Talking trucks at WH council

White Haven Borough Council members agreed that the borough needs a new truck during discussion at the August 22 council meeting. The question was whether it would be better to replace the big truck, the 650, or the smaller 450. Both trucks are 16 or 17 years old. The 650 is harder to hire drivers for, but the only repair it needs is a new box, and it has been

seeing more use recently for digging and hauling stone. The 450 is beginning to rack up maintenance costs.

Borough manager Linda Szoke said local contractors and other municipalities have indicated interest if the borough decides to sell the 450. She also noted that the borough has \$15,000 set aside from last year's snow plowing money from the state, and will be receiving \$15,000 soon for

the upcoming season.

Base price for a compromise 550 size would be \$34,000 according to police chief Tom Szoke, but the borough would also have to spend around \$20,000 for a new aluminum or stainless steel box for the 650, plus spreader and plow for the

From *The Journal*,**September 7, 1978**

Work continues in the former First Eastern Bank building as it is being converted into the White Haven municipal offices. The oak and marble counters have been removed, and the floor is being repaired.

An outdoor service was held this Labor Day weekend in Lehigh Park by the churches of White Haven. The Rev. David Harvey of the Free Methodist Church conducted the service, and the Rev. Edward Scott of Saint Patrick's gave the sermon.

A summary of the Lehigh River Study that will be submitted to the state legislature and governor was presented to a meeting of the Lehigh River Advisory Board at the Carbon County Vo-Tech last Thursday. The hope is for legislative action to designate the Lehigh and various tributaries as either wild or scenic. The Study compiles data produced at numerous public meetings. It was decided at the meeting that the Advisory Board should continue to meet—about once every six weeks.

Stanley Bruzgulis, Jr. of White Haven was elected Provost Marshall of the Eastern Region AMVETS at a recent regional meeting held in

Wilkes-Barre. He is a member of AMVETS Post 253 in White Haven, serving as its Finance Officer.

This weekend, the NRA will hold a mini-convention at the Pocono Hershey Resort. The three-day conference will feature seminars and presentations, and over 70 exhibitors.

The abandoned shops of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Co in Ashmore (built during World War I) and 2,000 acres of surrounding land were bought by the Beryllium Corporation of Reading, PA. The company recently obtained a \$23 million contract to furnish its product to the Federal Atomic Energy Commission. The company plans to spend \$4 million on renovations, and employ over 200 men when in full operation.

An accident at the Weatherly electric plant damaged the diesel engine's pistons and rings. The engine is back in operation after nearly \$900 in repairs. The plant generated 677,300 in kWh in August, along with eight million pounds of steam.

The front page of *The Herald* features a cartoon of the United States facing threats from Red Nationalism (Russia) and Red Slavery (China).

The annual banquet kicking off the bowling season was held last week in the Centenary Church's social rooms. This year, *The Herald* is sponsoring a team.

This week at the Ritz, *Pearl of the South Pacific*, starring Virginia Mayo, along with *On the Threshold of Space*, starring Guy Madison.

The L&L Fire Company won a trophy at the Northeastern Volunteer Fireman parade held last Saturday in White Haven. The Kidder Fire Company showed off its new truck.

From *The Journal*,**August 30, 1928**

Miss Susan Potochney of Freeland was assigned (as teacher of) the school at Ripples. (Where the White Haven VFW is located today – s)

The Inter-County Bridge “at this place” is being painted a bright orange – “a pleasing change from the black of previous years.”

Street Commissioner Frank Haas informs us that the bridge over Linesville Creek at Dam Two (in White Haven) has been completely rebuilt and should be good for twenty-five years or more.

Lee Feist has again been awarded for transporting pupils to the Dennison Township Consolidated School at Middleburg.

STANDING FOR THOSE WHO CANNOT

In the wake of all the sports and Hollywood elites that claim they are standing for those who cannot by using our national anthem as a pawn, I would like to introduce two American military members who chose to protect those who cannot fight for themselves. It was not in a sports stadium or before cameras. It was streaking through the air at 500 MPH. They do not receive big pay contracts or elitist status, they just love their country and took an oath to protect it and its flag.

U.S. Air Force Lt. Col. Sasseville and his wingman, Heather “Lucky” Penny, headed toward their F-16s. Sasseville first heard that a plane hit the World Trade Center on Sept. 11, 2001. By that time a third plane had hit the Pentagon and they got word Flight 93 was headed toward Washington,

D.C. They didn’t know where Flight 93 was, so their orders were “bring it down to stop it.” The problem was, they didn’t have weapons loaded on the aircraft yet and there was not time to load them before Flight 93 would reach a heavily populated area. The only “weapons” they had were the planes themselves, which meant they were ordered without saying it, on a suicide mission.

They had to figure out how to take down an airliner down quickly but had no weapons to do so. Flying together they decided to crash into the cockpit and tail. “I’m going to go for the cockpit,” he told her. “I’ll take the tail,” she replied. Their decision was that they would die for our country to save countless others.

After he got into the air and began looking for Flight 93, they flew over the Pentagon still-flame-engulfed burning furiously from the jet fuel. It

was a gut wrenching scene, as they flew through the smoke that filled the cockpit, it made them sick and nauseous thinking we’ve been hit on our own soil and now we face them unarmed.

As Sasseville flew to intercept Flight 93, he rethought the strategy of crashing into the tail and the cockpit for taking down a large airliner. Neither of these would really stop the plane from flying, so they need to hit the wings to make the airplane “drop” and not fly anymore. So the plan was to get close to the wing, crash through it and try to eject, knowing that it would all happen very fast and chances of surviving were slim. But that’s the only real way to foil the aerodynamic qualities, shear off the wings. The only problem is “you have no idea where it’s going to go other than down.”

