Garbage letters get response in Lehigh Township

Lehigh Township Supervisors got a reaction to the letter they sent reminding residents about past-due garbage accounts. Some payments had crossed in the mail. Exemptions were requested by a few customers. One customer paid in full, while three others made arrangements to pay. A few people said they were insulted by the reminder. Liens have been filed in several cases. Berkheimer has been asked to provide a monthly payment status report.

The fee is supposed to be sent to Berkheimer, but at least one party sent their payment to the township, which supervisor Jill Redash-Capossela termed a "paperwork nightmare." She asked that residents who change own-

ership of a property or leave the area contact secretary/treasurer Carol Lenahan, so township records can be kept up to date. Private property transfers are the most difficult to track down without cooperation, she noted.


Supervisor Wayne Wagner suggested that people may not understand the process. The bills are sent out by Berkheimer. People who pay on a quarterly basis then have 45 days to pay before being considered delinquent.

Supervisors discussed the garbage fee collection program during the January 4 meeting, after granting exemptions for the first quarter of 2016 to Walter Zlomsowitch, Grace Hensel, and Catherine Miller, who also was exonerated for the third and

fourth quarters of 2015. Requests for exoneration must be renewed each quarter. Anyone wishing exoneration for the second quarter must notify the township by the close of business on March 31. Redash-Capossela will monitor the requests for exoneration.

Repairs to the truck by Kislán Repair were approved after discussion. An original payment of \$1,054.06 for parts was made prior to the meeting and ratified; an additional \$2,000 was included on the list of bills. Kislán recommended future installation of a hand emergency brake.

From the audience, John Capossela asked how much the truck was worth. Wagner

Penn Lake Council reverses censure of out-going mayor

At Penn Lake Park Borough council's December meeting, in addition to the votes on the 2016 budget and to renew the garbage contract, there was other business.

Council member Shawn Kuter led a vote to "uncensure" outgoing mayor Tim Lenahan. He had been censured by the previous council.

Lenahan thanked the members for this. He will be turning over the mayor's website and Facebook to the new mayor as she begins her term.

There was discussion on the future of repairs to the Penn Lake dam. There are more repairs for the drain. There was also talk about filming the pipe, using a diver, versus drawing the water

down in the lake.

Council voted unanimously to appoint Bev Yencha as tax collector for 2016. Council member Jill Rosenstock praised Yencha's work. Yencha needed to be appointed because her paperwork arrived late into Luzerne County.

Rosenstock told council that there are two grants available towards dam repairs. The more likely of them requires a 30% match. Regarding the budget, she is opposed to raising taxes. She voted against approving and advertising the budget. On the subject of police and the money allotted to coverage, she defended the spending as important... "not a political football." Reading from a statement, she praised the

council from 2014 and earlier, noting they "got a lot done without raising taxes..." She ended with a comment that she is "embarrassed" about the work of the 2015 council.

Regarding police, council president Paul Rogan pointed out to Rosenstock that "there are people who believe that we can get (state) police without paying." She disagreed.

The police budget remained the same as it was in 2015.

Meetings for 2016 were set as the second Thursday except for December – that meeting will be on Dec. 15 – all beginning at 7 p.m. This was okayed unanimously. The next meeting is tonight, Thursday, Jan. 14. Meetings are held at the Penn Lake Community House.

said it was purchased new in 1999. Down the road, he said, the township should look at another vehicle, perhaps smaller. Parts availability may become an issue. He noted that the township had just signed a five year agreement with PennDOT to plow two miles of state road, as well as the township roads.

The bills were approved for payment, with the exception of a bill from zoning officer Lenny Westor for 15 hours

of service since March. Supervisors agreed to hold that payment until a list of permits issued and an activity report are received.

Supervisors also got a response to a letter sent by solicitor George Hludzick to the manufacturers of the new door for the township building, threatening legal action if corrective action is not taken. A meeting is being set up.

L&L Fire Chief Tim Rossman gave both a monthly and an annual report. He said 2015 was a really good year, and thanked the supervisors and the community.

A grant has been received from the PA State Fire Commission office to replace old fluorescent lighting.

