A Purim Story

In Buchenwald, Yankel Frankel, a young Hasid, decided to lift up the spirit of so many Jews who were rapidly losing faith in the black fires of hell.

Purim was coming and, obviously, there was no Megillah to read, no shalah manot, and no Purim seudah. But Yankel was determined to celebrate Purim in purgatory.

Helped by some friends, he began to collect all sorts of paper. The other side of a page containing an order from a command, a tossed out newspaper that had room to write on the margins, a torn out page from some book used by one of the guards to wrap his lunch and discarded, and whatever other scraps could be found.

Miraculously, one inmate had a single pencil. A group of knowledgeable Jews gathered together secretly and courageously to write down as much as they could by memory "the gantzer megillah" (the whole scroll of Esther).

On the night of Purim they met to "celebrate" Purim. A number of prisoners sensed that something was happening and they did not want to be left out.. they declared, "we too, want to avenge the innocent blood of our families on the wicked Haman. Whatever you are up to, don't leave us out."

Somehow the reading of this strange megillah strengthened those who were there. Somehow they found faith that their deaths would be remembered and avenged. Somehow even in the pit they found the strength to live another day. And somehow they were convinced that their story, just as the original story of Esther, would be told to future generations.

Shame on those of us who have turned Purim into a children's holiday. Purim reminds us that in "every generation there are those who would rise against us"... and yet we survive.

October 7th reminds us that there are Hamans in every generation. In the Torah read shortly before Purim, we are reminded of the unprovoked attack against the Hebrews shortly after they fled from Egyptian bondage. We are commanded to wipe out the memory of Amalek.

Today we can read Amalek as a metaphor of every hate group that targets our people. And, as Jews, we stand with Israel and her determination to never allow Hamas to govern Gaza.

I see in Amalek the "students" who accuse Israel of the crime of genocide, when the true perpetrator of genocide is Hamas. The blame for the death and suffering of the innocent children and women of Gaza lies squarely with the terrorists.

May the day come soon when we will use noisemakers to drown out the hated name of Hamas.

Additionally, Sisterhood has programs scheduled that we think you will enjoy, as well as all the regular weekly meetings and social gatherings. Lastly we look forward to the return of our snowbirds as the weather warms in chilly New York.

May the joy of Purim linger and may there be no Hamans in our lives.



In celebrating Purim, our tradition outlines four special mitzvot for the holiday. In celebrating the survival of the Jews of Shushan, thanks to Mordechai and Esther, we take the opportunity to look beyond ourselves and bring others into the celebration as well.

1. **Hearing the Megillah**...The first mitzvah of Purim is hearing the reading of the megillah, the scroll of Esther. This mitzvah opportunity occurs two times during the holiday, once at night the evening that Purim starts and once during the day. The timing isn't super specific; the nighttime one should be after dark and the daytime one any time during the day.
2. **Mishloach Manot** - Giving food to friends. This mitzvah comes straight from the megillah. Mordechai, in speaking about how to celebrate, suggests we should give food to one another (see [Esther 9:22](#)). Food is a way to celebrate and build community, which is exactly what this mitzvah is all about.
3. **Matanot LaEvyonim** - Giving gifts to the poor. Another important Purim mitzvah is matanot la'evyonim, giving gifts to the poor. This mitzvah is about remembering those who are less fortunate, even while we are celebrating.
4. **Purim Seudah** - A special Purim feast. The last of the four Purim mitzvot is the Seudah . This is a special meal eaten on Purim day. The whole idea of this meal is for it to be extra festive.

Selling Chametz

What Is the Sale of Chametz and Why Do We Do It?

On the holiday of Passover, we are commanded to not to have any chametz in our possession. Any food that is made out of grain that has been allowed to rise (ferment) is chametz. Common chametz items include bread, cakes, breakfast cereals, pastas, many liquors and more. Any chametz that was in the possession of a Jew during Passover is forbidden to use, even after Passover ends. This applies even if the chametz is locked up and out of sight.

So what does one do if he or she is not able to consume all of chametz that remains in cupboards and freezers?

The solution is the "Sale of Chametz," in which the food is sold to a non-Jew before Passover. After the holiday, the non-Jew sells it back, and it can once again be enjoyed.

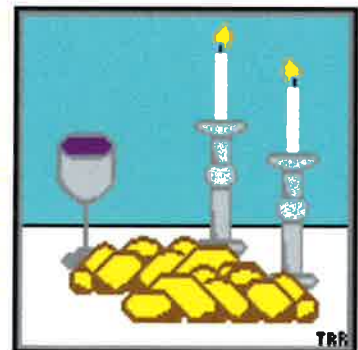

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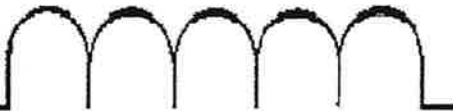
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
