From the Archives

From the November 16, 1978 *Journal*:

Among the recommendations in the Crestwood School District long range plan is that the District "consider purchasing land in the White Haven area...for a building project (an elementary school) if there is an increase in student enrollment." The plan suggested buying land next to the present high school, and includes a project for a separate Junior High School on that site about 1982 to 1984. That building is projected to cost \$10 million. The old Wright Township school would be abandoned. The long range plan, developed since February of '77, was adopted at a special meeting in October.

The White Haven Presbyterian Church honored Rev. Herman Humke and his wife Ella at a farewell dinner.

A bake sale, soup sale and "Country Store" will be held this Saturday at Feussner's Ford in Freeland as a fundraising towards the construction of a new Masonic Temple in Freeland.

The White Haven Community Ambulance honored its officers, directors, drivers and crew members at a dinner party held at Ray's Cocktail Bar and Restaurant on Route 940 (in Kidder Township) in early November. Special guests were honored including co-editors Jay and Clara Holder of The Journal for their support and the publicity in the newspaper. Special recognition was given to the women volunteers of the association. It was noted that the association needs a daytime volunteer with first aid training, though someone without the training is also welcome as a class is slated to start after the first of the year.

White Haven Borough approved a budget of \$100,633 for 1979, liquid fuels of \$25,377 and revenue sharing of \$73,000. Tax mills are 24 - no tax increase. Fire protection costs went up due to workmen's compensation, so next year, Penn Lake will pay \$1,500, Dennison \$2,500 and White Haven Poconos \$1,200. The borough secretary got a raise of \$500 to \$6,000. The police chief's pay was increased from \$9,940 to \$10,500. The street commissioner's pay went up to \$11,500. In the absence of council president Glenn Kearns and vice president Edward Pike, council member Ruth Holder was temporary chairman for a hearing to approve the Evanko subdivision.

Fowler, Dick and Walker advertised its store hours in both Wilkes-Barre and Hazleton. An extra hour of shopping is offered - to 10 p.m. – in Hazleton.

The Pocono Hershey Resort invited locals to a "Hoedown" on Sat., Nov. 25, featuring a country buffet dinner, Hayrides, square dancing, "moonshine" and birch beer all evening. Cost is \$13.50 plus tax.

The Buckhorn on the corner of the White Haven-Weatherly Road and Route 940 will have rock music on Saturday night by "Swagger" from 10 p.m.

WASB ponders personnel

The Weatherly Area School Board met in regular session on Wednesday, December 9 following a more than 60-minute executive session of the Personnel and Policy Committee. In reporting committee action at the conclusion of the regular meeting, committee chair Gerry Grega noted that they had discussed the technology vacancy left by the departure of David Russell and maintenance mechanic position which will be available following the announced retirement of Rick Miller.

The board took official action on four personnel moves, including Russell's resignation which took effect on December 4 and Miller's retirement which will take place on January 15. They also approved the December 4 resignation of Michelle Clark from a full-time cleaning aide position. Clark was added to the substitute list. The board also unanimously rescinded the motion to hire Frank D'Andrea as a part-time cleaning aide.

Three of four students of the month for November were introduced at the meeting. They included Senior of the Month Olivia Winheld; sixth grade student of the month Timothy Maguschak and seventh grade student of the month Amanda Colecio. The eighth grade honoree Alexander Landis was unable to attend.

Business Manager Dave Marsiglio was appointed the E-Rate approver for the Weatherly Area School District.

The Weatherly Area PTA was authorized to conduct a Kids Go Shopping activity in December. The Alumni Association was given approval to hold meetings on January 21; March 17; and October 20. Cub Scout Pack 007 was granted permission to hold the Pinewood Derby in the high school on Saturday, January 23, with set-up on Friday, January 22.

The senior class trip to Ohio, slated for May, was approved by the board. Grega asked if enough chaperones would be going on the trip. Superintendent Tom Mc-Laughlin told him that the senior class advisors have been told they will need at least one chaperone for every 15 students attending the trip. Board member Georgeann Herling asked about the itinerary and

was told the group will go to a Cleveland Indians baseball game, tour the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and go to Cedar Point Amusement Park.

Approval of the assignment of transportation services from Hemlock Bus Company to Rohrer Bus Company was given subject to receipt of necessary insurance certificates and signatures on the assignment contract.

A proposed preliminary budget was approved on a 7-1 vote, with Grega voting against it.

Athletic committee chair Corey Gerhart noted that winter sports are underway and asked everyone to come out and support the Wreckers.

In addition to Grega, Herling and Gerhart, the meeting was attended by Gerry Fewins, Bill Knepper, Brandon Pugh, Chad Obert and Matt von-Frisch, Board member Amv Potsko was absent.

The next caucus meeting is Wednesday, January 6 with the regular voting meeting Wednesday, January 13. Both sessions start at 7 p.m. and are held in the Middle School Large Group Instruction room and are open to the public.

