

HALLOWEEN COSTUME CREATIONS

Residents explain how they get to become anything they want to be on this imaginative holiday.

Halloween is a special time of year when most anyone can put on a costume or mask and temporarily take on a different persona. It can be liberating to become someone or something completely apart from our usual roles, even if only for a short time.

Some opt for a frightening look. Some prefer costumes that are funny. Some like to dress as a favorite celebrity. Some costumes are difficult to categorize.

Nowadays, almost any costume that can be imagined can be purchased with a visit to a store or the click of a computer mouse. But, for some, the creation of a costume can be just as rewarding as the final product.

Regardless of the individual's preference — whether it is store-bought or homemade, and whether it is simple or elaborate - costumes can be a lot of fun. Here are a few examples of local people who enjoy getting into the seasonal fun.

NICHOLE UHLMAN, THE COSTUME QUEEN

Nichole Uhlman of Guthrie Center has been referred to by friends as "the costume queen," and there is strong evidence to back up that title. Uhlman talked about her lifelong involvement in creating unique and memorable looks.

"Ever since I was little, I loved dressing up. I loved Halloween. My mom made some of our costumes," Uhlman said. "Then, all through high school, I just loved the themes and dressing up for homecoming and trying to be creative."

Uhlman now involves her husband, Jared, and her sons, Jace and Jax, in her costume fun. She explained a creative Halloween costume that came about during her first pregnancy.

"When I was pregnant with our first son, and my mom was there, she painted my belly. That was fun," Uhlman said.

"And now I've gotten more into making bigger costumes and going out with friends to the Owl's Nest or The Port. So, it's become a tradition, and people always ask what I'm going to do for the next year."

Over the years, Uhlman has entered

costume contests locally and in larger cities, and she has won various awards.

"My jellyfish costume has been my favorite. I won first place at Owl's Nest, and then a couple years ago, I took it to Des Moines with a couple of my girlfriends,

and I won three different contests. I won \$1,300 in one night."

Uhlman enjoys the challenge of creating unique costumes from scratch.

"That one I put a lot of work into. I actually used a sombrero as the base, and then bubble wrap, and I hot glued it together," she said. "It's got 45 individual lights that all have to be turned on."

Uhlman recalled being surprised at the attention her jellyfish costume attracted.

"The first bar that we went into, everyone started clapping. Then, I almost felt famous, because people just kept coming up to get pictures taken with me. It was the same at every bar we went into."

Uhlman's costume creativity extends far beyond Halloween.

"I have an older sweater dress, and one of our friends had a Christmas party, so I went to a dollar store and a thrift store and bought the ugliest ornaments I could find, and I put them all on that dress, just making it more creative," Uhlman said.

Uhlman plans to continue having costume fun with her family and friends.

"It's fun to be something that you normally aren't and to create something that's unique," she said.

TRYSTEN JOHNSTON SAYS THE CHALLENGE IS TO OUTDO THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S COSTUMES

The Johnston family in Adair has found that Halloween fun doesn't end just because a child attains a certain age. Tera Johnston explained that her son, Trysten, continues to enjoy transforming, via costume, each year.

"We have four kids, and when they were little, I always made their costumes. It was always a fun thing to do. And I think that exploded into a love of dressing up for Halloween," Tera said. "Trysten is still a kid at heart, so he just loves that aspect of it. Every year, we figure out what he wants to be, and people love seeing him go door to door."

Tera recalled the fun of last year's costume, when Trysten became a movie character.

"A lot of people commented last year when he was dressed as Edward Scissorhands. I feel like the character is very much relatable for Trysten," Tera said. "Edward seems to display some autistic characteristics, so it was almost the perfect character. We go full out for Halloween, but then sometimes I'll find him with parts of a costume on at other times."

Most years, Trysten's costume is purchased rather than made.

"When the kids were little, I usually made their costumes. But he's almost 6 feet tall now, so there's a little more involved," Tera said. "At this point, life has gotten a little busier, so we usually buy the costume, and the makeup I'll do. Our daughter is really good at theatrical makeup, too. So, last year, for Edward Scissorhands, Trysten came here (to Revel salon) and we did his makeup, and then

we did our photo shoot here with him pretending to cut hair. We usually make videos and do a whole photo shoot. Like, when he was Teen Wolf, we went to the park to shoot baskets, just like in the movie."

