Editorial

Looking for less than the best?

An odd debate during this March Madness (college basketball playoffs season) is critical of the consistent excellence of the University of Connecticut's women's basketball program. Its coaches produce outstanding basketball teams. The players come from all over the country to play at the highest level.

Critics say that having one team so much better than everyone else isn't good for the game. Having this happen before with John Wooden's UCLA men's team from 1963 to 1975 doesn't appear to factor into today's criticism. His UCLA Bruins didn't lose more than 4 games in a season in 11 of 12 years including four years of going undefeated. Of course, this could be because they were men.

Today, we are seeing the early twenty-second century way of college/amateur athletics. High school seniors are lured by not only free education, housing and meals, but also the chance to be part of something more than just themselves. Could it be that the privilege to be part of teams coached by future hall-of-famers Gino Auriemma and Chris Daley, given their awesome track record, is too attractive to these teens? Storrs Connecticut is NOT the garden spot of the United States – it's just a simple rural New England university town. Would the critics want to break up UConn's coaching and support system because other colleges cannot match them? If so, the idea is wrong on so many levels.

All this is silly. Basketball is a team sport and a team coaching effort.

The criticism all sounds a bit like whining. If a team is that good, the question should be what the opponent should be doing to get better themselves.

From *The Journal* March 31, 1966

White Haven Borough Council appointed Calvin Schoch, of town, as a full-time police officer at a special meeting last Friday Night, on a vote of 4 in favor to 2 opposed, with one council member not voting. His salary was set at \$3,120 per year. Schoch's hiring came after council voted down the appointment of Charles Ackerman 4 to 3.

The PA Game Commission figures for 1965 show 6 bear, 1,507 antlered deer, and 589 antlerless deer taken in Luzerne County, and 3 bear, 902 antlered deer, and 479 antlerless deer taken in Carbon County.

The White Haven Municipal Authority plans to drill a well to increase water supply and improve pressure to the system. It will be in the area of the old tennis court in the borough on land donated by Max Maranuk.

The Ladies Auxiliary of the White Haven Fire Company will sponsor an Easter Egg Hunt for local children to the age of 8 this coming Saturday at Lehigh Park. Children will be divided into 6 to 8 year-olds, 4 & 5 year olds, and 3 and unders. Cash donations, and of colored hard-boiled eggs, may be left at Lamay Variety, or the homes of Mrs. Kathryn Travis or Ethel Zehner by 5 p.m. on Friday.

Mr. Burr Shaver of RD1, White Haven, will retire as manager of General Crushed Stone in Dennison Township on April 1. He was been at the plant for the last 18 years, and worked for General Crushed Stone several years before coming here. Errol Snyder will take over as manager.

Schafer's Garage in White Haven offered on its A-1 Ford Dealer used car lot a list of cars from a '58 Thunderbird hard top to a '65 Mustang 2 plus 2. Also on the list were two Willys Jeeps and five Ford and Chevy trucks.

Nassan's Men's & Boys' Shop on Centre Street in Freeland placed a large ad offering Men's Middishade Suits, Van Heusen Dress Shirts, all-weather Coats, Florsheim and Jarman Shoes, Adam & Mallory Hats, Sta-Press Trousers, and Sport Coats by College Town (for boys as well).

John Pitman & Sons Home Furnishings in Freeland invited everyone to "Come in and see the 1966 Maytag washers."

From *The Journal* March 31, 1916

"About a score of business and professional men responded to the call of the Industrial Committee and were in attendance in the council rooms Wednesday evening when the outlook for a Bigger, Better, Busier White Haven was discussed."

Congressman John J. Casey of PA's 11th District sent *The Journal* "a few packages of Government Seeds, and any of our subscribers desiring them should call at once."

White Haven's basketball five defeated the Parson A. C. team last Saturday here, and "can claim the amateur championship of Luzerne County."

Red foxes are unusually plentiful in the vicinity of

Weatherly, Hudsondale and Penn Haven, and many have recently been killed.




NBLT acquires land for D&L Trail from Mountain Top to Wilkes-Barre

North Branch Land Trust recently took ownership of 2.5 miles of the old Lehigh and Susquehanna Railroad railbed beginning at Oliver Mills in Laurel Run and terminating at the Seven Tubs Nature Area. The railbed will become part of the 165-mile Delaware and Lehigh National Heritage Corridor trail network running from Bristol outside of Philadelphia to downtown Wilkes-Barre.

NBLT Executive Director Paul Lumia stated that the Trust is working with an enthusiastic group of partners to get the hiking, biking, and walking trail completed in Luzerne County within the next few years. Anthracite Scenic Trail Association is working to complete the section from Mountain Top to Oliver Mills while NBLT is working to complete the trail from Oliver Mills to

Northampton Street. Other partners on the project are the Earth Conservancy and the Pennsylvania Bureau of



Earth Conservancy founded in 1992 to address the impacts of abandoned coal mining lands in Luzerne County and their work centers on the former holdings of the Blue Coal Corporation which total over 16,300 acres including the old Lehigh and Susquehanna Railroad right of way. NBLT purchased part of this right of way from Earth Conservancy utilizing Pennsylvania Department of Conservation &

Natural Resources Community Conservation Partnership Program grant funds.

Once complete, the entire trail from Mountain Top to Wilkes-Barre will be deeded to the Pennsylvania Bureau of Forestry who will maintain the trail going forward. The Bureau recently took ownership of the Seven Tubs Nature Area and manages many thousands of acres of public forest lands along the trail in Mountain Top.

All this jibber jabber means is that our main first and best anti-ship missile, the LRASM, is no longer capable against Russian and Chinese first strike weapons and will be downgraded to a secondary land-strike role. The administration is admitting it is inferior to our potential enemies without speaking it in a way the American people will understand. In the past we called that lying.

Russia's sinking practice target ships 100 miles away.

The US Navy acknowledges the problem that threatens our freedom and survivability at sea. Its strike reach is shrinking and aging, while potential opponents' attack reach is expanding and modernizing. As new designs replace older planes, US carrier aircraft range is shrinking to 1950s levels. Meanwhile, its anti-ship and land attack missiles are generally older, medium-range subsonic designs like the Harpoon Block I, which are vulnerable to air defenses. In contrast, China is deploying supersonic (1 to 4 times faster than the speed of sound) SS-N-22 "Sunburn" missiles bought from Russia, and working on a DF-21 anti-ship ballistic missile. The Sunburn is just one of Russia's supersonic anti-ship missile options for sale and now being bought up by Iran and North Korea. Russia, China, North Korea and Iran are all sharing weapons and military build-up policies at an alarming rate with nuclear capabilities and the largest standing armies in the world. Iran and North Korea are working in nuclear development in a joint venture to defy the recent treaty our nation fell for and they have already violated numerous times.

Far left liberalism won't work against the growing threat, sticking daisies in rifle barrels won't work and neither will hugs. Peace, love and hugs are great, but when the other side's view is kill, capture and enslave, they will all be looking for the 1% of our nations fighting men and women to
