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This year's event offers familiar features and new offerings. Art is the main attraction, yet the festival also includes food and beverage trucks and live music throughout the day. New this year is a fitness aspect with yoga and the Waukee Fine Arts Footrace — a 5K timed run.

All artists are required to set up Friday evening. Previously, artists had the option to set up Saturdays. In addition, the City of Waukee is working to bring more public art to the city. The Waukee Parks and Rec is providing park benches for artists, who will be painting the benches live throughout the weekend.

"Waukee wants to build more permanent art structures and incorporate more art throughout the city," Hoffmann says.

The art show is juried and judges award cash prizes, including \$500 for first place, \$300 for second place and \$200 for third place.

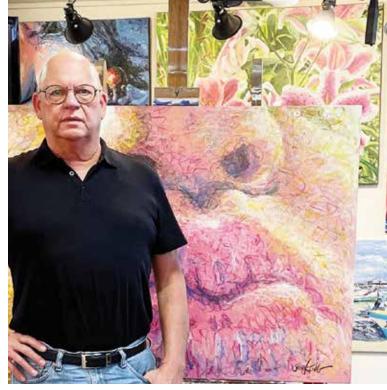
A majority of the artists are from Iowa and neighboring states. A full spectrum of artwork offers items such as fine art, pottery, jewelry, photography, sculptures, glass and more.

"Lots of artists say it's their favorite event, and they like to come back each year," Hoffmann says.

Art lovers become repeat customers as well, and the festival price range is affordable.

"You can get a \$2,000 or a \$30 item and anything in between that price range," she says.

The family-friendly event offers a student exhibit, crafts, yoga, kite building and more. In addition, the festival awards high school scholarships to those choosing a creative field. This year's scholarship winners are Mia Hilton and Andrew Wittmer.

#### **Waukee Fine Arts Footrace**

Since Griffin Hoffmann has helped his wife, Jenn, with the Waukee Arts Festival over the years, he contemplated how to attract more people to the festival. As an avid fitness supporter, he and race committee members Alexandra Thiel and Collin Connett created a new event, the Waukee Fine Arts Footrace 5K.

The race takes place Saturday, July 20 in the morning. It's a 5K timed event, which starts at Centennial Park. The route travels along portions of the Sugar Creek Trail and through various Waukee neighborhoods. Registration costs \$40 and includes a T-shirt and a medal. A free kids fun run is also offered after the event, sponsored by Hy-Vee Fit Kids.

Remaining funds from the race registration

fees go toward the arts festival.

"Any proceeds left over go back into the Waukee Arts Festival. It helps fund the festival to continue to offer free entertainment and bigger bands," Griffin says.

As a sports enthusiast, Griffin took up running for more cardio activity. He and his marathon runner friends said Waukee used to offer races.

"In the past, Waukee had them, but they have fallen off the face of the map. We talked with the Waukee Parks and Rec, who supported the idea," he says.

Griffin hopes the race will be an annual event.

"We're excited to have partnerships with the art festival and bring in different demographics. We'll have the whole thing covered for folks in Waukee. Start out with a run. Lunch at the festival. Shop for art and then listen to a band," he says.

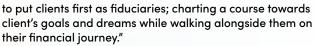

Along with his artwork, he's also an avid photographer and gardener. He takes professional pictures for composition in his paintings. His

backyard garden consists of dozens of colorful flowers, a perfect backdrop for his artwork.

As an art teacher, he was required to learn different types of artwork to teach to his students. He's taught drawing, painting, graphic design, digital imaging, film photography, art history, ceramics and sculpture. After becoming proficient in pottery, he eventually purchased a wheel and a kiln. The pottery started stacking up, so he decided to sell it. Kling is among a small group of artists who create in more than one art medium.

Before he begins a painting, he often selects a series of paintings. During the pandemic, when he couldn't paint live models, he took photos from his garden and painted flowers. A find from a grocery store landed a series of paintings of fresh produce.

As a longtime Indianola resident, he's painted hot air balloons from the National Balloon Classic each year. His latest journey is taking photos of the prints and putting them in a new book of balloon paintings.

"It's a type of book that you can take out

the pictures if you want to frame them," he explains.

