


Gorgeous garden

Mark and Deb Gunhus have been working on their home in Grimes for the last 23 years. They built the house, choosing the lot for the creek that ran behind the property.

"It was an established farm field, so the creek behind us was way overgrown," Mark says. "It was like a jungle."

Despite the challenge with the overgrown creek banks, the Gunhuses saw potential. They asked the builders to save all the trees they could when they cleared the lot. What the builders saw as junk trees (ones that drop a lot of sticks, seeds or leaves), the Gunhuses knew would help hold the creek bank in place.

"We bought the property for the creek," Mark says. "But there was sod right up to the bank, and that wouldn't hold, so we needed to put something in right next to the bank — plants that have deeper roots," Deb

Mark is the creek whisperer, building bridge after bridge over it. He is currently constructing the seventh one.


"When we ordered wood this last time, the guy who brought it in asked if we were expanding the deck, and he was shocked when I told him it was for a bridge," Mark says. "Most people have no idea we have this back here in Grimes."



While Mark builds bridges, Deb does the planting. She is a member of the garden club in Waukee and enjoys creating a unique look amid the shade from the oaks and maples they planted.

"I work with what we have, which is a lot of shade," she says. "I tend to like the cottage look. I like coral bells

and hydrangeas, and I've had to learn how to take care of certain plants to make them bloom their best. Some of the plants like vinca vine and native grasses maintain the bank to help with erosion."

Deb focuses on perennials but fills in with annuals to add color. She trades plants with other garden club members to try new plants for free.

"I'm the accidental or experimental gardener," she says. "My mom didn't really do any gardening, but I always had an interest, so I had to seek out the knowledge on my own. Mark's mom was moving and had a lot of plants that I could take from the house, and that's how I got

The Gunhuses recommend those who have an interest in landscaping and gardening research what plants work well in Iowa. She advises to check the soil — especially with a new build. Much of the topsoil is removed, so planting right away might not work.

"Build up your beds and help your soil before you start," Deb says. "There are lots of local resources that can help."

Something new

Karla and Jim Corder moved into their new home in Grimes in 2021. Since it was a new build, it didn't come with any landscaping. The couple decided they wanted to add some curb appeal and make their corner lot look more welcoming.

"We had been driving around looking at houses everywhere to get ideas on what we liked, what would work best for us and meet our needs of having that curb appeal but still being low maintenance," Karla says.

They knew they wanted to add border, rock and plants around

the house's foundation. As time passed, they discovered areas where the home's new sod was struggling because of lack of water and sun. They figured the right landscaping would help fix those issues, with the benefit of taking up some more yard space and leaving less grass to mow.

The Corders wanted a plan that incorporated some greenery plants and bushes — that required little care. Low maintenance was a priority for them as neither claims to have a green thumb. They also wanted to maintain proper water flow, so downspouts were put under the landscaping with a pop-up emitter to allow the water to drain away from the home's foundation.

Their favorite plant is the Karl Foerster feather reed grass in front as it covers the blemishes on the concrete behind it. It is also hardy and easy to maintain. They also like the look of having different colors for the border bricks and the landscaping rock.

Karla says they are happy with the work that Herrick Outdoor Solutions did on the house.

"They were professional yet personable and very knowledgeable. Plus, we always love supporting local, family- and veteran-owned businesses, and they meet all three. They did everything, from the plans to getting the plants and materials we wanted, to taking away the old sod and cleaning up when finished."

Their advice for new landscapers is to do your research but don't get "analysis paralysis" either.

"Ultimately, move forward and get it done. You won't regret it," Karla says.

Curb appeal

Jeff and Jessica Gardner moved into their new home in October 2020. With three young kids — Gracie, 12; Bryson, 9; and Krew, 5 — they were looking to enhance the outside of their home but didn't have a lot of time to devote to maintenance.

"We wanted something simple that would match the style of our house, and, with the edging and rock that was chosen, we feel like Herrick Outdoor Solutions listened to what we were looking for and delivered," Jeff says.

Serves faith-based sober living organization

Volunteering and acts of service have been a strong thread in Beth Zimmerman's life since she was a child.



"I remember volunteering for numerous church events with my family growing up," she

says. "We were taught that, although we may not be able to give as much financially, we were abundantly blessed in time and talents that we could use to glorify God and help others."

