Each member of the Board was assigned a section of the audit to work on. A full Correction Action Plan (CAP) will be put together from their work and will be presented at a future Board meeting.

Please pay close attention to the details of DPW news. The leaf collection will be starting soon. Please make sure that only leaves are raked to the side of the roads. Brush pick up has ceased and will resume in April. Then it will be snow plowing. Remember that all cars must be off the street from November 1 – April 1 between 3:00 am and 6:00 am. Please make it easier for our DPW crew and plows to do their work. More details can be found in the DPW news.

New recycling toters have been ordered for the village with a matching grant. The toters will be the size of the garbage toters. Like our garbage toters, they will have wheels and a cover and can be lifted into the truck. This is better safety wise for the DPW crew and will be faster. More details to follow.

Credit and Debit Cards Being Accepted In the Village Office



Beginning this fall, individuals who wish to make payments to the Village of Scottsville using credit and debit cards may do so through GovPayNet. GovPayNet accepts the major credit cards and debit card brands for payments in the Village Office.

Cardholders pay a service fee at the time of their transaction. There are no charge to the Village for participation in the GovPayNet service. GovPayNet accepts Visa, MasterCard, American Express and Discover.

GovPayNet, based in Indianapolis, is a category leader in accepting credit and debit card payments on behalf of government agencies. More than one million cardholders annually rely on them when making payments to over 2,000 agencies in more than 40 states. GovPayNet processes nearly \$200 million annually in payments to government agencies.

We are excited to offer this service to our residents when paying for garbage stickers, extra garbage totes, lawn debris truck, building permits and Johnson Park rental. All transactions will be processed through the Office.

Did you know that the Johnson Park Pavilion has a fireplace?

You will be nice and warm at your winter parties held at Johnson Park. Great for an ice skating party and hot chocolate. Don't forget the marshmallows!

DPW News

BRUSH AND DEBRIS

Leaf Pick Up



- Leaf vacuuming will begin on October 8 and go until the snow falls.
- Leaves must be raked as close to the road as possible in long rows instead of a big mound.
- Keep sidewalks, streets and concrete drains clear of leaves as this can cause drainage issues.
- Grass clippings and all lawn rakings must be placed in recyclable paper bags. No

plastic bags. Paper bags for lawn debris are available for purchase at most home improvement stores.

- Do not bag leaves or use containers during this time.
- Do not mix brush, nuts, apples, other trash or animal waste with the leaves.
- After loose leaf pickup is complete, place leaves in biodegradable lawn bags for pickup.
- No brush pick up during leaf season. Brush pick up will resume in April.
- Village residents may drop off their brush at the DPW Recycling Center during the work week. Please call ahead. Proof
 of residency is required for dumping.
- For hauling large amount of brush, a village resident may have a DPW truck dropped off a charge of \$25 per day, per load. Please call ahead for this option. Removal of trees, plants and shrubbery on private property is the sole responsibility of the homeowner.
- For yard work and tree removal done by a contractor, it is the responsibility of the contractor to remove all debris.
- Removal of home improvement and construction debris, including and not limited to roofing materials, drywall, plywood, sinks, etc., is the sole responsibility of the homeowner.

Recycling Program

Recycling is one of the best ways for you to have a positive impact on the world in which we live. Recycling is important to both the



natural environment and us. We must act fast as the amount of waste we create is increasing all the time.

The Village has received a matching grant from New York State DEC to purchase 95-gal recycling totes for all our residents. We hope to roll them out by the end of the year. These recycling totes will save money on labor and tipping fees, will keep the neighborhoods free of blowing debris and make recycling easier for everyone.

When you receive your new recycling toter, you can't miss it, it's big and blue, leave your recycling bins at the road and the DPW will pick them up.

Garbage Stickers

Stickers must be purchased at the Village Office for bulk items that do not fit in the garbage totes. Without a sticker these items will not be picked up.

*Carpets must be cut into manageable piece.

Please plan to dispose these items around the weather. If it rains the couches, mattresses and the like will be much heavier and cost more to dispose. Remember the snow plow this winter when placing items out for pick up.

Chamber of Commerce

As many of you know, we were unable to have the Scottsville Family Fun Festival this year due to finances. What has happened since then is some community members have come together to bring back the Town of Wheatland Chamber of Commerce. This Chamber will be a 501C Not for Profit and all the fun things in the community will funnel through us.

We had a committee help with the organization of the Float for Santa, which raised monies to fund the Parade of Lights in December, as well as, the Festival in Summer of 2019. But we cannot do this alone, we need at least 5 officers to help get this off the ground.

The Chamber only meets four times a year for meetings, unless there is a lot of things going on, then we would have to have more meetings. The following positions are volunteer and needed in order to bring the Chamber back!

Many hands prove light work, so if you are a business owner or community member and would love to be involved in such a needed organization, please, please contact the Village or the Town. If we work together we can feel proud to be a part of Scottsville.

