FROM THE RABBI'S DESK Rabbi Jacob Rosner

Our sages teach us that all beginnings are difficult.

Our tradition has a very different approach to the new year. It is not seen as a time for partying and revelry. Instead we see it



as a time to reflect on the year that has passed and to fix what needs to be fixed in our lives, our relationships and our souls. It is not always easy to hold up a mirror to our lives. But, if we are to make a new beginning, it is necessary to reflect back on the road already traveled.

Beginnings are difficult.

This year represents a beginning for me as an individual and for SBJC as a congregation. There is something unique about the relationship between a shul and its rabbi. It's like creating a holy partnership. We are doing the work of God, Torah, and tsedakah together.

Beginnings can be difficult.

And lest some of us think we are too old for new beginnings, father Abraham and mother Sarah, who are at the center of our Rosh Hashanah liturgy, were both eligible for Social Security when God first made a covenant with our ancestors.

Our tradition tells us, "kall hatchalot kasha" all beginnings are difficult. So, I would like to thank the leadership and membership of our shul for easing my transition. You have made me feel welcomed in so many ways. You have helped me in my move, made modifications in my home, and have advised me about the neighborhood. In short, you have made me feel as part of the mishpacha.

And, that is exactly what can make our shul work! When a shul is small enough, it can become a family in ways that larger synagogues cannot. Our synagogue is small enough so that everyone who is interested can have a personal relationship with his and her rabbi, who will (eventually) know them by name. We are small enough so that we can find important roles for everyone interested. We are a mishpacha. We can be the "little shul that can."

Beginnings are difficult and many of you have already gone out of your way to show me that family feeling.

But, I am greedy.

In the near future we will announce our programs and our classes. If you want to truly ease my beginnings, you will sign up and get involved.

The Gift of Kindness

As we begin the new year, let us think about giving the gift of kindness.

Let us be conscious of how words can invite or dismiss, welcome or rebuff, hurt or heal.

Just as every word we write is now suspended somewhere in cyberspace, an unkind or insensitive word, even if uttered unintentionally, often remains imprinted in someone's memory.

THE SOUND OF THE SHOFAR RABBI JACOB ROSNER

It might be surprising to learn that the shofar is not only heard on Rosh Hashanah and at the end of Yom Kippur. Every morning during the month of Elul the service concludes with the sounding of the shofar and the recitation of Psalm 27.



One tradition is that Moses went up to Mount Sinai to receive the second set of luhot (tablets) on the first of Elul. He remained there for forty days until he returned on the tenth of Tishrei, Yom Kippur. Moshe's return with the tablets marked the culmination of teshuva (repentance) and forgiveness for the sin of the golden calf. The reconciliation between God and the Israelites was so healing that the date was chosen as a day of repentance for all time. According to the sages, Moshe's ascent of Mount Sinai was preceded by the sounding of the shofar as a warning that the people should not repeat their sin while he was gone.

The Kabbalists suggested that the shofar is sounded during Elul to confuse the Satan so that he would not interfere on the real day of Rosh Hashanah.

But the most accepted reason for the custom is given by Maimonides who wrote as the meaning of the sound of the shofar, "Wake up, you sleepers! Look to your souls. Examine your deeds and forsake evil so God may have mercy upon you."

Our ancient sages teach that when the month of Elul approaches we begin the process of inner reflection, repentance, and change that can lead to the healing promised by the holy days. We cannot approach God and change in a vacuum. We need time to prepare. The sounding of the shofar reminds us that the season of awe is approaching. Each day the shofar's plaintive wail wakes us up

to our transforming task of mending our relationships with one another and God.

In the yeshiva world in which I was raised we took this warning every seriously. Summer was a time for relaxing from the rigor of study. Having refreshed our bodies and minds, we would prepare for Rosh Hashanah with special acts of piety. Our prayers had a little more kavana (inner feeling), our relationships with each other were more gentle, our tsedaka more generous. During this season people would approach one another and ask forgiveness for whatever offenses they may have been guilty of. Forgiveness was always granted, for how could one expect God's clemency if we were unwilling to forgive one another.

Many of us are far removed from the serious job of Teshuva demanded of us during this season. Too many of us say the words, listen to the shofar, and then return to the same lives we were living before. Taken seriously, these days can be a transforming experience. During this days we can heal our families and renew our relationships with God. But first, we have to prepare for the sound of the shofar.

May the sound of the shofar during Elul awaken our souls both as individuals and as members of the community. And may the sound of the shofar on Rosh Hashanah proclaim our serious efforts of spiritual renewal and communal shalom.



CO-PRESIDENTS MESSAGE







Dear friends,

This past Monday night, we gathered together for the holiday of Tisha B'Av, one of the most somber occasions on the Jewish calendar. Tisha B'Av commemorates many of the tragic episodes throughout the long history of our people, making this holiday quite emotionally challenging. Yet, at the same time, the Tisha B'Av experience provides us an outlet, among the comfort of community, for any feelings of pain or grief that we may be currently experiencing in our own lives. This processing is especially important for us during challenging times. I would like to thank the South Baldwin Jewish Center, and in particular Rabbi Rosner for joining with us to foster a very meaningful service. I also want to thank our Eicha (Book of Lamentations) readers and all others who contributed readings and ideas to this interactive experience. I have attached the reader which we used to supplement the traditional service.

In a beautiful contrast, the Shabbat immediately following Tisha B'Av is called Shabbat Nachamu — the Shabbat of Comfort. To me, this reinforces the idea that despite all of the dark moments in our history, we have always persevered, and actually emerged stronger with a more tenacious spirit and a drive to better the world for all who may be suffering. Our current times are no different. Despite the pain we have experienced and the grief we still feel for what happened last October, we know, with certainty that — Am Yisrael Chai — the Jewish people will live on and thrive. And when I see the strength, connection, and dedication of our community and the resilience of the broader Jewish world, despite our sometimes frequent internal squabbles, I see light and I feel hope. And this, my friends, brings me comfort. I wish you all a Shabbat Nachamu Shalom — a peaceful Shabbat of Comfort.