Today, Zimmerman uses her time and talents to serve as the volunteer coordinator for TIM's CLUBe, which is a non-profit organization that provides faith-based sober living homes to men and women in the Des Moines area.

"We currently serve 24 residents in our five men's houses and four residents in our women's house," Zimmerman explains. "Many of our residents come to us from prison, jail or the streets in varying stages of recovery from their drug and alcohol addictions. They are desperately needing a safe place to call home where they can work on their relationship with God, their recovery and rebuilding their lives."

TIM's CLUBe also helps these individuals connect with community

resources, gain employment and study the Bible, as well as provides accountability in their recovery.

As the volunteer coordinator, Zimmerman screens volunteer applicants, assigns them to the volunteer team where their talents and experience can be the most helpful, leads volunteer training meetings and puts together the organization's quarterly newsletter. She also serves as a mentor in the women's house, providing guidance, support and accountability to the residents.

"When I volunteer and see how much it means to the TIM's CLUBe residents just to know that someone cares and hasn't given up on them, it makes my heart full," Zimmerman says. "These are people who have been through things that most of us can't even imagine, and they've put their family and friends through some really trying times, maybe even to the point of their families giving up on them. Playing a small part in showing them that God has not given up on them and that they can make it through this is the most beautiful gift that I am blessed with from this experience."

For Zimmerman, volunteering is just one way that she lives out her faith and serves God.

"There are so many people and organizations out there that need help, and we have all been blessed with gifts and talents," she says. "When you volunteer and see the impact that you're making in someone else's life, there's just no greater reward."



4 THINGS to know before investing in a pool

The city pool ordinance only applies to pools that can hold water at least 24 inches deep and that are "intended" for swimming, recreational bathing or wading. This does not apply to the portable plastic or blow-up kiddie pool, which is typically no more than 22 inches high, although you will want to be proactive to ensure no one accidentally drowns in there, either. However, some seasonal pools are higher than this, and, according to City Inspector Steve Tibbles, these are intended to be covered under the ordinance, although they may not technically meet the requirement of needing to be "constructed."

- 1. Presuming your pool does qualify under section 326.1, you must first obtain a permit. Along with your permit, you need a site plan showing where it will be in relationship to lot lines and other structures and how the design requirements meet the other provisions of the ordinance. You cannot put it anywhere you want.
- 2. Design materials must be light in color (why do they care), impervious to water (no comment), provide a tight tank with smooth, easily cleaned surface: no sand or dirt.
- 3. Fenced unless it is a hot tub with a locking cover or pool with a powered safety cover. The fencing rules are complicated and depend on whether you have an above-ground or in-ground pool.
- For in-ground pools, the fence must be at least 48 inches tall, measuring from the ground on the non-pool side of the fence.
- Where the pool is above-ground, in some cases, the pool wall can serve as the barrier if it is taller than 48 inches. If you build a deck, you will need to fence either the deck or the pool itself.

There are a plethora of rules on how large the spaces in the fence and/or gate can be, depending on where the opening is. If your yard fence meets the pool fence and gate requirements, then a separate fence at the pool is not

4. Gates must open away from the pool, be selfclosing and lockable. Ladder access not secured by a gate must also be rendered inaccessible.

If your residence is subject to a restrictive covenant that prohibits above-ground pools, then it does not matter whether the city allows you to have one or not. The restrictive covenant is enforceable. More on that next month.





Collin Lane, head coach of the boys since 2018, has also had a strong

team. Of the six seasons they have played (COVID season was cancelled), DCG soccer has qualified for the state tournament five of those times.

"It always means a lot to go to state," Lane says. "Winning a state championship — especially in the fashion in which we won (a tough game, we battled hard, an overtime golden goal off a corner) — will be something I'll never forget. Watching the boys and fans celebrate is a series of images and emotions and pride that I can't describe. This was the first state championship in DCG boys soccer history."

DCG soccer players will be back to play together this summer, and the coaches are sure there will be plenty of state championship talk, which will keep the fire lit. Once school starts, it is back to work.

"We have a lot of wonderful players with tremendous talent returning, and one of my favorite parts of coaching high school soccer is working to assemble the puzzle each year as players graduate and others join the program," Lane says. "We put the pieces together and assemble what we believe will take us to that final match that our program has now played in — and won." ■

5 TIPS for healthy conflict

Fireworks are common around the Fourth of July, but you don't want them in your relationship. Here are some helpful strategies to keep them in the sky where they belong.

