Summer 2023 is already in the rear-view mirror. I know I say this every time, and it's universal—time goes by fast!

As I reflect on the things we did make happen—the Concerts at the Gazebo, Summer-Fest, improvements at Canawaugus Park (details and photos inside), I'm already starting to look at what's next—and coming to terms with a to-do list that will never be totally done.

There has been a renewed focus/interest in the overall look of our Main Street. I agree with all the observations and sentiments from our residents. As a municipality, there are some things we can and will do—including budgeting for sidewalk replacement and replacement of removed trees. We can also dedicate some efforts to the weeds coming up through the sidewalk.

At one time, the Village of Scottsville had a Main Street Beautification Committee who volunteered time and effort on behalf of Main Street. I am going to reach out to some of the former members, as well as the Forestry Board and the citizens who have expressed their dismay about Main Street to create an action plan designed to address some of these issues. Additionally, I've reached out to the Greater Wheatland Chamber of Commerce to help coordinate and enhance our efforts.

My next challenge will be to increase our communication efforts to more of our residents. Despite multiple flyers, our website, Facebook page (and thanks to your efforts, the Scottsville Parents page), people have mentioned to me that they didn't know about SummerFest or the Concerts at the Gazebo.

While we don't have the budget to send out regular mailings, the next best option is to increase the number of people on our mailing list. The current email list is just under 200 names—less than 1/3 of the number of households. I'm hoping (with your help!) to double that number. BRUSH AND DEBRIS - LEAF PICK UP

- Leaf vacuuming will begin early October and go until the snow falls.
- Leaves must be raked as close to the road as possible in long rows instead of a big mound.
- Keep sidewalks, streets and concrete drains clear of leaves as this can cause drainage issues.
- Grass clippings and all lawn rakings must be placed in recyclable paper bags. No plastic bags.
 Paper bags for lawn debris are available for purchase at most home improvement stores.
- Do not bag or use containers for leaves during this time.
- Do not mix brush, nuts, apples, other trash or animal waste with the leaves.
- After loose leaf pickup is complete, place leaves in biodegradable lawn bags for pickup.
- No brush pick up during leaf season. Brush pick up will resume in April.
- Village residents may drop off their brush at the DPW Recycling Center during the work week. Please call ahead. Proof of residency is required for dumping.
- Before October, for hauling large amount of brush, village residents may have a DPW truck dropped off at their home, a charge of \$25 per day, per load. Please call ahead for this option. Removal of trees, plants and shrubbery on private property is the sole responsibility of the homeowner.
- For yard work and tree removal done by a contractor, it is the responsibility of the contractor to remove all debris.
- Removal of home improvement and construction debris, including and not limited to roofing materials, drywall, plywood, sinks, etc., is the sole responsibility of the homeowner.
- In the event of a wind storm that takes down branches, the DPW will pick up fallen branches due to the storm. Notice of the dates will be given on the website and Facebook Page.

Garbage & Recycling Pick up

Please be mindful of the time when putting garbage and recycling out by the curb. With different drivers and the upcoming change in weather, the route the garbage truck takes is subject to change. Your garbage toter should be out by 6:30am on your garbage day so the DPW can pick it up promptly.



Christmas Tree Recycling

The DPW will pick up Christmas trees through the end of January.

Bulk Garbage Items

Items such as couches, chairs, dressers, carpet pieces, etc. require a \$10 sticker to be placed on the item.

Extra garbage bags that do not fit in the tote require a \$1 sticker.





- Be heart conscious. If you have a history of heart problems and are currently inactive, it's best to speak with your health care provider before shoveling. Additionally, don't shovel while smoking, eating or after consuming caffeine; this may place extra stress on your heart.
- Dress Warm. Wear several layers of clothing. You can always remove a layer if needed.
- **Drink plenty of water.** Remaining hydrated during cold-weather months is just as important as during warm-weather months.
- Warm up your arms and legs. Stretch your arms and legs before beginning to shovel. You are less likely to injure muscles when they are warm.
- **Take it slow.** Pace yourself and take breaks if you need to. Safety is more important than speed.
- Protect your back. Bend at the knees, not the back. Lift with your legs bent, stand with your feet hip-width apart for balance and keep the shovel close to your body. Also, don't pick up too much snow at once; use a small shovel or fill up a large shovel no more than half way.
- Shovel while snow is fresh. Freshly fallen snow is lighter than snow that has started melting.
- Listen to your body. This is the most important snow shoveling tip. If something feels abnormal, or if you're tired, it's time to stop.

If you are experiencing an emergency, call 911 immediately.






Keep your pets warm and safe by following these helpful tips:

- If the weather is too cold for a human, then it is too severe for a pet.
- If dogs are left outside, they should have a draft-free shelter large enough to stand and turn around in, yet small enough to retain body heat. Use a layer of straw or other bedding material to help insulate them against the cold.
- Keep your cats indoors. Cats can freeze in cold weather without shelter.
- Pets who are left outside can suffer from hypothermia and frostbite. Never leave your pet in the car during cold weather. In the winter, a car can act like a refrigerator trapping cold air inside.





The Village DPW prides themselves on keeping our streets and sidewalks safe and useable in the winter season. You can help by remembering the following:

- ♦ Overnight parking is prohibited on village streets from 3:00am 6:00am from November 1 through April 1 for snow plowing purposes. Tickets will be issued to vehicles parked during these hours. The fine is \$50.
- New York State Vehicle and Traffic Law states that it is illegal to shovel or plow snow into the roadway. If you use a snow blower, point the blower away from the street. If you hire a contractor to plow your driveway, you should make certain that they do not plow snow into the street.
- ♦ Please do not place refuse or recycle bins in the street or on the sidewalk.
- ♦ Please keep bushes and trees trimmed so the sidewalk plow can keep the sidewalks clear.
- ◆ Do not leaved parked vehicles across the sidewalk to block the plow.
- ◆ The DPW does not salt the sidewalk, use caution.

Mailbox Replacement Procedure

It is the DPW's practice to replace mailboxes that are damaged by the village during snow removal operations. Replacement of your mailbox is done as a courtesy; the village is not legally liable for damage to mailboxes.

Special Mailboxes:

The department does not repair special mailboxes. Any and all damaged mailboxes will be replaced with a standard 4' by 4' post and mailbox. If you have a special mailbox, you may consider replacing it for the winter snow season with a standard mailbox.

Forestry Board

Back in 2019, the Village of Scottsville volunteered to participate in a hybrid oak tree project sponsored by Cornell University, College of Agriculture and Life Sciences. Cornell horticulturists are developing different strains of hybridized oak trees that would be capable of serving as "street trees" in an urban environment. In part, the key to survival in an urban environment is the ability to withstand road salt used to manage snow and ice.

The Village currently has five trees that are planted within the street right-of-way of 23 Browns Avenue, 27 Browns Avenue, 6 Second Street, 4 Beckwith Avenue and 80 Main Street. The trees are periodically inspected by Village Forestry Board members and their condition documented in order to help Cornell University maintain an up-to-date database of all the plantings. The Village trees were inspected on September 10, 2023 and the Forestry Board is happy to report that all the trees

look strong and healthy! For those property





owners that have a tree planted in front of their home, the Forestry Board is appreciative of your care not to damage the trunk with a string trimmer (weed wacker). And lastly, if there is a concern about tree maintenance (trimming) please contact the Village since this must be accomplished by the Village under the supervision of Cornell.
