retirement. You spend a lot of time saving for retirement - spending some time planning is one of those shifts that can lead to big outcomes in retirement.

A FLEETING life

Even after officiating a number of funerals, I'm still surprised by how quickly life passes and how easily we are forgotten. The Psalmist grappled with these sobering realities in Psalm 39:4: "Lord, make me know my life's end, and what the number of my days is, so that I may know how frail I am."



Life's brevity and our fleeting memory prompted the Psalmist and us to focus on two life investments.

Our first priority is a life that continues. The Psalmist faced life's brevity with hope for the future by turning to the Lord. "My hope is in You. Deliver me from all my transgressions" (Psalm 39:7-8). Our transgressions separate us from God (Isaiah 59:2) and deserve His condemnation of eternal death (Romans 6:23). God provided our only rescue. We can escape certain eternal death and enter eternal life only through faith in Christ's sacrifice as the full payment for our rebellion (Romans 5:8). "He who believes in the Son has eternal life...and does not come into judgment, but has passed out of death and into life" (John 3:36; 5:24). Eternal life begins the moment we trust Christ for our salvation.

A life that continues makes possible a **life that counts.** The Psalmist observed the futility of pursuing what's fleeting: "Surely every man... makes an uproar for nothing; He amasses riches and does not know who will gather them" (Psalm 39:6). In contrast to a life where efforts evaporate is a life where efforts are eternal. Jesus admonished, "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust destroy...But lay up for yourselves treasure in heaven..." (Matthew 6:19-20). A life that counts prioritizes what matters to God. "But seek first His (God's) kingdom and His righteousness..." (Matthew 6:33). Paul shared some of God's priorities when he commanded that we should "pursue righteousness, godliness, love, faith, perseverance, and gentleness" (1 Timothy 6:11). He revealed the necessary perspective behind those practices when he wrote "... with all boldness Christ shall now, even as always be exalted in my body whether by life or death" (Philippians 1:20).

We exalt Christ by declaring His promise to others that "he who believes in Me shall live even if he dies" (John 11:25). We exalt Christ by demonstrating His priority of serving others selflessly and sacrificially (Mark 10:45). Missionary C.T. Studd aptly stated, "Only one life, twill soon be past, only what's done for Christ will last."

Are you investing only in what is fleeting or in what is forever? Remember, "All that is not eternal is eternally obsolete" (Jim Elliot). ■

STAY in control of your finances

We think about our financial capabilities as an important measure of independence, similar to our ability to drive or live alone. The thought of losing the ability to manage your finances is terrifying. Planning ahead will help you stay in control of your finances.

Second, make sure you have a valid financial power of attorney. A financial power of attorney gives someone the legal authority to make financial decisions for you if you cannot. The document is "durable" because it remains in effect even if you become incapacitated. You retain



the ability to change it or cancel it as long as you are still able to make decisions.


After signing a durable financial power of attorney, you can still manage your money as long as you have the ability to make decisions. Also, you always have the option to change who you want to act as your appointed representative and the individuals you allow to access your financial information.

Third, keep things up to date. Be sure that, if something changes, you keep your information as current as possible. Your trusted contacts may change over time. Keep your attorney and investment advisor informed of changes regarding who has authority to review your account or whom they should contact in case of an emergency.

Finally, speak up if something goes wrong. If you ever think someone is taking advantage of you, or that you've been the victim of a fraud, tell someone. The sooner you let someone know about it, the better chance there is of putting an end to it.





Plus, locally grown Michigan Asparagus adds an extra level of freshness requiring just about three days to travel from family farms in Michigan to your kitchen. It doesn't need a passport to make it from farm to table, and you won't need one either to enjoy this Italian-inspired dish in the comfort of home.


Creamy tomato smoked sausage and asparagus tortellini

Recipe courtesy of the Michigan Asparagus Advisory Board Servings: 6

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 pound smoked turkey sausage, sliced into bite-sized
- · 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 2/3 cups chicken broth
- 1 can (15 ounces) tomato sauce
- 3/4 cup heavy cream
- · 18 ounces cheese tortellini
- 1/2 pound fresh asparagus, trimmed and cut into bite-sized pieces



- In large rimmed skillet, heat olive oil over medium heat.
- Add sausage and brown on both sides. Add garlic and stir until golden, 20-30 seconds.
- · Add broth, tomato sauce, cream and tortellini; stir to combine. Bring to light simmer.
- Cover and simmer over low heat 10 minutes. Add asparagus during last 5 minutes of cooking until tortellini is tender and sauce has reduced.





GIRLS GROUP launched at Valerius Elementary

Building self-esteem and empowering girls to develop healthy relationships

This school year was the first time Valerius Elementary School has partnered with the Chrysalis Foundation to bring Girls Group to its fourth- and fifth-grade students. Courtney Davenport and Emily Battani facilitated the Girls Group while at Karen Acres Elementary School, and, when the two schools combined last fall, they decided to bring the program with them.

