Church outscores itself on Souper Bowl Sunday

On Sunday, Feb. 9 (Super Bowl Sunday), the First Presbyterian Church of Greensboro scored a new high in donations on this 35th year of the Souper Bowl of Caring. Now a tradition, this act of caring and sharing started at the Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, South Carolina, in 1990. That first year, with 22 Columbia churches participating, more than \$7,500 in food and cash was collected to help combat hunger in Columbia. Since then, the national movement has grown to include thousands of churches, along with business and civic organizations, and has donated more than \$200,000,000 in food and money to combat hunger throughout the country.

Held every year on Super Bowl Sunday, the First Presbyterian Church of Greensboro has participated in this event for many years. Under the inspired leadership of Elder Carla Pinkney, the church outdid itself this year. More than 1,000 cans of soup were collected for the Greene County Food Pantry and more than \$1,000 was given in support of Our Father's Kitchen, which provides free lunches to people in need every Saturday of the year.