The dry hydrant issue is still unresolved, but Rossman thinks they will be able to install dry hydrants in the spring.

There are still some smoke detectors available for township residents at no charge; contact the fire company.

Supervisor chair Larry Skinner asked about the future of boot drives. Rossman answered that legislation has been passed that legalizes boot drives, but only at controlled intersections. It is unclear how that is defined. He hopes that the intersection of Lehigh Gorge Drive and Buck Mountain Road can qualify, since the fire company raises an average of \$1,200 each drive.

A meeting will be set up between Emergency Management Coordinator Charlie Puzetti Jr. and the supervisors to discuss specifics of the \$5,000 grant for the emergency operations center. Originally, a generator was earmarked, but that would cost more than the available funding.

Bring back the dying art of letter writing

In 500 B.C., Persian Queen Atossa was the first recorded person to write a handwritten letter. The letter became such an important part of our society that over 500 years ago, King Henry VIII of England created the world's first national postal service. Letters were a main form of communication, with people checking their mail box daily in hopes that a loved one dropped a note.

The second week of January is National Letter Writing Week. What better way to celebrate the occasion than to write a thoughtful letter to a loved one or to review old letters that were sent to you throughout the years?

“Written words, on paper, preferably in a person's own handwriting, are powerful. They can heal or wound more thoroughly than any text or electronic message. A letter can be placed under a pillow to be slept on, or, conversely, can be torn to shreds in a gesture far more satisfying than

pressing a button and deleting a text,” shared Weatherly Area High School English teacher Maria Whitley.

When was the last time you sat down to hand write a letter? In this fast-paced, technologically advancing world, most people would probably say the closest thing they have written to a letter in a while would be a text message or, at most, an e-mail. Most would agree that letters bring more feelings of nostalgia than any text message ever could.

“We moved to a new house a couple of years ago and in cleaning out the boxes in one of the closets as I packed, I found a bundle of letters from my college boyfriend—Love letters. I had them tied up into a packet like an old lady would have, with a ribbon.

“And I went back and forth for a few minutes. Should I keep them? Throw them away? I hadn't seen or heard from him in 20 years. I kept them, just as they were. Then, last March, I got the news that

he had passed away suddenly. And I was so very glad I had saved them. Even if I don't ever read them again, they are tangible evidence that he was a part of my life for a time,” Whitley said.

Although ease and speed of communication has increased, depth and emotion within those communications has surely decreased. “People lose texts when they get a new phone, or when they delete them to make room for more. A letter is meant to be kept, to be unfolded and refolded and enjoyed as an artifact of what life was like for you at a certain point. It's a physical reminder that someone touched pen to paper with you in mind. Letters are priceless,” concluded Whitley.

Write a letter, a “thank you” note, or send a card this week. There is nothing quite like receiving a tangible piece of paper with lovely words scrawled across it. Transform the depths of your communication by reverting back to the age old art of letter writing.

cent review by the American College of Radiology.

The ACR gold seal of accreditation represents the highest level of image quality and patient safety. It is awarded only to facilities meeting ACR Practice Guidelines

and Technical Standards after a peer-review evaluation by board-certified physicians and medical physicists who are experts in the field.

Image quality, personnel qualifications, adequacy of facility equipment, quality control procedures, and quality assurance programs are assessed. The findings are reported to the ACR Committee on Accreditation, which subsequently provides the practice with a comprehensive report they can use for continuous practice improvement.

The ACR is a national professional organization serving more than 36,000 diagnostic/interventional radiologists, radiation oncologists, nuclear medicine physicians, and medical oncology and the delivery of comprehensive health care services.

The department also passed the Mammography Quality Standards Act annual inspection through the Pennsylvania Department of Radiation Protection. The MQSA requires mammography facilities across the nation to meet uniform quality standards.

