

MAKE SHAVUOT YOUR SIMCHA

—-Along with Passover and Sukkot, **Shavuot is one of the three major Jewish pil- grimage** festivals. It falls out precisely 49 days after the second day of Passover, a period of time known as the Omer, and marks the giving of The Torah to the Jewish people on Mount Sinai.

Passover has the seder. Sukkot has the sukkah. The commemoration of Shavuot is largely confined to the synagogue. An all night study session on Erev Shavuot is associated with Shavuot.

--- Shavuot is the only holiday where dairy foods are encouraged.

Eating meat and fish are signs of celebration in Jewish tradition, which is why many people eat beef or chicken on Shabbat and other Jewish holidays. Shavuot is the one Jewish observance where dairy foods like cheesecake and blintzes are customary. Various reasons for this tradition have been offered, but many link it to the fact that the kosher laws were handed down on Shavuot, and the ancient Israelites, finding that their meat was no longer kosher, ate dairy foods instead.

—There are many explanations given for the **Reading of Ruth on Shavuot**. The most quoted reason is that Ruth's coming to Israel took place around the time of Shavuot, and her acceptance into the Jewish faith is analogous to the acceptance of The Torah by the Jewish people.

Another reason given for the reading of Ruth on Shavuot is that its story takes place at harvest time, and Shavuot also occurs at the time of the spring harvest.

Reflections

The Story of Ruth



Was there a time in your life when you chose to take a risky path rather than a safer course?

The Book of Ruth, which is read on Shavuot, relates to this scenario. Ruth is a woman of daring, resilience, and insight. She is a risk taker.

The story begins when there is a famine in Bethlehem. Naomi, her husband, and two sons migrate to Moab. Her husband dies. Her sons marry Moabite women, Ruth and Orpah. After ten years of marriage, both her sons die leaving their wives childless. When Naomi hears that the famine has ended, she plans to return to Bethlehem. When her daughters-in-law announce their intentions to accompany her, Naomi urges them not to go with her but to return to their mothers' homes. Orpah consents but Ruth insists on going with Naomi. Ruth's words to her mother-in-law: "Wherever you go, I will go. Where you stay, I will stay. Your people shall be my people, and your G_d my G_d ." are well recognized.

The arrival of Ruth and Naomi in Bethlehem coincides with the beginning of the harvest and Ruth goes out to glean in the fields to feed herself and Naomi. Ruth happens to go to the field of Boaz, who treats her kindly, and, as it turns out, is a relative.

When Naomi learns about Ruth's successful gleaning and about Boaz's kindness, she develops a plan for Ruth and Boaz to marry. As a result of this marriage, Ruth and Boaz become ancestors of King David.

The story of Ruth is a tale of bonding, commitment, and struggle for survival. Many midrashim have been written about this text. We celebrate the festival of Shavuot on Tuesday evening June 11, Wednesday June 12, and Thursday, June 13. We invite you to examine this text and to learn more.