White Haven welcomes new police officer

First order of business at the December 21 White Haven Borough Council meeting was the swearing-in of new full-time police officer Joanne Jinx. Mayor Fred Meier administered the oath of office.

The borough also received a donation to the Police Department from the Valley with a Heart program.

Absent any complaints from citizens, council member Tim Janosco raised the issue of parking by the renovated apartments at the corner of Berwick and Towanda Streets. Vehicles parked in front of the building on Berwick Street are limiting visiblity for drivers turning onto Berwick Street from Towanda Street, and there have been some near accidents reported. The area will be looked at to see if additional parking regulations are needed.


There was little business to be conducted at this short end-of-the-year meeting. Council adopted the budget on the second reading, noting that for the first time, it included a surplus of \$33,000.

Council also approved the ordinance fixing the tax rate for 2016. There is no increase in taxes. The salary resolution was also adopted.

For November, tax collector Kathy Oross turned over \$1,349.16.

One occupancy permit was issued for the month. Borough manager and code enforcement/zoning officer Linda Szoke reported that work on the Mertz property is moving forward and should be completed soon. In response to a question from the mayor, she said that the stairs at the rear of the property are to be removed.

German U-Boat U-134 uses Christmas lights, sinks 24 American ships and a US Navy patrol blimp

The scene in the comedy film "Down Periscope" portraying a sub with periscope extended on the surface at night looking like a sail boat in the dark is not all Hollywood. December, 1942, South Florida: The strangest U-Boat attacks in USA home waters was make under a Christmas tree. This same Christmas tree would later sink the U-Boat.

A surfaced German U-boat with periscope extended strung "Christmas Lights in the shape of a Christmas tree." At night, US Navy and Coast Guard patrols reportedly passed within a mile of the surfaced sub signaling holiday greetings as many

fishermen did the same in the spirit of the holidays.

Commercial shipping unaware as this "it looked normal." Ship captains took no evasive action, their ships were sitting ducks, attacked. 24 civilian tankers and freighters were sunk with torpedoes and deck guns.

Alarmed now, the US military ordered all ships to turn off their lights at night. The result: two U.S. tankers collided off Jupiter, Florida, killing 88. One of the ships was loaded with 146,000 barrels of gasoline, causing an explosion and flames that lit up the sky for weeks.

Commercial ships started to travel in convoys with armed naval escorts allowing the Navy to falsely report the ending the submarine attacks. Still, reports persisted that

crewmen from German submarines were coming ashore to buy bread, fresh produce and dairy products, assimilating into the diverse tourist population going unnoticed. Later in 1942, police discovered a telescope, a signaling device and three home heating oil tanker trucks, proof that German spies occupied a vacant home in Boca Raton, the Coast Guard Auxiliary reported.

Blimp vs. U-boat: The Germans had 700 submarines and at any given time about 10 would prowl off in the Florida Straits. Short of planes and patrol craft, the Navy dispatched slow-moving airships to patrol. The U-Boats were the newer type IX, much larger than the type VII the blimp crews were trained to attack. The type IX also had

a stinging array of anti-aircraft weapons with crews trained to shoot down fast moving winged aircraft up to 200 mph.

On July 18, 1943, blimp K74 was on night patrol when it spotted a sub approaching two merchant ships off Key Largo. The blimp commander had hoped to catch the sub by surprise to drop out of the clouds and bomb it. The blimp did just that, but at 34 mph. Glowing in the darkness, the Christmas lights still lit the hydrogen tank storage area and gave away their position. U-134 crew spotted the attacking blimp and opened withering fire with 20mm cannons and powerful twin machine guns. Hot lead and tracers ripped through the airship's giant hydrogen-filled envelope while others hit an engine, which burst into flames.

The blimp returned fire its single 30 cal machine gun, causing only minor damage to the sub. The deflating K74 dropped into the sea. All 10 crewmen clung together in the water through the night near the smoldering blimp. However, one crewmen got separated and "was devoured by sharks." K74 sank, "the only airship lost to enemy action in World War II."

Torpedoes gone, U-134 returned to France. Wanting to show off how it fooled the US anti-submarine forces, when it entered the harbor it extended its periscope and lit up its "Christmas tree." It was promptly spotted by two patrolling Royal Air Force bombers, bombed and sunk. Merry Christmas to all, and to all a good night.







A valid driver's license must be provided by at least one person in the group.

Equipment is loaned on a first come, first served basis

and must be used on park property.

Be prepared by using these simple tips:

Snowshoes have a tendency to kick up snow as you walk, which can stick to your pants – do not wear cotton jeans or sweatpants – they recommend snow pants or an outer layer of rain pants so you'll stay warmer and drier.

Snowshoes are strapped directly onto your shoes, so wear warm and waterproof boots if possible. The park provides specialized shoes for the skis, so wear warm socks.

These activities work up a sweat, so dress in layers and bring water.