Real Scoop on Military Service and Social Security: If you served on active duty between 1957 and 2001, you're entitled to special extra earnings that could increase your Social Security payout. If your service

was between 1957 and 1967, you'll need to make sure the credits are added to your record at the time you apply for benefits. Credits for service between 1968 and 2001 were automatically added to your record. For more infor-

Reader's Question: What was the largest military tank ever built? The biggest and heaviest tank ever to be constructed that "worked" was Nazi Germany's Panzer VIII. They named the 180-ton go-liath Maus (or mouse). It featured two heavy guns in its turret: a 75-mm cannon along with an unbeatable 128-mm anti-armor weapon capable of destroying at twice the range any other tank in use on the WWII's battlefield. Too heavy for any bridge, the Maus would have had to cross rivers submerged so designers made the tank watertight and equipped it with a snorkel. Had the Maus' manufacturing plant not been overrun by the Soviets in 1945, the Germans would have built more than just the single prototype. To put it in perspective, our biggest tank is the M1A1 Abrams at 60 tons.

On the drawing board were two even bigger. Even the mighty Maus would have been no match to this beast. More like navy destroyers on treads, these enormous 1,000-ton tanks would have made the Maus look like a child's model. The L1000, designed in 1942 by engineers at Krupp, was planned to be more than 100 feet long and nearly as tall as a four-story building. Designated as Ratte (or rat), the L1000 would have needed a 40-man crew to operate its two 280-mm guns, as well as a 128-mm cannon. It also would have carried its own battery of eight anti-aircraft guns. Powered by up to eight marine diesel engines, the kind used to run e-boats and U-boats, the Ratte was intended to travel at speeds ap-

proaching 40 km/h and might have had a range of 200 kms.

The L1500 would have stood 60 feet tall and been 150 feet long. More than 100 crew would be needed to operate the tank's turret-less 800-mm Scherer Gustav railroad gun - capable of hurling a seven-ton artillery shell nearly 30 miles. The largest battleship shell was the Japanese 18 inch main gun shell weighing 3,218 lbs., which could be launched 15

miles. It would also have two 150-mm cannons and many AA guns and heavy machine guns. Powered by nearly 50 U-boat engines, the Monster would have rumbled along at 15 km/h crushing literally everything in its path. Albert Speer, Hitler's armaments minister, recognized the impracticality of such ludicrously enormous war machines and ordered the Landkreuzer projects scuttled, only to be overruled by Hitler himself.



What You Need

- 1 lb lean ground beef
- 2 c Mexican blend shredded cheese
- 1 can refried black beans
- 1 pkg taco seasoning mix
- 1 jar picante sauce, 16 oz.
- 2 c sour cream
- 2 green onions, sliced
- 1 small can sliced black olives
- 2 c water, warm
- 1 box manicotti shells

Directions

- Mix raw ground beef with taco seasoning, 1 cup of cheese and 1 can refried black beans.

- Using the uncooked manicotti shells, stuff the meat mixture into the shells and place in a large baking dish that has been sprayed with cooking spray.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I'd like to take this opportunity to share an update about Pennsylvania's 2015-16 budget. Back in June, the House and Senate met our constitutional duty by passing a balanced budget. I have been critical of the governor's decision, after only a few hours of consideration, to veto the entire budget even though a majority of the line items in the budget were the same as Gov. Wolf's proposal or higher. Now after almost seven months of delays in state funding to schools and county services, they finally have the money they need to begin providing services.

The much-mentioned budget "framework," which included property tax relief, pension reform, liquor privatization and the governor's \$2 billion tax increase budget, as announced in November, is all off the table.

On Dec. 23, we passed a \$30.3 billion budget and placed it on the governor's desk. It is my opinion that this

action was the only chance we had at forcing the governor to release emergency funding to schools and county human service providers.

Our efforts were successful, and on Dec. 29, the governor, under protest, signed and released 87 percent of the budget, which provided desperately needed state and federal funding for school districts and county human service providers. I'm still puzzled as to why Gov. Wolf waited six months to use the line-item veto.

I am anxious to head back to Harrisburg and work toward an agreement on the remaining 13 percent of this budget. However, I have repeatedly told the governor's administration that I will continue to stand up for the taxpayers of Carbon County - who cannot afford additional taxes without property tax relief. I remain focused on the true problems facing Pennsylvania, and that starts with resolving this stalemate so we can move forward.

