

HOLIDAY FLAG PROJECT SUPPORTS LIONS CLUB VISION PROGRAM

Lions Club International is a world leader in promoting eye care and in the effort to prevent avoidable blindness. Over the years, the Adel Lions club has conducted an active vision program, and the community's support for the Holiday Flag Project provides the financial support to accomplish that goal. Within the organization, the Kids Sight coordinator and the vision coordinator have developed local partners to assist in identifying individuals with vision issues.

Working with the University of Iowa's Kid Sight program, the Adel club conducts free vision screenings at local daycares and preschools each year for kids ages 6 months to 5 years old. Good vision is essential to the learning process. Iowa law requires all students to be screened prior to entering school. Digital photographs of the children's eyes are sent to the University's Ophthalmology and Vision Sciences Department for



review. If a vision issue is identified by the ophthalmologists within the department, the parents are notified with medical recommendations. Each year, the Adel club screens 300 to 350 kids.

Working with the schools' nurses and local optometrists, individuals are referred to the club's vision coordinator, and a financial assistance request form is initiated.

The coordinator then approaches the individual to explain what assistance can be provided. Many older individuals have simply delayed eye care due to the total cost and limited insurance coverage. The typical cost of both an eye exam and new eyeglasses can range from \$300 to \$750 depending on frames and

WARNING LABELS ON SOCIAL MEDIA?

Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy has called on Congress to require warning labels on social media in a way similar to what is mandatory on cigarette boxes, and I support him on this one.

Keep in mind, I am not a fan of excessive government regulation. At the federal level alone, more than 70 federal regulatory agencies currently exist, employing hundreds of thousands of people to write and implement regulations. They issue 3,500 new rules every year, and the regulatory code now is more than 168,000 pages long. Do we need another one? In the case of social media, the answer is yes.

Think about it. Car seats and baby formula are regulated, and I still won't tear the tag off my pillow because it says I cannot do so "under penalty of law." Not everyone follows the rules, but many do. Warning consumers — including our youth — about the perils of social media will help, and we simply can't trust the big tech companies to regulate themselves.

Here is what Surgeon General Murthy stated in an advisory in 2023: "Children are exposed to harmful content on social media, ranging from violent and sexual content, to bullying and harassment. And, for too many children, social media use is compromising their sleep and valuable in-person time with family and friends. We are in the middle of a national youth mental health crisis, and I am concerned

that social media is an important

driver of that crisis — one that we

must urgently address."

And here is what he wrote recently in an opinion piece in The New York Times: "It is time to require a surgeon general's warning label on social media platforms, stating that social media is associated with significant mental health harms for adolescents. A surgeon general's warning label, which requires congressional action, would regularly remind parents

and adolescents that social media has not been proved safe. Evidence from tobacco studies show that warning labels can increase awareness and change behavior."

Social media is used by most all young people, with up to 95% of those 13-17 years old reporting using a social media platform and more than a third saying they use social media "almost constantly." Recent research shows that adolescents who spend more than three hours per day on social media (and they nearly all do) face double the risk of experiencing poor mental health outcomes, such as symptoms of depression and anxiety.

Will a warning label cure all the problems? No. But I have no doubt it will help.



CAESAR SALAD-INSPIRED TACOS

CHICKEN CAESAR TACOS

Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 20 minutes

Servings: 4

Ingredients:

- 3 eggs
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 packet taco seasoning
- · 2 chicken breasts, sliced in half horizontally
- 3 cups neutral oil
- 1 bag (9.4 ounces) Fresh Express Caesar Chopped Salad Kit

Directions:

In shallow bowl, beat eggs. In separate bowl, combine flour and half packet of taco seasoning.

Place chicken in resealable bag and, using meat tenderizer, pound to 1/4-inch thickness.

In medium saute pan, heat oil over medium heat. Season chicken breasts with remaining taco seasoning.

Coat chicken in flour mixture, dip into beaten eggs then coat chicken in flour mixture again, pressing firmly to adhere.

In pan with hot oil, cook battered chicken until golden brown, flipping halfway through, until chicken reaches minimum internal temperature of 165 F, 4-5



minutes per side (depending on thickness). Fry in batches to avoid overcrowding pan, if necessary.

Once fully cooked, fold chicken over to create taco shell shape. Place sheet pan on top to hold shape, 3-4 minutes.

In large bowl, combine lettuce, dressing, croutons and cheese from salad kit.

Once chicken taco shells set, carefully remove sheet pan. Fill each taco shell with prepared salad mixture.

To build sandwiches, place sliced pork on bottom halves of toasted buns. Top with prepared salad mixture and sauteed onions. Finish with top halves of buns.

the prescription lenses needed. This program applies to individuals of all ages in the community, with financial assistance based on need. Each year, the Adel Lions Club provides financial assistance to numerous individuals in the community.

In situations where individuals are identified with a form of binocular vision disorder, vision therapy may be an option. The human visual system is designed so that the eyes and the reciprocating muscles work together with such a high degree of precision that the two eyes perform as if they

were one. Lack of eye coordination can affect social and intellectual development. Vision therapy sessions are available in the local area, but typical fees run \$120 per session with 20-40 sessions needed depending on test results. A total fee in the \$3,500 to \$5,000 range is realistic. The Lions Club has helped with these sessions and is prepared for future requests. Once again, this program is available to individuals in the community based on financial need.