Tera said finding costumes is relatively easy, but there is a different challenge.

"It's getting harder to outdo the previous year," she said. "We've already found this year's, but that's something we're keeping on the downlow, because we do our big reveal on Halloween day."

Tera said each year, Trysten studies the speaking pattern and mannerisms of whatever character he imitates, so he can fully get into the role.

"Last year, when he was Edward Scissorhands, little kids were coming up to him saying, 'Hi, Edward,' and then he'd answer back in character," Tera said.

Tera appreciates that even though Trysten is older than most trick-or-treaters, people welcome his trick-or-treating in costume each year.

"It's a chance to pretend to be something else," she said. "It's just the little things that bring such joy."

When asked about his favorite costume, Trysten had an immediate answer.

"Randy Savage," he said. "I like his boots."



KATE BROWN'S COMMUNITY THEATRE EXPERIENCE HELPS WITH HER COSTUME DESIGNS

Kate Brown of Guthrie Center enjoys expressing her creativity through costumes, and Halloween is only a portion of that.

"Probably my first experience in really dressing up, and not even in a Halloween setting per se, was 'Rocky Horror Picture Show," Brown said. "I'm a huge fan of that movie, and I've collected a lot of costumes related to it. A lot of people dress up for 'Rocky Horror' as one of the characters. It's fun; it's campy. People shout things at the screen. It's a way good time."

Brown is also active in community theatre. She showed several examples of clothing and accessories that she has found, altered or created to help with a costume in a play. One item was a pair of 3-D glasses that she thrifted for 75 cents, then removed the lenses to create "eyeglasses" for use in a theatre production.

"I thoroughly enjoy doing this. I thrift a lot of my costume stuff. When we did 'Rocky: The Musical,' I was Linda McKenna, the news reporter, so I had to collect some 1970s-type clothes," Brown said. "To me, it's like the thrill of the hunt when I go thrifting to see what I can get."

Brown also repurposes clothing that has outlived its original use. She showed a rack of neckties.



"These actually were Dad's ties; nothing is uglier than your dad's 1970s ties," she said. "We used a lot of these for the 'Rocky: The Musical' production."

Another favorite prop is a set of braided yarn "hair" (Willie Nelson style) that Brown wanted. When she couldn't readily find such an item, she quickly realized she could make it herself.

"This was something I made for myself, just using my own creativity. Basically, I

took a headband, and I started wrapping varn around it, and I braided it," Brown said. "It maybe took not even a whole week, just while I was sitting watching TV."

Because of her history in live theatre, Brown's closet holds many costume pieces from previous productions. When a new need arises, she often finds a piece she can reuse.

"As far as Halloween, I've just always loved it. Each year, I try to pick a charac-

ter that people might not see every day," Brown said. "There were many years I didn't dress up for Halloween, but my kids are all adults now, so I've got time to do stuff like this for myself now."

Nowadays, Brown likes to put on a costume to wear when she greets trick-ortreaters at her door.

"I'm not a good seamstress; never have been. I can barely sew a button on," she said. "So, for me, I try to find pieces that



are already mostly made."

Brown encourages anyone interested in putting together costumes to simply take the plunge and try. She said there are many different approaches, and each person can find what works.

Asked if she has a favorite costume experience, Brown had a clear answer.

"I would say probably my favorite was dressing up as Dr. Frank-N-Furter, from 'Rocky Horror.' So many people wanted to take my picture, and I could see how much that resonated with people," she said. "He's a very recognizable character, and, as soon as they saw me, people would just squeal."

PAMELA SHELEY, WANDA THE GOOD WITCH

Pamela Sheley, a lifelong resident of Guthrie Center, passed away in November of 2024. Her family recalled her love of Halloween and the character that she dressed as for decades.

Many years ago, Sheley began dressing as Wanda the Good Witch every Halloween. And, although the particular pieces of the costume changed some over the years, the character remained the same.

Sheley's daughter, Paula Tews, shared the story.

