The past year was learning, so I think this year's theme should be doing. We're already making plans to host Concerts at the Gazebo over the summer. Working hand in hand with The American Legion and several local musicians, we've scheduled some bands already. Our first event is Saturday, June 10. The Legion will be serving their annual chicken barbeque and we have booked the legendary Blues guitarist/vocalist Joe Beard and The Swamp Road Jukes. We're calling it "Blues and Barbeque". The concerts will also serve as fundraisers to help support a new roof for the Gazebo at the Legion, so it can continue to serve the needs of our military families, as well as a gathering place for weddings, photographs, and other ceremonies. Much thanks to the team that is helping organize this.

In addition to the Concerts at the Gazabo, we're going to host a Summer Festival at Johnson Park. It will be a smaller (one-day) event than in the past – we're re-inventing the wheel on this one too. We've set the date aside (August 26) and I'm hoping for it to be an opportunity to get out, get together, eat, browse, be entertained, and enjoy the company of our neighbors. We've already secured popular children's entertainer – Mr. Loops.

The Parade of Lights is also in the early planning stages. We'll give more details in the Fall newsletter.

Keep your eye out for some improvements to both Canawaugus and Johnson Parks. These well used and much-loved parks enhance the quality of life in Scottsville and are in need of a refresh.

Keep your fingers crossed for funding on three separate grant applications to do some long overdue capital improvements.

Village taxes for the 2023-2024 fiscal year will be collected at the Village Office June 1, 2023 to July 1, 2023. Monday 8:00 am - 4:00 pm, Tuesday - Thursday 8:00 am - 4:00 pm, and Friday

8:00 am - 1:00 pm. After July 1, 2023, a five percent (5%) penalty will be charged through and including July 31, 2023. Taxes received after July 31, 2023, penalty to be computed pursuant to Section 924-A and Section 1456 of the Real Property Tax Law.




The Scottsville Free Library Association

DPW Brush Pick-up

Please keep in mind that and brush left at the curb for the DPW to pick up should be no larger than 4 foot lengths and bundled with twine.

Garbage & Recycling Pick up

Please be mindful of the time when putting garbage and recycling out by the curb. Your garbage toter(s) should be out by 6:30am on your garbage day so the DPW can pick it up promptly.

Bulk Garbage Items

Items such as couches, chairs, dressers, carpet pieces, etc. require a \$10 sticker to be placed on the item.

Extra garbage bags that do not fit in the tote require a \$1 sticker.

Refrigerators and items with freon are \$35.

TVs are no charge.

Vendors and Door to Door Sales

April showers bring May flowers, and May flowers bring vendors? Maybe not, but with the warm weather come peddlers, vendors and solicitors going door to door in your neighborhoods. The Village of Scottsville requires a permit to allow

door to door sales. If a solicitor comes to your door, please ask to see the permit issued from the Village. The permit will be on Village letterhead. If the solicitor cannot provide a permit, please as always, report any suspicious behavior to the Village Office or 911.



From Fire Marshal and Code Enforcement

With warm weather approaching, here are a few safety tips regarding outdoor fires and pool safety.

The Village code states: Article II

Outdoor Fires

§ 63-27 Intent and purpose.

This article is designed to regulate and control outdoor fires in the Village of Scottsville.

§ 63-28 Permitted and prohibited fires.

A. Large outdoor fires (bonfires) are not permitted unless legally authorized in conformity with New York State Environmental Conservation Law, through a burning permit issued by the designated Village Code Enforcement Officer.

B. However, small recreational fires are permitted for legitimate cooking or warmth without a permit provided they be in some type of controlled area or enclosure, i.e., stone-surround fire pit, brick barbeque, metal fire stand, or clay chiminea.

C. The burning of combustible material, shrubs, tree branches, or leaves, for nonrecreational purposes is not permitted.

§ 63-29 Policy.

The following policy has been established:

A. Recreational fires must be contained in a stonesurround or open fire pit, brick barbeque, metal fire stand, or clay chiminea.

B. If contained in a metal fire stand with spark arrester and top or clay chiminea or other approved appliance, the fire must be located a minimum of 15 feet from a structure or combustible material.

C. If contained in a stone surround or open fire pit, the fire must be a minimum of 25 feet from a structure or combustible material. The woodpile can be no larger than three feet in diameter and two feet in height.

D. All fires must be behind dwelling and a minimum of 20 feet from all property lines and must be constantly attended at all times until extinguished.

E. Some type of on-site fire extinguishing equipment is required, i.e., a five-pound ABC fire extinguisher, dirt, sand, water bucket, garden hose, etc.





Pool Safety Secure Your Pool When Not in Use

Completely surround your pool with four-sided isolation fencing with a self-closing and self-latching gate that is out of the reach of a child.

A four-sided isolation fence (separating the pool area from the house and yard) reduces a child's risk of drowning 83% compared to three-sided property-line fencing.

For above-ground pools, secure, lock or remove steps, ladders and anything that can be used for access (such as outdoor furniture and toys) whenever the pool is not being actively supervised by an adult.

Install a secondary barrier, such as:

Establish and Enforce Rules and Behavior

Lockable covers: Door alarms and locks that are out of the reach of a child on all doors and windows with direct access to the pool or spa area

Do not enter head first unless in a pool that has a safe diving area.

Stay away from drains and other openings that cause suction.

Swim with a buddy.

Only swim when supervised by a water watcher.

Swim sober.

Supervise others sober and without distractions, such as reading or talking on or using a cell phone.

Take These Water Safety Steps

Employ <u>layers of protection</u> including barriers to prevent access to water, life jackets, and close supervision of children to prevent drowning.

Ensure every member of your family learns to swim so they at least achieve skills of water competency: able to enter the water, get a breath, stay afloat, change position, swim a distance then get out of the water safely.

Know what to do in a water emergency – including how to help someone in trouble in the water safely, call for emergency help and CPR.
