



Celebrate Bondurant adds to the summer fun!

It's that time of year. Community celebrations abound with the start of summer — and Bondurant is no different. Bondurant Summerfest and Celebrate Bondurant are right around the corner, along with all the other fun the season brings.

While many community celebrations today share some features, such as food trucks, parades, carnivals, live music and more, each is still unique, with its own flare and flavor. Bondurant residents understand what makes the town oneof-a-kind, and Summerfest and Celebrate Bondurant are ways to extend a welcome to neighbors and visitors.

This year's Bondurant Summerfest will be extra memorable as it is celebrating a milestone — its 50th anniversary — June 10-11.

The Bondurant Men's Club has nurtured Summerfest, a beloved tradition, since its inception. This annual celebration has grown over the years, yet it has stayed true to its original purpose to unite the community and extend a warm invitation to others to join in the festivities.

These quintessential celebrations are a testament to the community's pride and unity, as well as a big part of how Bondurant thrives, so mark your calendars and don't miss out on the fun as summer gets into full swing.

#### Summerfest returns for 50th year

Bondurant Summerfest, a two-day annual event held by the Bondurant Men's Club, will be Monday and Tuesday, June 10-11. The event kicks off Monday evening at 6 p.m. with festival fun until 10 p.m.

The festival is a fundraising initiative that gives back to the community starting the day of the event, with free entertainment, and continues to give back throughout the year. Proceeds allow the Bondurant Men's Club to donate to causes such as the library, youth sports, community projects, school and community programs.

"Since 2023, Bondurant Men's Club has given back to the community over \$37,000. We are very proud of our community and being able to support the many activities and programs," Jeff Cook, secretary of the

Bondurant Men's Club, says.

Summerfest draws thousands of people to the heart of Bondurant, creating excitement, a sense of community and pride. Attendees spend time with neighbors, friends and families.

"It's a time to showcase Bondurant's vibrant community to the many visitors of the event," Cook says.

Highlights of this family-friendly event include a parade, food, games, carnival, silent auction, raffle, entertainment, vendors, community



businesses and organizations, fireworks and more from 6-10 p.m. each of the two days.

Bruce Cordes has been a Men's Club member since 1987. He explains that the event has been held on Mondays and Tuesdays because residents tend to be busier during the weekends with various summer activities. Holding the event at the beginning of the week has historically been successful for the festival.

For 37 years, Cordes has planned this event alongside other volunteers like him. Recently, new members have joined who are ready to contribute.

"They are young, and they have fresh ideas. Then they get in there and are ready to work and help," Cordes says.

When Cordes started in the Men's Club, there were only five or so rides for kids. Now, there are three times as many, including adult rides.

"We have some rides that are also at the state fair. So, there's a good variety and fun rides for everyone," Cordes says.

Cook enjoys seeing the impact the event's planning and hosting have on the community.

"It's all about seeing the smiles," he says.

Cordes and Cook agree that the Bondurant Men's Club is a great way to network with Bondurant's leadership. They are looking forward to continuing this celebration with the existing help and any new volunteers who want to come along.

The Bondurant Men's Club works throughout the year to provide community events centered around the needs of residents with a particular emphasis on events for children and their families.

"Being a part of the Men's Club is a great way to give back to the community. The festival allows us to give back with our Easter Egg Hunt and our Breakfast with Santa," Cook says. The Breakfast with Santa event served 288 adults and 182 children.

New this year will be live entertainment on stage and a pie-eating contest for kids and adults.

"People just love to sit around and visit with neighbors because it always feels like a big block party, except with a couple thousand people," Cordes says.

The Bondurant Men's Club booked two bands this year; David Watson will play Monday 8-10 p.m., and The Sons of Gladys Kravitz will

play Tuesday, 7-10 p.m. There will be a pieeating contest, hosted by Home Slice Handmade Pies, on Monday from 7-8 p.m.

"It's a safe, fun, family-friendly event with a variety of food and entertainment," Cordes says. "Standing back and seeing all the work pay off at the end of the year inspires me and makes me happy. I look forward to seeing everyone visiting with old friends and making new friends. There's



a lot of networking going on."

Returning events like the parade, carnival and fireworks are crowd favorites.

"The silent auction will have approximately 20 items to bid on, and the raffle will include close to 50 prizes," he says.

It takes a lot to put on this annual festival. The Bondurant Men's Club has 20 volunteer club members who start most of the Summerfest planning in January by working with vendors to secure the dates and contracts.

For Cordes, the best part of being involved with Summerfest is seeing all the community members gather.

"Our community partners include the City of Bondurant, Bondurant Fire Department, Polk County Sheriff's Office, Bondurant Chamber of Commerce, BrickHouse Fitness, and all the generous donations and support from local businesses," Cordes says.

Several businesses will provide products and information in the Bondurant Trailhead vendor area and at different locations throughout the carnival. Tables and chairs will be set up for all family members to enjoy the event.