"She just always loved Halloween. At home, she loved getting trick-or-treaters, and she would decorate to the hilt. And even back when I was in school, she would host a Halloween party for my classmates and me. She was the assistant activity director at The New Homestead for several years, and they always had a big trick-ortreat night, and she would dress up as Wanda the Good Witch," Tews said. "She was always adamant about being 'the good witch."

Once Sheley tried out her alter-ego of Wanda, she never tired of it.

"She loved the color purple. She had the hat and broomstick. The purple and black satin hat was a guarantee for at least 20 years," Tews said. "I had worked in daycare for almost 36 years, and, every year, she would dress up and read Halloween books to the kids and bring crafts for them to do."

Tews' daughter, Jordan, recalled that, as intended, Wanda the Good Witch was seen in a positive light by children.

"Kids would ask for her by name, saying, 'When is Wanda the Witch coming?' Kids were never scared of her," Jordan said. "Her Wanda the Witch laugh was iconic."

Tews recalled that although Sheley loved being in costume, she did not always allow adequate time to prepare.

"My mom was the type that she'd work until five minutes before trick-or-treat time, and then she'd be throwing that costume on at the last minute," Tews said.

In recent years, Sheley's health became a challenge, but she continued to enjoy Halloween.

"In 2023, she was in the hospital, so we brought her costume up there, and a few people came up and trick-or-treated with her," Tews said.

By the fall of 2024, Sheley's health had deteriorated further.

"Last year, she was in the Des Moines hospital, and they said she could go home on Halloween, and that's what she wanted," Tews said.

"She came home and was on hospice for only about a week before she passed," Jordan said. "But, the first night she was home was trick-or-treat night, and that made her so happy to get to see everybody one last time and put her hat on."

Sheley passed away on Nov. 3, 2024.

"When we cleaned out her house, there were totes and totes full of costumes and

"The Conjuring: Last Rites"

"The Conjuring" series has been head and shoulders above most horror series, and this movie is no exception. Patrick Wilson and Vera Farmiga play a real life couple who are known worldwide as the ones to call if you are struggling with ghosts and other nastiness. Here, they are asked to help a family that unknowingly has a haunted full-size mirror in their attic. This movie

GUTHRIE COUNTY SUPERVISORS APPROVE PLAN FOR P28 ROAD IMPROVEMENT

SEPT. 16 - FARMERS MARKETS, CAMPING, NACO

Conservation Director Brad Halterman provided a departmental update during the Guthrie County Board of Supervisors meeting on Sept. 16. Halterman told of the farmers market events that were held at the Guthrie County Historical Village (GCHV) in Panora every other Saturday.

"It was a big success," he said. "We had the last one last Saturday."

Halterman said overall, the GCHV saw good attendance this summer and remains open until mid-October.

"It was a pretty busy summer down there," Halterman said. "Our annual Haunted Village is Sunday, Oct. 12 from 5 to 7 p.m. It's a pretty huge event. A lot of volunteers make that happen."

Halterman reported on usage of

Guthrie County's camping areas and trails.

"We've had a pretty steady camping season," he said. "The holiday weekends were really busy. We've seen a lot of activity on the Raccoon River Valley Trail throughout the summer."

Board Chair Maggie Armstrong talked about her participation in the National Association of Counties ("NACo").

"I had an introductory call to the Rural Action Caucus," Armstrong said. "They meet quarterly. We had a great conversation about what we see here and how we're not the only ones dealing with the same issues. It's more of an idea exchange."

As part of the consent agenda items, the supervisors approved two payroll change notices for new staff. Amanda Claussen was hired as a part-time dispatcher at a rate of \$21 per hour. Noah Sargent was hired as a fulltime roadside technician at \$28.37 per hour.

SEPT. 23 - LAND SALE DISCUSSION, P28 ROAD PROJECT

During the Sept. 23 meeting, citizen Ron Woods addressed the supervisors to ask if he could purchase 9.1 acres of land near the former county home building, which Woods owns. The land Woods asked about is Parcel 0000917402.

Woods explained his interest in the

"The silting going into the pond from that 9.1 acres is considerable. What I'd like to do is buy that land and turn it into either a pasture or hay field, to eliminate some of that silting," Woods said. "And my oldest son is considering building a house there, on the 9.1 acres overlooking the pond. So, it seems like a perfect fit; it squares off the property."