Seth's Sightings by Seth Isenberg

I'm not sure if the weather that we've had to endure is anything more than El Niño-caused oddness. The nice stable winter days of early last week were drenched by a warm wet weekend. Hopes for skiers' normal were washed away. On Sunday about mid-day a powerful thunderstorm blew through our area before the trailing edge of the front. By Sunday night, temperatures were diving back to seasonal with a biting wind.

We at the Journal wish local snowmaking crews the best of luck in competing with Mother

Nature.

This coming weekend is supposed to be a big skiers weekend because of the federal holiday on Monday. Pocono vacationers can celebrate Martin Luther King's birthday by coming here to ski. Forget ice fishing.

Late this month there's supposed to be an ice golf event on Lake Wallenpaupack. Perhaps this year they could do it by canoe and beach ball. (Actually, the event has been postponed until late February in hopes that normal weather returns.)

Driving through Mount Pocono a few times this week, we saw piles of snow at the edges of parking lots. And yet in the White Haven and Weatherly area, we've barely seen a dusting.

Ruth and I attended the opening day of the PA Farm Show on Saturday. We drove through heavy fog along Interstate 81, arriving just after mid-day to see the roads backed up around the Farm Show complex due to big attendance. After finding a parking spot we went into the building and decided to skip the first rodeo. Instead we headed for the big food court for some lunch.

People will like that the food court area has been expanded, with a large area of tables just behind the center food vendors. Further back are still the big displays of farm equipment and antiques, and info booths as always.

We took the tunnel from there into the critter displays, then walked through cattle corrals and an enlarged rabbit display, but didn't find any poultry this year. Sadly, the threat of avian flu stopped this

year's competitions. We did see some big, big bunnies.

The main display building in the oldest wing of the complex has a new layout that was really enjoyable—there's a lot to learn there. We stopped to talk to a wheat weaver, learned about mushroom growing from farmers, talked to a logger and admired some beautiful handcrafted furniture at that display. We learned about the Pennsylvania State Library, and then as a reward, got to eat slices of chocolate cake at the end of annual Hershey-sponsored cake baking competition. The chief judge remarked that this was the largest field ever, with over 70 cakes to be tasted and judged by a panel of eight. They had to sample nearly 100 slices. The remainder of the cakes are cut and offered as samples to the competition's fans.

Earlier, we had also gotten a sample of a mushroom and beef burger that was prepared by one of the guest chefs with the assistance of culinary students from Penn College of Technology, of Penn State, of Williamsport. We're going to try this recipe at home.

We explored more of the critter barns, seeing pregnant piggies. A few were due in the coming weeks. There were newly groomed goats and sheep, and get-

ting-groomed cows and bulls. This year, we enjoyed watching two sessions of judging of youth-raised goats. 4-Hers had made their goats pretty, and then lined up to have an experienced judge tell them how they did. The judge had been doing this for 30 years, here and at other fairs and competitions. He was kind to the kids whose goats didn't measure up, and clear in explaining why the ones that did were first place goats vs. sixth place goats. You could see the emotions play out on the kids' faces.

It was a long hoof back to the main arena, and then a bit of luck to find two seats together for the evening rodeo. After all the walking, it was a relief to be off our feet. 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Crestwood girls stun Dallas, stay alive in WVC title chase

The Crestwood girls couldn't have asked for a more difficult three-game stretch than the one they had to endure in the past week. Going up against a gauntlet that began with defending District 2 Class 4A champion Pittston Area and continued at perennial power and rival Hazleton Area, the Lady Comets entered Monday's home game with red-hot Dallas on a two-game slide. But that didn't stop them from pulling off one of the bigger upsets of the Wyoming Valley Conference season to date.

Sparked by the play of its two-time all-state player Maddie Ritsick, the Lady Comets halted Dallas' eight-game win streak with a 51-38 victory that vaulted Crestwood back into the crowded Division I race and threw a wrench into the Mountaineers' early-season run. Ritsick scored a game-high 25 points, grabbed nine rebounds, and powered a second-half run in which the Lady Comets outscored the visiting Mounts 26-12 to pull away.

The win moved Crestwood to 5-7 overall, but more importantly squared its conference record at 2-2 heading into Thursday's home game with Berwick. Dallas (9-2) slipped to 3-1 with its first conference loss. Ritsick scored 15 of her 25 points in the second half despite facing constant double-teaming by the Dallas front line of Sara Lojewski and Nikki Wren.

