In 20 years with Crime Stoppers, I haven't attended a campus conference, nor has our organization considered hosting one. I attended eight adult conventions and found them informative and worthwhile. Our board elected to host the 2023 Campus Conference in San Marcos and I'm excited about the event!

We have a strong high school campus crime stoppers program under our umbrella and ensure our support to send as many students as possible to conferences. Our students won numerous awards and had several Ambassadors elected. We are proud of our campus organizations!

When I went to high school 100 years ago, we had a slightly different outlook on life. Every pickup in the parking lot was left with the keys in the ignition, windows rolled down, and usually a hunting rifle in the rack on the back window.

I broke my wrist just before spring practice and ran with my right arm in a cast. I received the moniker of "The Man with the Golden Arm", from starring Frank Sinatra. He played a character addicted to heroin. That's as close as my community or school came to drugs. I heard all the stories of drugs when I was stationed in Vietnam. We had to be careful rotating our planes between Turkey and Spain because the ground crews knew all the places to hide drugs.

As a younger man, I swam a lot in the apartment complex pool. Many times, there would be adults sitting around the pool smoking pot but I never had the desire. Once in a training class, the instructor demonstrated the smell of burning drugs by lighting some up. It had a horrible odor but I would recognize it again.

It seems the latest craze among young people is purchasing illicit pills like Percocet, many of which contain Fentanyl – a synthetic opioid 50 times stronger than heroin. These drugs have been linked to instant death, including four teenagers here in Hays County.

I've seen numerous movies where the villain threatens the victim by putting one bullet in a revolver, spinning the chamber, placing the barrel up to the victim's head and pulling the trigger. That is the picture that comes to mind when I think about young people taking these drugs: it's Russian Roulette. You just don't know what will happen.

One of the topics at the student conference is Fentanyl and other illicit drugs, presented by agents with the DEA. Should be highly informative and useful. We also have other incredible speakers and topics including school threats, domestic and dating violence, distracted driving, forensic science and more.

I encourage teens across Texas to attend this event. They will come away knowing more about how to help keep their school and their community safer.

Progress from Change

In business, the plan from the start is to last forever. The hope is to have crowds at the door at the first opening and never stop from opening to closing. In manufacturing, the goal is to create the perfect mousetrap that will be in demand forever.

Of course, if those concepts were valid, everyone would be in business and we would all be rich.

Thomas Edison once said he created a thousand ways not to make a light bulb. We are not in the light bulb business but we sure don't want the lights to go out on our "business".

Not long ago, our Hays County Crime Stoppers organization was reaching the point of no return. We had trouble generating new ideas and attracting new people. When the pandemic hit, we were gasping for air. It looked like a nonprofit that has done so much good for the community in its 40-plus years would go the way of the horse and buggy.

As a last resort, we turned to the Hays County Sheriff for help - we are glad we did!

Within a few months, we had a new executive director, Sgt. Jeff Jordan, and a new board ready to hit the ground running. Along with those changes came new life, fresh ideas and the ability to take HCCS off life support.

We have a good campus program but we struggled to keep school programs alive. The new leadership team suggested we host the statewide Campus Conference for 2023. We submitted our application and were accepted.

In talking the convention up with our different school districts, they were excited. Three new high school groups are starting this year: San Marcos High, Lehman High and Johnson High. Our Hays High campus group is going strong and now has additional students from other schools to assist with conference planning.

Who knew that just a year ago, a few little changes would encourage this much progress?

What Kind of tips can be reported?

Students/Faculty/Staff can report any type of illegal weapon or illegal drugs, gang activity, fighting and bullying. Dating violence and assaults are also crimes to be reported. Students are encouraged to call our crime stopper tip line (800-324-8477) or submit a tip on the P3 App for such illegal activity.

The anonymous caller will not be asked to provide any personal information such as name, address, school ID, or phone number. The student will be asked to provide as much information as possible on the suspect:

- · Name,
- · Clothing,
- Hair color,
- School or classroom



Plus a brief account of the incident witnessed:

- What was seen?
- Location
- Describe vehicle if used



The student will be issued a number code for future use. Upon investigation, if the information provided leads to an arrest, that student may be eligible for a cash reward. Any updates or results on the tip provided by tipster will be submitted to the tip provided. Tipster can login to P3 tip and check on the status or any instructions.







During our year as an ambassador, each of us works on a special project; I selected the Hays County Sheriff's Office Brown Santa program with a goal of collecting books to donate to kids for Christmas. Books are a good way to bless less fortunate families with gifts for their kids while still educating and entertaining them.

Crime Stoppers is a nonprofit that accepts anonymous tips on crimes and criminal fugitives. You can call an 800 number or use the P3 app to report what you know - and it's completely anonymous. If that tip leads to an arrest, the tipster is eligible for a cash reward!

The organization works to make communities and places of learning safer for people to raise their families. With everything we've heard about school safety, especially right here in Texas, it is important to have all eyes on deck in our schools.

Remember, reporting something to Crime Stoppers is helping make our schools and communities safer places. Some may think of it as snitching or being a narc, but my guess is the parents and families of the Hays CISD students who died from drug overdoses wish someone had reported what they knew before it was too late.

The anonymous tip line is posted all around the HHS campus. Hays County Campus Crime Stoppers plans to expand the program and remain an active way to keep our neighborhoods and campuses safe well into the future.

I invite Hays High students to join Campus Crime Stoppers. Let's make our school a better place for everyone.



Communications Update

Hays County Crime Stoppers (HCCS) is slowly but surely becoming a community household name. Audience engagement through print, digital and social media helped HCCS develop an identity where the community can easily find the source for up-to-date information.

Over the last quarter, HCCS social media accounts have gained a reach hitting more than 76,000 accounts and each post continues to have more engagement than the previous. The organization uses Facebook, Twitter, YouTube and Instagram to share information.

The crimes we share are serious but sometimes a little humor and curiosity go a long way. Hays County Crime Stoppers finds that the more chatter organically happening on a post, the more likely someone will recognize who the post is about.

A number of our posts have led to multiple closed cases, as some individuals are wanted for more than one crime. The number of tips coming in has increased as social media engagement increases. What is really encouraging is to see our communication interaction is evenly distributed. Shares, likes, follows and comments are from all across the county. This means the right information is helping keep our community strong and safe.

It's not just about closing unsolved cases. Hays County Crime Stoppers partnered with a number of local public service departments, including the Hays County Sheriff's Office, to crack down on the horrific, life-threatening uptick in Fentanyl use, particularly among young adults and teens.

Raising public awareness of the dangers of Fentanyl is a top goal of our communication efforts to get the word out about its dangers.

From pics of suspects with unflattering haircuts to rounding up some of the area's most wanted, HCCS continues to push out the most up-to-date information and awareness campaigns in the county.