The Bondurant Men's Club would like to

thank the City of Bondurant and its staff, the Bondurant Fire Department and Emergency Services, and the businesses and people who help support this event.

"We couldn't do this event without all the incredible support," Cordes says.

"Of course, the carnival rides and games are a big part of the event. Additional activities include a parade, fireworks, kids' tractor pull, balloon artist, face painting, stilt walker, little princesses, Cubbie Bear, Bluejay and Crash mascots," Cook says.

Carnival ride wristband vouchers are available at BrickHouse Fitness for an advance price of \$20. These were popular last year and replace the former carnival tickets. These vouchers are turned in for wristbands at the event and provide unlimited rides for one night.

Bondurant Men's Club will also sell wristband vouchers during the parade for \$20. After the parade, wristbands will be available at the carnival ticket stand for \$25 each.

Summerfest will culminate with a fireworks display on Tuesday evening around 10 p.m. One of the best viewing areas will be at the Bondurant Farrar Middle School in the bleacher area at the old football field.

from 3-6 p.m. This year, it will host friendly competitions and food samplings. The event brings back live music and adds a new twist.

"We have added a new aspect this year. The Celebrate Bondurant Showdown will incorporate friendly competitions between kids and adults," Julie Sillanpaa, a member of the Events Committee for the Bondurant Chamber of Commerce, says.

Andy "Danger" VonAhnen will entertain participants during the friendly competitions, emceeing the Power Wheels races, push-up contests, food-eating contests, obstacle course races and more.

"We will also have Nick Sinclair playing live music at the back end of the event. There is also a deadlifting contest starting at noon that day, which will lead into the event," Sillanpaa says.

This event will surely be an action-packed day filled with friendly competitions, live entertainment, delicious food and drinks, and a strong sense of community. Participants can sign up through the event page on the Celebrate Bondurant Facebook page: https://forms.gle/ ntueY5oTs7Akq4ar9.

Also new this year, Sillanpaa says booths will have samples to share.

"Each booth present is asked to have a sample to share with visitors at their booth. Visit the booth for a 'Taste of Bondurant,' " she says.

This event is free, so bring your family and friends and join the Bondurant Chamber and your favorite local businesses for a fun day.

It takes a lot of volunteers and business community partners to put on the celebration each year.

"We will have an obstacle course bounce house, materials for the contests, sound equipment and tents," Sillanpaa says.

Sillanpaa shares that more volunteers are needed to make this event a success.

"We are also seeking community partners to help raise the funds needed to incorporate the different events, such as purchasing the Power Wheels, obstacle course, and other contest materials."

The Chamber is offering opportunities to local businesses in this outdoor event to showcase their goods and services to residents and visitors to the event.

"Businesses can set up a booth for your business," she says. "Incorporate a treat — food or drinks — to share or an interactive game for the attendees to enjoy." Sillanpaa also explains that there are many sponsorship levels.

"If your business wants to be a sponsor to help make this event a success, we have multiple sponsor opportunities available," she says.

Sillanpaa has been on the Events Committee for the Bondurant Chamber for five years. She and her husband, Matt, run BrickHouse Fitness. Sillanpaa also plans community events for BrickHouse Fitness and the Mary Bump Memorial Foundation.

"As a local businessperson, I feel that being a part of planning the Chamber events will give me a chance to meet new people and become familiar with the Bondurant businesses," she says. "Interconnections between businesses and other people who want to see the Bondurant Community thrive is a fulfilling experience and one I am proud to be a part of."

Sillanpaa reminds community members of another upcoming event exclusive to Bondurant: the Bondurant Battle of the Bands, coming up after the Celebrate Bondurant Showdown and Bondurant Summerfest.

"The event is June 22, put on by the Mary Bump Memorial Foundation, a local nonprofit, and this will be our 11th year for the event."

#### **FIRE PITS 101**

Get ready for summer fun! As the warmer weather approaches, it's time to dust off the BBQs, plan pool parties, and perhaps even enjoy bonfires. We've received inquiries at City Hall about recreational fires and their permissibility. Here's the scoop: recreational fires are allowed, but only in fire pits that have open air below. Remember, no burning leaves or rubbish material, and always keep the fire contained. Dried wood logs are permitted for burning. For more detailed guidelines, please visit the City's website. Let's make this summer safe and enjoyable for everyone!

#### **CITY PARK UPDATE**

Unfortunately, the progress on the playground project at City Park has been impacted by recent rain events, causing delays in the construction schedule. The contractor is currently focusing on the rough grading package due to challenges in achieving final grades and required compaction. To install the playground and surrounding resilient surface, several layers of stabilization and construction are necessary, including rough grading, drainage tile installation, and the installation of vertical playground supports. Additionally, the construction of perimeter retaining walls requires a stable subgrade, further complicating the process. Despite misconceptions about the duration of underground infrastructure work, it is crucial for ensuring the project's long-term success. We appreciate your understanding as we work diligently to overcome these challenges and create a safe and enjoyable park space for our community.