His most recent art series was inspired after visiting France and Giverny, where Claude Monet painted his famous water garden scenes.

As he likes old cars, a shiny car shows a reflection of the Sistine Chapel scene of God creating Adam.

"I've really wanted to do that for a long time," he says.

In fact, he's known he wanted to be an artist since he was a kid.

"I talked with my classmates after high school, and they said, 'You actually did do what you said you'd do,' " he says.

Kling is busy in his community. He serves on the board at Bravo Greater Des Moines, a nonprofit dedicated to raising funds for Central Iowa art, science and cultural organizations. He wrote a newspaper column for 29 years at the Indianola Record Herald. He's president of the Indianola Public Arts Commission.

"Public art is so important. The city surveys residents, and art is the top thing people want. It's an economic driver for a community, and

# **EARLY** retirement strategies

#### Reasons to leave the workforce early

Time is the most valuable resource we have. We sit down with families and individuals who say this is becoming clearer as they age. They tell us that work isn't fulfilling the same purpose it once did, and they are ready to retire.

Here are some health care options if you retire before Medicare eligibility. Some companies offer extended health care as part of retirement packages. If your spouse is still working, consider getting on their plan. There's also COBRA, a continuation (generally up to 18 months) of health care after leaving employment. You will be responsible for the full cost of the insurance premium, including the part your employer was previously paying. There's also the open market or income-based Affordable Care Act, or Obamacare.

#### 4. You understand penalties

The U.S. government generally charges a 10%

penalty on the taxable portion of IRA or 401(k) distributions before age 59 ½, with a few exceptions. If you separate from your employer in or after the year you turn 55, the 10% tax on early 401(k) distributions does not apply.

#### 5. You have a plan

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# **PREPARE** for 'diminished financial capacity'

We think about our financial capabilities as an important measure of independence, similar to our ability to drive or live alone. The thought of losing the ability to manage your finances is terrifying. Planning



ahead will help you stay in control of your finances.

"Diminished financial capacity" is the decline in a person's ability to manage money. When people of any age lose the capability to manage their finances, they may also become more vulnerable to fraud and other forms of financial abuse.

Taking the steps listed below will help avoid or minimize problems for you and your family:

First, organize and store important documents in a secure, easily-accessible location. That way, they are readily available in an emergency. Give copies to trusted family members or let them know where to find the documents.

Second, make sure you have a valid financial power of attorney. A financial power of attorney gives someone the legal authority to make financial decisions for you if you cannot. The document is "durable" because it remains in effect even if you become incapacitated. You retain the ability to change it or cancel it as long as you are still able to make decisions.

After signing a durable financial power of attorney, you can still manage your money as long as you have the ability to make decisions. Also, you always have the option to change who you want to act as your appointed representative and the individuals you allow to access your financial information.

Third, keep things up to date. Be sure that, if something changes, you keep your

information as current as possible. Your trusted contacts may change over time. Keep your attorney and investment advisor informed of changes regarding who has authority to review your account or whom they should contact in case of an emergency.

Finally, speak up if something goes wrong. If you ever think someone is taking advantage of you, or that you've been the victim of a fraud, tell someone. The sooner you let someone know about it, the better chance there is of putting an end to it.

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# **PACK** masters

#### Braziels volunteer at Meals from the Heartland

When Phil Braziel retired from his job in 2017, he visited with his daughter in the U.K. and mentioned that, with his new-found free time, he wanted to give back. He researched various nonprofits and found Meals from the Heartland.



Meals from the Heartland is dedicated to feeding hungry people in Iowa, across the U.S. and globally. Food is packaged onsite by volunteers, and each package includes six servings. Since 2008, Meals from the Heartland has packaged 230 million meals.

Phil soon began packaging meals at the West Des Moines location. Shortly after he began volunteering, he was asked to be a "pack master." In this role, he assists volunteer groups of eight to 10 people. He explains about the Meals from the Heartland mission and shows participants how to package the meals, assisting as needed.

"I help with bottle necks. Our goal is to be as efficient as possible and package as many meals as we can in the two-hour shift," he explains.