"A lot of girls in fourth and fifth grade start to develop lower selfesteem, care more about others' opinions, and have a hard time creating and maintaining positive relationships. Girls Group is able to teach these skills in a way that empowers girls to develop healthy relationships and prepare them for middle school," Battani says.

Because the number of participants doubled, the group was divided into two sections to better serve all the girls interested in participating. A total of 54 students are involved in Girls Group.

"I like best that we get to do a lot of learning about emotions and then get to do fun activities about it. I also liked learning about good versus toxic relationships, which I think will be beneficial for me for the future," Girls Group member Anna says.

"I liked getting to know new girls and having a place with people I can relate to," member Addison adds.

Girls Group is unique in that it facilitates social skills, STEAM, career and college readiness, and healthy relationship lessons alongside a snack and a craft. Another unique aspect of the club is GirlPower mentors. GirlPower mentors involved three high school girls from surrounding districts that mentored students and taught various topics.

"I love creating a space where girls this age can find community and have conversations about self-esteem, friendships, STEAM, hygiene, etc. in a safe space with other girls their age. They are able to gain new perspectives and form friendships with others they might not have outside of the group," Battani says.

Next school year, Girls Group is looking forward to adding new members and maintaining its attendance numbers. Members of the club will also visit Skateland this May. The field trip provides an opportunity for the girls to meet outside of school while practicing learned skills and engaging in physical activity.

"I strongly believe that the most important thing for girls to have when they leave Chrysalis After-School is confidence. Confidence in everything they do and confidence that they can carry with them for the rest of their lives," Davenport says. ■



EMPLOYEES give back to community

Company's VTO program promotes volunteerism.

April was National Volunteer Month, and April 20 was Volunteer Recognition Day. For The Stelter Company, an integrated marketing agency in Urbandale that partners with nonprofit clients throughout the country, volunteerism is integral to its business and company culture. While staff spend most of their work hours promoting the missions of their nonprofit clients through strategic marketing campaigns, employees have the opportunity to spend some of that time doing the good work of nonprofits themselves through Stelter's Volunteer Time Off (VTO) program. Staff can use up to eight hours of paid time off each year to volunteer in their communities.

"Giving back is really woven into the fabric of everything we do at Stelter. It's part of our DNA as a company," says Nathan Stelter, president. "In fact, it's one of our core values: We believe individual generosity can transform communities and the world. We embrace the

power of doing good, in our 9-to-5s and our daily lives.' Our VTO program reflects that

In 2023, Stelter employees spent 456 hours volunteering, helping more than 25 nonprofits. Seventy-two percent of staff participated in the program.

Estela Villanueva-Whitman, Stelter resource manager and co-chair of Stelter's DEI Community Impact Team, says making volunteering easy is the key to participation.

"We compile a directory of diverse volunteer options each year that staff can access on our intranet. Employees are encouraged to share their VTO experiences with photos and descriptions on the site so that colleagues can see what's being done, which helps inspire others to join in."

Stelter also sets aside time for specific activities that staff can participate in without using their VTO time. One example is the

Greater Des Moines Habitat for Humanity Women Build. Seventeen employees joined construction crews in 2023, helping build two houses and raising \$2,322 for their team, Stelter for Shelter. The company also devotes a half-day to community service at its annual all-company meetings in June. Villanueva-Whitman organizes a handful of opportunities that serve a cross-section of interests, needs and populations for staff to choose from. During the 2023 meeting, staff volunteered at ChildServe, Des Moines Area Religious Council (DMARC), The Des Moines Community Playhouse, Des Moines Parks and Recreation and Des Moines Refugee Support.

Monday, May 6: Council Meeting

The Mayor and City Council met on Monday, May 6, and began with three proclamations recognizing Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander Heritage Month; Police Week; and Building Safety Month.

The Council also approved signing a letter of support requesting an increase in the membership of the Dallas County Board of Supervisors. Currently, the Dallas County Board of Supervisors consists of three

elected members. Increasing the membership of the Dallas County Board of Supervisors to five would provide better representation for all Dallas County residents. Dallas County is the fastest growing county in the State of Iowa and one of the fastest growing in the United States.

The City took a significant step towards sustainability with the completion of the installation of 450 solar panels on top of the Parks & Public Works Maintenance Facility. The Council accepted the new photovoltaic array as constructed and authorized final payment to the contractor. The total cost of the project was about \$500.000.

The City Council approved renaming South Karen Acres Park to Rick Boals Park in acknowledgment of his service and dedication to Urbandale. Mr. Boals served as Urbandale's Director of Parks and Recreation from 1974 to 2005 and recently passed away in January 2024. Rick's key contributions during his tenure included the development of more than 40 parks, 33 miles of trails, 790 acres of parkland, and recreation facilities throughout the city.

The City Council approved purchasing four acres of blighted land at the southwest corner of 100th Street and Douglas Avenue for \$2,500,000. The property remains in a deteriorated condition due to poor grading and upkeep. Ultimately, this purchase will allow the City to guide future development in this area, given its prominent location along the Douglas Avenue corridor.

The City Council will meet again on Tuesday, May 14.