Tip 1: Use a soft start: The first three minutes of discussion sets the tone, so keep it civil. Avoid criticism, contempt, defensiveness and shutting down. Respond so your partner feels heard. This will help prevent emotions from intensifying to get your attention.



Tip 2: Keep calm: A heart rate increase of 20 beats/minute can signal emotional flooding. This causes a release of stress hormones, putting the nervous system into overdrive. Try calming down by taking deep breaths, listening to music or walking.

Tip 3: The 5:1 ratio: Keep interactions positive. Research shows healthy relationships have at least five positive interactions for each negative. Find shared activities and interests to assist with your 5:1 ratio.

Tip 4: Avoid "kitchen sinking": Most fights snowball with differences in values, unrecognized needs or hidden dreams. Instead of dumping out secret resentments, work to find the culprit and stick to the topic.

Tip 5: Fine-tune your conflict culture: Know where your partner's boundaries are, and act in ways that you both agree on. One example: a hard rule of no name-calling. ■

529 COLLEGE Savings Plan new rules boost retirement and education planning

With summer nearing its end and school coming back into session soon, 529 College Savings Plans are becoming a hot topic of discussion. 529 plans are a powerful way for families to save for a loved one's college expenses in a tax-advantaged way. Some of the biggest concerns or hesitations with funding 529 plans in the past were overfunding the plan, a child receiving a large scholarship, or



fear that a beneficiary may choose not to attend college. Previously, if funds within the 529 plan were used for anything other than education costs, they were subject to income taxation and a 10% penalty.

Now, in 2024, the concern of overfunding the plan has been addressed. If there are unused funds within a beneficiary's 529 plan, they can now be transferred to a Roth IRA in the beneficiary's name.

While these new guidelines are exciting news for those who are contributing or have been wanting to contribute to a 529 College Savings Plan, they do come with a specific set of rules to keep in

- To transfer the plan to a Roth IRA, the 529 plan must have been in place 15 years before the transfer can occur.
- If you change the name from one beneficiary to another, this could reset the 15-year clock.
- Funds that were contributed or earned within the past five vears cannot be transferred.

The current maximum that you can transfer to the Roth IRA is \$35,000 over the beneficiary's lifetime. When transferring funds, annual Roth IRA contribution limits still apply. Currently, 2024's annual Roth IRA contribution limit is \$7,000. This amount is subject to change annually.

With this change coming into effect this year, families can feel more confident when opening and funding a 529 plan for a loved one without fear of the funds going unused. This change presents an opportunity for parents and grandparents to take advantage of funding and even overfunding a 529 plan for a child or grandchild. Even if you are not helping pay for higher education costs, you are helping your loved one get a head start on their retirement savings at an early age. ■

Oral health is important to child development and overall health.

The organization is making a real impact, including in Grimes.

"Inclusion is so very important to me," says Jill Crosser, a Grimes resident who sits on Dental Connections' board of directors. "No kid should go without dental care because they are underinsured. The services Dental Connections provides are vital to our communities and so very important for the health of our kids and families."

On Thursday, Sept. 19 from 6-8 p.m., the

organization will host its annual Celebration of Smiles event at Jasper Winery, which will include a Sweet Tooth Silent Auction.

The state of Iowa does not have a sanctioned boys volleyball season, but Anderson says the boys have been quick learners.

"They are coming in not knowing what to play or what to do, but when you relate it to other sports, they just pick it up so fast," he says.

Although not true across the board, it seems as though basketball players have the easiest time transitioning to volleyball, he says.

"We love basketball players," Anderson jokes. "They're usually tall, quick on their feet, and a lot of the quick movements that are good for basketball are good for volleyball as well."

The program's growth has basically been due to word of mouth at this juncture, Anderson says. Anderson holds some free camps and clinics during the summer as well to give kids who might not be familiar with the game an opportunity to see what the sport is about.

"Once the boys get past that initial stigma that it's only a girls' sport, they end up liking the sport," Anderson says.

Anyone is welcome to try out and participate in the clinics.

This year, the club will be expanding to two 18U teams, a 16U team and a 14U team.

Anderson says the season begins in October and runs through June. Practices are held at the Ohana Sports Complex at 1400 S.E. Gateway Drive in Grimes twice a week for two hours each.