The "hearty pack" meals include rice, soy, protein powder and veggies. The "taco mac" includes noodles and taco seasonings, often distributed to people in the U.S.

Phil's wife, Sandy, retired a few years after Phil and joined in

volunteering as a pack master. In addition, she helps with outdoor work around the property, including weeding, trimming bushes and more.

"I do things that they don't spend money on," explains Sandy.

Sandy and Phil also help with remote meal packaging events, held a places such as the Lutheran Church of Hope and downtown at Veteran's

The pair work two to three shifts a week, depending on need. Since they're flexible with their time, they check to see which slots need filled with volunteers.

"We tend to float and volunteer more in the wintertime, when we have kids coming in for silver cord hours or companies come in," he says.

In addition, Phil also volunteers for Valley Disaster Relief, a nonprofit that helps people in need cut down trees or limbs. Phil says the folks they help out are grateful.

"It's unique. We arrive with chainsaws and trucks. Some folks are told by the city they need to cut trees and can't afford it. They are so thankful for the help. We did 17 jobs recently when a storm came through Pleasant Hill."

The couple likes staying physically active through volunteering. They also enjoy the social aspect of volunteering with "like-minded" people who have become good friends.

"We've been blessed," says Sandy. "When you try to be a blessing, you get blessed. It's rewarding to help people."

Phil says he's healthy, blessed and happy to help.

"It's just time. What else would you do except sit around?" Phil says. "What you give in, you get back."

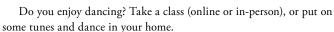

Do you prefer being in nature? Go for a walk or run on a trail. Gardening is also a great way to be active outside.



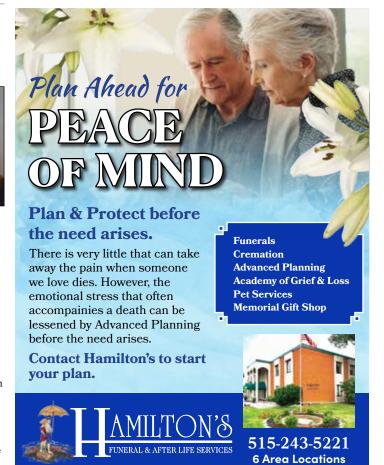
Do you want to take it easy on your joints? Try swimming, water aerobics, chair yoga, or stretch classes.

# **AUTO** classes introduce careers

APEX, Stivers partner to teach about the automotive industry.

Waukee APEX (Aspiring Professional Experience) is a learning hub for junior and senior high school students who take classes providing real-life work experience and career exploration. With five economic sectors offering 17 classes, instructors researched an automotive program and thought the class would be ideal.

However, the APEX Waukee Innovation and Learning Center lacked space. Plus, having an automotive bay would be too expensive to implement the program on location.

As an alternative, the school has partnered with Stivers Ford Lincoln in Waukee. Students are taught onsite at Stivers with the instructor, Al Pieper, a former auto instructor from DMACC.

Michelle Hill, supervisor and director for the workplace learning program at Waukee APEX, says the class has been popular.

"We thought we'd get about 10 students to start with. Now the class has doubled to 20 per semester," she says.

Students who are juniors or seniors in any Waukee High School, as well as metro high schools, are eligible to take the class. Students receive elective high school credits. If they complete the program, they can obtain a Ford ACE (Automotive Career Exploration) Certification.

After the ACE certification, students can continue on to the Ford Asset program and attend further training at another learning institute, such as DMACC.

Students who take the class learn a variety of auto-related skills. They are taught skills related to auto maintenance, technical, service and parts — every aspect of a service auto bay. They also learn about sales and financing new vehicles. At Stivers, they work on police vehicles as well.

Off-site tours to other car-related businesses help students make informed decisions if they wish to pursue the auto field after high school.

Hill says the students have embraced and found the course useful.

"The feedback from the students has been

valuable. If they don't go into the automotive field, at least they've gained more knowledge about their own cars," she says.

Waukee APEX offers a "signing day" for seniors in different educational programs. As a result, several students have chosen the automative trade industry for after high school.

"It's a great opportunity to learn before they choose a career and spend time and money on tuition," Hill explains.