Dallas led by one (26-25) at intermission, but that went away quickly when Crestwood's Abbie Macko nailed a jumper early in the third quarter. By the time Sara Hopkins hit a pair of free throws midway through the fourth quarter, the Lady Comets were up 42-33 and pulling away. The Lady Mountaineers missed 10 of their final 12 shots from the field, and could not hold off Ritsick and the Lady Comets

down the stretch. Macko backed Ritsick with nine points and Hopkins added six.

Dallas carried a one-point lead into the second half, but Crestwood's Macko hit a jumper to give her team the 27-26 advantage, which would slowly extend the rest of the way. With 4:30 remaining in regulation, Sara Hopkins knocked down a pair of free throws to give Crestwood a 42-33 lead, tied for its biggest lead in the game up to that point. After Hopkins' free throws, Dallas shot 2-of-12 down the stretch and failed to make up the difference.

In the loss, Maddie Kelley and Wren scored 12 points each, with Wren's 11 rebounds giving her a double-double. In addition to Ritsick's 25 points, Macko scored nine; Hopkins six; and Marlee Dillon five.

"The kids played with heart today," noted Crestwood assistant Jim Miner, who was filling in for head coach Ed Stepanski "It was amazing to watch."

The Lady Comets were at a disadvantage from the get-go, playing without their head coach Ed Stepanski on the bench. Stepanski was ejected from the freshman game earlier in the evening at Hughie McGeehan Gymnasium and had to serve a suspension that included Monday's Dallas game.

But they didn't appear fazed by it early on, taking a 6-3 lead midway through the opening quarter on Sara Hopkins' pull-up

jumper, as well as two inside scores from the 5-11" Ritsick.

Hazleton Area's first big run came soon after, when Martincek took a feed from Yori inside to start a 9-2 dash. Mrochko's three-pointer, Shamany's strong drive down the lane, and Ally Yale's corner swish off a Shamany assist made it 12-8 at quarter's end. The Lady Cougars continued to pull away early in the second quarter, when two free throws each from Pfeil and Yori, combined with a Mrochko spin move inside and her breakaway pass to Shamany, upped the Hazleton Area lead to 20-10 at the 5:54 mark.

Crestwood got all the way back to within one (20-19) with its own 9-0 tear, spearheaded by Ritsick's press break and post move down low, and two scores off the bench from Julia Makowski. But as quick as they got things close, the game got away from the Lady Comets again when Hazleton Area turned two turnovers and a missed shot into three easy baskets the other way. Shamany dished to Martincek for two points, scored on a putback herself, then received a long pass from Yori to get a layup and push the lead back to seven. Mrochko's driving basket in the final minute finished off a 28-19 first half for Hazleton Area.

Crestwood turned it over 16 times in the opening half, and struggled with the Lady Cougars' pressure throughout. "I think Hazleton was just a little quicker than we were, maybe a lot quicker," stated Crestwood assistant Jim Miner. "Too many turnovers (27), we missed a lot of shots (14-of-43), a lot of close shots. In that first half we got back in the game, and then we gave up a couple easy buckets, buckets over the top of the defense."

Kate Snipas' three-pointer and two Ritsick free throws got the Lady Comets within six (30-24) early in the third quarter, only to see Hazleton Area run off the next eight points to push the lead back to double-digits (38-24) again. The Lady Comets never got closer than 11 the rest of the way.

Yori, who had just two free throws in the opening half, scored 10 of her 12 after intermission, and went a perfect 8-for-8 at the free throw line. Her six consecutive free throws midway through the fourth

quarter sealed the deal.

"We're hoping for better things. There's a lot of season left," Miner said as the Lady Comets left the gym. Their win over Dallas on Monday proved how right he was.

Comets' Ritsick returning to form following surgery

Feb. 17, 2015 is a day Maddie Ritsick will never forget, although she'd sure like to. Battling Lake-Lehman in a tightly-contested first-round playoff game at the Crestwood High School gym, Ritsick was driving toward the basket when there was contact along the baseline. Her knee gave way as she crumpled to the floor. With 4:44 left in regulation, Ritsick's record-breaking season had come to a screeching halt, and her future became full of uncertainty.