The danger when an airplane gets dropped, it falls to the ground and may hit a

school or hospital or residential area. In addition, not only would he likely lose his life, but hundreds of other innocent passengers on Flight 93 would die as well should he succeed.

As they closed on the target, they also realized that multiple anti-aircraft missiles would be launched at a designated distance, and the battery of incoming missiles would also be locked on them. Mission survival was non-existent and they both knew it. Had the passengers’ heroic efforts not stopped Flight 93 over Pennsylvania, the two pilots were ready to do the mission. Thankfully, they didn’t have to take on that responsibility.

It’s one of those philosophies all of our fighting men and women hold dear: to give one’s life to save hundreds of others, especially innocents.

When high paid sports figures and Hollywood stars

stand in protest to “protect those who cannot, the innocents.” They could never fathom the courage and devotion to the very flag they refuse to honor as they dishonor our military men and women ready to give their all. And yes, they would die for the protesters who care less about our flag and its true meaning, but bask in its freedoms provided. They never fought for it, so how would they?

So many died for, were maimed and forever changed so people like that can go down on a knee while we stand and salute. So many watch and feel the “punch in the gut” as we see our flag disgraced or burned. When words like Duty, Honor and Country have become punch lines in a fracas of elites’ politics and political correctness taking our flag of honor for use in their political self-serving messages.

new trucks. Council decided to get firmer prices by the September 26 meeting.

Engineer Don Totino was not present, but his report included information about the drainage issue on Berwick Street near the entrance to the White Haven Market. The

blocked pipe is in the middle of Route 940, the borough will have to hire someone to do the work, and schedule an emergency opening with PennDOT to make the repair. He hoped the contractor who is supposed to be making repairs to the railroad crossing by the end of September could be hired for the work.

Solicitor Don Karpowich

looked at a stormwater issue in Woodhaven, and is attempting to get an easement to correct a drainage issue.

Collection activity is moving forward on delinquent garbage accounts.

David Quinn was named to the zoning hearing board, to a term expiring December 31, 2017.

Fire chief Dean Rauden-

bush told council that new state legislation may make boot drives unsafe. The only place in the borough that meets criteria is the corner of Berwick and Church, and the volunteer fire company has decided not to use that location because of safety concerns. He asked if council would support the fire company if they went back to their

previous location at the base of Berwick Street below Main, just before the Lehigh River bridge, noting that Freeland had written to PennDOT with similar concerns, and had been told to go back to their original location.

Water receipts totalled \$15,213.50, the highest amount ever, for more than 3 million gallons.

Weatherly garage roof work to be bid again

When the Weatherly Borough Council met in late August, they decided by a 4-2 vote to reject all three bids received to do the roof work on the borough garages. Those bids came from three local contractors—Kane; Hinkle; and Figas. Councilman Harold Farrow made the motion, which got a second from Norm Richie, to reject them all and re-bid including an advertisement. Farrow noted that he felt the bids were all a bit on the high side and he hoped to get five bids instead of the three that had been received.

Councilwoman Cecelia Gower agreed to re-bid, but commented that next month, “we have to make a choice.” That comment referred to the fact that this was the second month in a row that the bid was not awarded. During the July meeting, one member of council indicated that another

local contractor wanted to bid on the project, so while the original two bids were not rejected, those bids were not opened at that meeting either, so that the other firm would not have an unfair advantage. Mayor Tom Connors suggested, “We know these contractors; I’d hate to look for a lower bid and not get one, but have one or more of these contractors drop out.” Councilman Joe Cyburt agreed with Connors adding that “the prices are close.”

Gower, Richie and Farrow were joined in voting to re-bid by councilman Joe D’Andrea; while Cyburt and Connors voted no. Councilman George Miller was not at the meeting.

Mark Sitch attended the meeting in an effort to complete his Citizenship in Community badge, the last merit badge he needs to earn his Eagle Scout. Sitch’s sister Karalyn Sitch was being recognized at the meeting for

earning her Gold Award in Girl Scouting, the highest award a Girl Scout can be given. She was not at the meeting, since she was already at Immaculata College where she will attend school. Sitch painted storybook people on the walls of the children’s room at the newly opened Weatherly Area Community Library to earn the Gold Award.

The contract to provide fire protection services to Packer Township was discussed again. Richie suggested a three-year contract using the amounts scheduled for the 2017, 2018, 2019 years on the original proposal; he also suggested that the payback amount be divided by three rather than by five; adding \$6,631 per year to the negotiated price.

Council agreed to those terms by a unanimous vote.

Council discussed the garbage collection bid package. Farrow asked if Coun-

ty Waste, who is providing services to nearby Packer Township, could be considered. Borough Manager Harold Pudliner noted that they had asked to be included in the bid list. County Waste provides curbside pick-up for both trash and recyclables. The company provides con-

tainers for use at the curb. Council agreed to discuss details at the September meeting, advertising for bids to be opened in October.

The next meeting will be Monday, September 19, at 7 p.m. in the conference room of the borough building at 10 Wilbur Street.


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Big Bad Voodoo Daddy to open Hazleton concert season

Summer is not letting go even as next week will be the start of fall. It was relatively hot. I say relative because I feel temperatures in the 80s are hot, and we've just come through a period when the temperatures were in the 90s.

Saturday we spent our afternoon at the Woof-Fest in Long Pond, raising money for the Monroe Animal League, manning the Blakeslee Rotary Club booth.