Additionally, Hill says Stivers has been accommodating and helpful for the students. "It's a really great partnership. We looked at training and thought auto would be too costly," she reflects. "We help kids connect with other business partners, which has been valuable to the students."

The community has embraced Waukee APEX and its quest to provide real-world skills for their students.

"We have some really great partnerships with the community who are teaching our students professional skills to take them past high school." ■

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# **DON'T WANT** senior living?

That's a great choice — but plan ahead.

So, if you aren't able to live at home, and you

don't want to move into a community for people 55 and older, what can you do? Great news: Some organizations that serve older adults have come up with some new options — Continuing Care at Home (CC@H) programs designed to help people proactively focus on their health at home while enabling them to financially plan for potential services and care down the road.

If you're evaluating a CC@H program, consider asking these starter questions to make sure its premises, amenities and outcomes will be the best ones for you.

- Do you fully understand the program and what it offers you at the current time? The primary advantages of a good CC@H program are twofold: Not only will it offer services and amenities to enhance your wellbeing so you can remain independent longer, but it will also help fund future long-term care needs.
- Does it provide personal support? Studies tell us people who embark on any kind of lifealtering program or activity, such as a nutrition or exercise regimen, will be exponentially more successful with encouragement from a trusted adviser or advocate (think personal trainer, life

coach, etc.). A program that provides you with a written guide but no personal interaction may not be setting you up for success.

• What will your care options be? A solid program will help fund your care, if it's needed, whether through home healthcare or services in a senior living community later. If the program you're considering does offer both, make sure you're comfortable with the services and care provided by the organization's home healthcare team as well as in its communities. A reputable provider will have longevity behind it.

The ability to consider a variety of options is great — but if you're thinking about becoming part of a CC@H program, make sure it fits your current and future needs. Your health, wellbeing, and checkbook will thank you for it. ■

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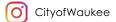


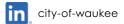

# **LASER** use in dentistry

Are you someone who frequently gets canker sores? Canker sores, or aphthous ulcers, can occur for a variety of reasons: food sensitivities, mouth wash/ toothpaste containing sodium lauryl sulfate, hormone shifts or even emotional stress. 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# A FAMILY space

### Louschers work out while kids climb the wall — literally.

After spending a long day cooped up in an office or classroom, both adults and kids have energy to burn. However, their methods for burning that energy are hardly alike. Two-year-olds are not training for marathons and playgrounds are not suitable for those taller than 4 feet. But, what if there was a place for parents to exercise and kids to play? Three months ago, Waukee's Louscher family

"Our kids are usually down here while we're working out, so we wanted them to have something to do," said

Despite the uniqueness of the project, its design is quite simple. Plywood covers one of the walls in the basement. Rock climbing holds of varying shapes, sizes and colors are scattered and screwed in from floor to ceiling. To the side is a wooden ladder scaling the entire wall. At the top, a few rungs extend out, creating a small set of monkey bars. On the ground below sits a large blue mat, there to soften every slip, fall or tumble.

The Louschers' inspiration primarily came from social media. After a few ideas were bounced around, they determined a rock-climbing wall would be the best fit. When it came time to pick somebody for the job, they went with someone local who was not afraid of a challenge: Cody Bailey Construction & Remodel.

"I feel like you can take any idea to Cody, and he can make it come to life," Kate says. "It was fun to work with someone who was willing to try new things with us. I think this was the first one."

The installation only took a day. Kate still remembers how excited her 2-year-old daughter, Louise, was the first time she saw the wall. She immediately ran up and started climbing the ladder. Similarly, Jack, their 10-month-old son will grab onto the wall's holds on his own. While neither of them can make it to the top by themselves, they have years to develop their skills.

"Louise is getting better," Kate says. "I feel like she gets farther up every time that she does it."

Louise even brings her skills with her to the park. Learning to climb the ladder in the basement means she is much more confident climbing the ones outside.