By the next day, her worst fears were confirmed. She had suffered a torn ACL and MCL, and would need surgery to repair the damage. The prognosis: At least eight months of recovery time and rehabilitation, and perhaps a year or more. But by mid-November, less than nine months after her surgery, Ritsick was back on the court for the Crestwood Lady Comets, ready for her senior season. "It's going pretty well," Ritsick said Friday of her return to the hardwood. "It's hard to come back from an injury like that. It's definitely been a physical struggle more than mental."

If you had never watched Ritsick play, you may not even notice she had had major knee surgery just 10 months ago. The 5-11 forward is averaging nearly 20 points per game and is a consistent double-digit rebounder again this season. But those who have watched her perform during the past three seasons know that she is still less than 100 percent as her knee — and her body — round back into playing shape.

"I don't want to say it's still hurting her, but if you watch she still has a little gimp in the movement," assistant coach Jim Miner said. "We told her 'Maddie, we don't know how you feel. That's up to you.'"

"It's maybe like 75 percent," she admitted when asked how far along her knee is. "Definitely the cutting has been impacted, and just my overall physical shape has been affected so much for not being able to do anything for nine months." Ritsick wasn't about to wait for it to be 100 percent, not with her senior season upon her. By the first official day of practice, she was back on the court with her teammates, ready to go after the Wyoming Valley Conference Division I championship they had won during her sophomore year.

She made a triumphant return on Dec. 4, scoring 22 points and grabbing 10 rebounds to lead Crestwood to a 42-33 season-opening win over Meyers. "Oh my God, I was so excited (to play again), but obviously nervous at the same time," she said after her return to the court against Meyers. "But once I got out there, it was like second nature again." Since



then, she poured in 36 points in a loss to Williamsport, scored 28 and 27 in back-to-back wins over Pleasant Valley and Wyoming Area, and either led or tied for team scoring honors in 10 of 11 games this season.

Last Friday night, she finished with a game-high 23 points — including an 11-for-12 showing at the free throw line — and pulled down 10 rebounds in a 57-45 setback at Hazleton Area. That came despite added pressure from the Lady Cougar defense, with players surrounding her on every possession.

"She can still score and she's pretty tough. She's still a stud," Hazleton Area head coach Joe Gavio said. "She's not the same player, but she's still pretty good. If she gets her hands on the ball, she'll score. She's still showing a little affects (from the injury), but she'll be better the next time we play her."

It's a goal for Ritsick, who wants to be close to all the way back for the second half of the conference season, and for the playoffs in February. For that, she continues to rehab both on her own and under the supervision of a trainer. "I'm doing strength and conditioning at Wilkes with a trainer, and I do stuff on my own, mostly like agilitys and stuff like that," she explained. "I feel like I've been improving. I'm getting back into the swing of things and I hope that the next time we play these teams, I'll be 100 percent."

As she rounds back into playing shape, she's also closing in on a very important milestone at Crestwood. Last season, she scored a whopping 559 points to break Becky Cooper's long-standing Crestwood single-season scoring mark of 545 set in 1987-88. She also topped 1,000 career points en route to WVC Division I co-Player of the Year honors, and was

voted to the Pennsylvania All-State Team for a second straight season. With 219 points thus far in 2015-16, Ritsick is just 92 points away from eclipsing Diane Madl's all-time CHS girls scoring record of 1,486 points.

But she's not resting on her laurels. Far from it. "My shot has been off these past two games," she said on Friday. "Today I didn't really shoot much from the outside. I'm going to practice over the weekend with my shot, and hopefully it will be back."

Already committed to playing basketball at the University of the Sciences in Philadelphia next season, Ritsick wants to first get herself all the way back during the next month, and help lead her team to one final District 2 Class 3A playoff push before she moves on. "It was my goal to be back by the beginning of the season, so I made that," she said. "By the one-year point, I'm hoping to be 100 percent, and hopefully a little before that."

That would make all her hard work over the past year all the more rewarding.


Little Wreckers sweep Panther Valley