## **CARLSON** runs for Visionary of the Year

All funds raised go to the Iowa Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

Justin Carlson became involved with the Iowa Leukemia and Lymphoma Society (LLS) last year when he joined his friend, Bryce Colston's, fundraising team for the 2023 Visionary of the Year competition.

"At first I joined to help a friend and because I appreciate community involvement," Carlson shares. "As my wife, Stephanie, and I got closer to the cause, we learned more about the impact of blood cancers and the connections we had that had been impacted by it, and so our 'why' has grown deeper over time. It's something we've both come to care deeply about."

Because of this commitment, Carlson is running for the 2024 Visionary of the Year. This 10-week philanthropic competition between candidates is ultimately a vehicle to bring people together to create time-oriented fundraising goals among each small team. The 2024 competition kicked off on March 22 and wraps up on June 1. All funds raised goes directly to cancer patients and their families in Iowa, as well as to blood cancer research.

"The competition aspect does add some fun to the work of fundraising, but it's really all about helping people who have been impacted by blood cancers," Carlson says.







# **PHYSICAL** therapy and dizziness

When people think of dizziness, they often think of the term "vertigo." Vertigo is the illusion of movement when there is no movement. Vertigo is a symptom of, typically, a condition affecting the inner ear or brain. Most people are familiar with "crystals" or "rocks" in their ears causing this. Aaron Antonovsky was the first scholar to describe health as a continuum existing between the extremes of total absence of health and total health. Antonovsky and his contemporaries argued that the more a person comprehends the world around them, assigns meaning to experiences, and can manage stressful events, the better health he or she will express.

Humans are designed for self-healing and self-regulating — for living in a state of health that inherently prevents illness as opposed to treating disease. According to Super et al, "Sense of coherence reflects a coping capacity of people to deal with everyday life stressors." As an individual's capacity to cope with life stressors improves, so does health. Therefore, improving sense of coherence decreases the likelihood of poor lifestyle choices, health disease occurrence and mortality risk, while improving mental health and quality of life.

Chiropractic fits into Antonovsky's idea of health because chiropractic promotes adaptability, rather than the treatment of disease. Wellness chiropractors recognize that physical, chemical and emotional stressors exist in our world and that these stressors affect the individual's ability to adapt to their environment and diminish their ability to make healthy decisions. A neurological evaluation of a patient's adaptability and stress patterns identify how chiropractic care can help restore a healthy nervous system that is prepared to adapt and respond to environmental stressors. Wellness chiropractors serve patients primarily through chiropractic adjustments to clear the nervous system. ## **OPTIONS** for straightening teeth

One common question discussed among patients and dental professionals is, "What are my options to make my teeth straight?" Most options to straighten teeth are about braces and clear trays. Braces are bonded onto teeth in specific spots, with wires laced through to assist in moving the teeth. Monthly visits to the dental office with adjustments of brackets, wires and chains help make the process easier, quicker and more efficient. Clear trays are



completed in a series of multiple trays changed out every two to three weeks. Before the first tray, filling material is placed on teeth so the trays can snap and stay in the mouth. The trays are then removed while eating but worn the rest of the day. After the braces process is complete, wearing a retainer for top and bottom teeth is most important. In the future, teeth have a tendency to move back to their original position before braces when the retainer is not worn. Benefits of doing braces, other than a confident smile, are easier oral care of brushing and flossing, occlusion of the teeth coming together, correction of overbite of the front teeth, and decreased tooth pain caused from misaligned teeth. If you have any questions about what you can do to correct misaligned teeth, discuss with your dentist the options they would recommend for you.

If you have ever tried to lose weight, whether it was 10 pounds or 100-plus pounds, you know what a mind game it can be. Today's health and wellness industry is full of information and advice, and what is right today seems to be wrong tomorrow. You also may have found that losing weight is the easy part, but sustaining the weight loss is a different story. We all know how to drop a few pounds before a vacation, but keeping that weight off proves to be a challenge.



Weight loss medications have been around for decades. From amphetamines to antidepressants to thermogenic drugs and now peptides, medications have continued to evolve through science. While a healthy diet, exercise and adequate sleep remain the staple of a well-rounded weight loss program, sometimes it's just not enough.

Glucogon-Like-Peptide-1 (GLP-1) agonists have taken center stage in the medical weight loss industry. You've likely already heard of Ozempic and Wegovy (semaglutide). These medications work by increasing insulin production and slowing gastric emptying to prolong the feeling of fullness and significantly reducing food cravings. In addition to weight loss, these medications are showing other promising health benefits. The FDA recently approved Wegovy (semaglutide) for use to reduce the risk of cardiovascular death, heart attack and stroke in either obese or overweight individuals.

GLP-1 agonists have become widely available, but use caution in selecting a provider. Safe prescribing should include a consultation with a medical provider, proper baseline lab work, and routine monitoring for efficacy and side effects.