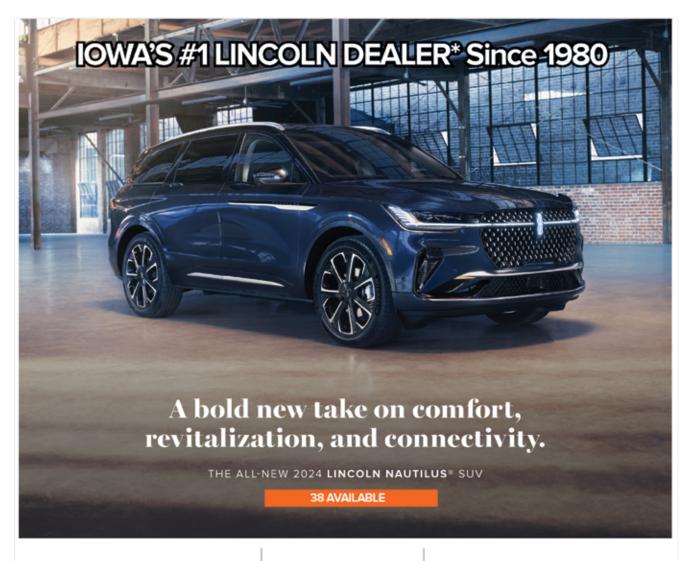
Friends and family are big fans of the wall, too. Several kids ranging in age from 2 to 8 have made use of the space.

Prep time: 5 minutes Cook time: 20 minutes

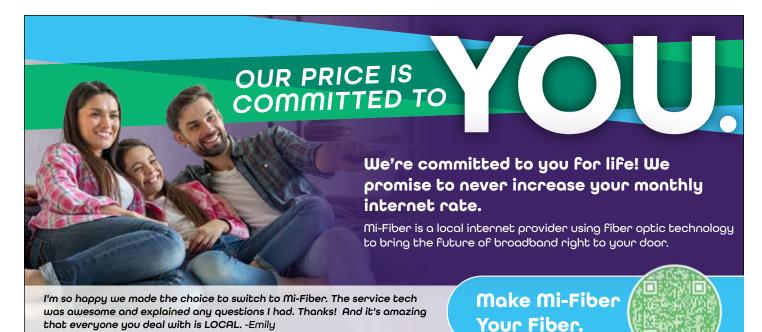
Servings: 4

- · 12 large shrimp, peeled and deveined

- · 3 tablespoons fresh thyme, chopped
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- · salt, to taste
- · pepper, to taste

- · In large, microwave-safe bowl, microwave potatoes on high 5 minutes.
- Chop broccoli into large pieces.

- Add lemon juice, thyme and olive oil; evenly coat potatoes, shrimp and broccoli. Season with salt and pepper, to taste.
- Build skewers and grill 10-15 minutes on medium-high heat, until shrimp is cooked through.





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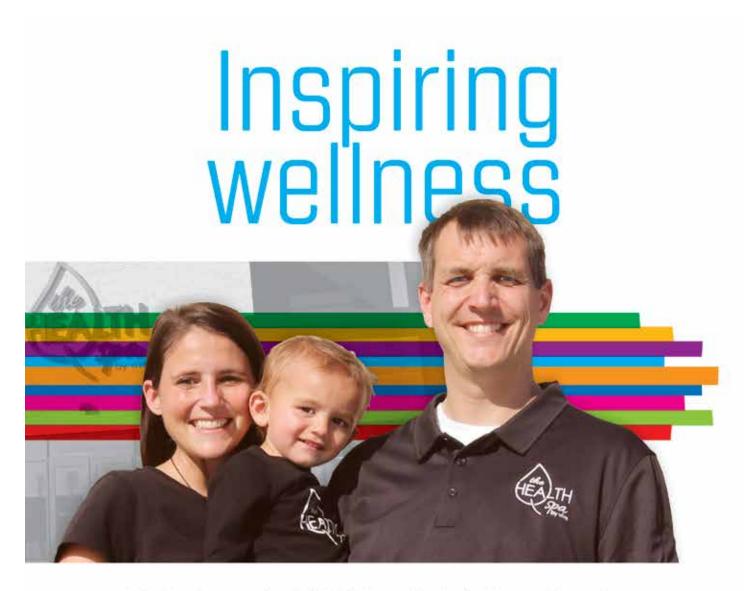