Fireplace Safety

First, make sure that the area nearest the fireplace is free of clutter, in particular combustible items such as pillows and newspapers. Have the fireplace flue checked periodically by a licensed chimney sweep to assure safe and efficient operation. If you have small children or pets, use a safety gate to block off the fireplace, and always have an adult supervising the fire. It's best to follow your TV manufacturer's guidelines and not mount your television over the fireplace, as the heat generated may harm the set. A smoke detector in the room (as well as in hallways near all sleeping areas), is always a good idea but to avoid false alarms resist installing a smoke alarm near the fireplace as it's not unusual for a properly performing fireplace to emit a small amount of smoke into the room on startup. Instead, smoke detectors should be kept in every sleeping area and on every floor of your home. Hard-wired smoke detectors are the safest option.



Your fireplace doors and damper should be open before you light the fire. In most cases, opening the damper means pulling the handle towards you but it's always best to take a flashlight and peer up the flue to be sure the damper door fully opens, which ensures all gases are vented through the chimney. As your fire is burning, leave the glass doors open to ensure that the fire has enough air for complete combustion, which keeps creosote tar out of your chimney. To prevent embers from entering the room, keep the mesh screen closed in front of the open door. Sometimes, particularly in well insulated homes, it may be necessary to crack a window slightly to provide sufficient air to keep the smoke going up the chimney. Finally, once your fire has begun to die out you can close the glass doors to prevent air from the chimney backing out into the room as well as the heated room air from escaping during the night. This will adequately seal off the fireplace and the damper can be closed the next morning.

As far as tinder for your fire, stick to dried, cut firewood and fallen, dry tree branches. Softwoods like fir and pine burn more quickly and are better used when starting a fire, while hardwoods like maple and oak are more efficient when the fire is established and the chimney is heated. Don't burn flammable liquids (whose vapors can explode), charcoal (which can cause carbon monoxide poisoning), moist wood (which can cause creosote), trash (which can release harmful vapors), or painted or pressure treated wood (which can emit dangerous chemicals).

Finally, once your fire has burnt out, dispose of the ashes safely. Allow the ashes to cool at least overnight (longer if possible), before disposing of them in a metal container. Moisten the ashes and keep them outside of your house, and don't store any-thing else in that container. Your ashes can then be hauled away with your other garbage.

By keeping these fireplace safety tips in mind, you and your family can enjoy a warm, crackling fire and reduce your risk of a fire accident in your home.

The American Legion Smith-Warren Post 367 History

A meeting of Scottsville WW I veterans was held sometime in 1919, in the yard of what is now known as Hanford's, also known as Col. Brown's on Genesee Street. Army veteran, Robert J. Murphy was the driving force behind the formation of Smith-Warren Post 367. The Post was granted a charter on September 8, 1919, by the New York State Department of State. Charter members of Smith-Warren Post 367 were: John Clydesdale, Joseph Tyler, Roger Clydesdale, George Jarret, Joseph Piaty, Stewart Warren, Robert Murphy, Mike Tony, Albert Ackerman, Howard Willis, William Osmon, Arthur Trigg, John Kalaher, Orrie Newman and Fred Clark. The last WW I member of the post, Curtice Booth, died in 1989.

The Post was named after Warren N. Smith and his cousin William J. Warren, both members of the 78th Division, 310 Infantry. Enlisted April 4, 1918, Warren N. Smith was a private in Co. K. He was killed in action, September 21, 1918 by artillery fire while returning from a volunteer mission to the rear bringing up more ammunition. He was returned to Scottsville and buried in the Oatka Cemetery.

William J. Warren was a private in Co. C, enlisted February 2, 1918 and died of pneumonia February 17, 1919. He is buried in the American Military Cemetery Saint Mihiel Thiau-Court, France. After receiving the Charter, the meetings were held in Windom Hall (Library), various homes, and the old Fire House (now Town Hall). The Post also met in the basement of the old Oatka Hotel. The Smith-Warren Post 367 Auxiliary was formed in 1920.

On December 14, 1937 the current Post Home at 61 Main Street was purchased for \$1,200 and \$75.00 for the furnishings. The mortgage was held by Dr. Clarence Pearson. This property was formerly the Baptist Church. Improvements were made, an addition was added to the back in 1954 and the large meeting hall in 1977. The handicap ramp entrance and restrooms were added in 1992.

Our Post has supported many of the American Legion programs, including Boy's State, Oratorical, Boys Scout Troop 140, Child and Youth. We have also hosted two County Conventions in 1958 and 1993 and hosted one District Convention in 2006. Three members have served as County Commanders, Robert Murphy, Ernie Swingle and Sam Gallo. Ernie Swingle served as 7th District Commander and Department Vice Commander.

Over recent years, we have had 3 members selected for County Legionnaire of the Year: Sam Gallo, Darryl Cady and Gary Hults. Both, Darryl Cady and Gary Hults were selected as 7th District Legionnaire of Year.

The Smith-Warren Post will be celebrating their 100th Year Anniversary to be held in September 2019. Funds are being raised to make capital improvements to the Post Home.