Supervisor Maggie Armstrong said the land is currently under lease until 2029. Woods said he would consider a lease transfer, if that were feasible.

Armstrong said the first step would be for the county to speak with the current leaseholder. Then, if appropriate, the county would like to see an offer from Woods. No formal action was taken at this time.

County Engineer Josh Sebern provided a departmental update and shared information on the upcoming P28 Road project between Panora and Stuart. He described the various options regarding road width and the related costs. The road is currently 22 feet wide and could be widened to 26 feet overall, or in certain areas, to help address safety concerns.

Sebern described a "hybrid" option of keeping the road surface at 22 feet on straight areas but widening it to 26 feet on curves, which would allow for rumble strips outside of the 22-foot striped road for additional safety.

Supervisor Steve Smith asked Sebern's preference.

"I definitely like the widening, at least

on the curves," Sebern said. "They're nice things to have for maintenance. They're nice for agriculture. They're nice for safety."

As part of the consent agenda, the supervisors approved a payroll change notice for Dana Tews, for a change to the position of jail control room operator at a wage of \$20 hourly.

SEPT. 30 - P28 ROAD PROJECT APPROVED, SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT UPDATES

During the Sept. 30 meeting, County Engineer Josh Sebern shared his recommendations for the P28 Road project between Panora and Stuart.

Sebern suggested widening the road from Monteith to Stuart to the 26-foot paved width, which would add 2 feet of paved shoulder on each side of the road. He explained that the lanes would remain at their current width, but the paved shoulder would allow for rumble strips at the outside stripe, resulting in increased safety. He noted that P28 is the second-busiest road in Guthrie County.

"My thought is widening Stuart to Monteith, and that being the primary focus," Sebern said. "From Monteith north, we handle that through maintenance and through other funds."

Sebern explained that if the supervi-

sors agree with this plan, the project will likely go out for bids in January or February of 2026 with an expected start date in or around August 2026.

The supervisors unanimously approved Sebern's recommendation.

Sheriff Matt Harmann provided a departmental update.

"Since January, we've kept overtime to a bare minimum. There's been not much at all," Harmann said. "Calls for service looks like it will be up slightly from last year."

Regarding calls for service, Harmann said the department totaled approximately 3,500 in 2024 but is ahead of that pace so far in 2025.

"Right now, we're around 2,700, so it's looking like it'll be slightly higher," Harmann said. He reported no significant new trends noted in the calls for service.

Harmann said the jail is continuing to see consistent occupancy.

"Things are going smooth in the jail," Harmann said.

Harmann reported on the jail's usage through the first six months of this year. He said 264 prisoners were admitted with 147 being Guthrie County residents and 117 out of county.

Supervisor Brian Johnson asked about the Sheriff's department's dogs. Harmann said the department has two canines, and he hopes that each can continue to serve for another four years or so.

OCT. 7 - RESISTANCE TO THE SUMMIT CARBON SOLUTION TRANSPORT LLC MOTION FOR CONSOLIDATION

During the Oct. 7 meeting, County Attorney Dana Minteer addressed the supervisors regarding agenda item 4a: "Resistance to the Summit Carbon Solution Transport LLC Motion for Consolidation."

Minteer explained the reason for discussing the issue at this time is because of recent legal action by Summit Carbon Solutions.

"They filed a petition to amend their original petition within the Phase 1 docket," she said.

Minteer summarized that Summit is asking to consolidate the legal processes with the various counties involved.

"They're requesting that everyone now be lumped together," Minteer said.

Minteer and Supervisors Chair Maggie Armstrong concurred that each county has a unique perspective, so consolidation is not appropriate, in their view.

After discussion, the supervisors voted 4-1 to ask Minteer to send a letter of resistance. Brian Johnson voted nay.

County Human Resources department head Jamie Lindsay discussed with the

supervisors regarding the effective date of health insurance for county employees. She explained that currently, coverage begins on the first day of the month following a hire date. She explained the challenges this creates for employees hired later in a given month, since their paychecks may essentially have double deductions for health insurance premiums due to the timing of premiums.

However, Lindsay also explained that if coverage were to be effective one month later, this could create situations in which employees would have no coverage for a month. She also shared that if department heads are instructed to only hire employees within a certain "window" each month, that creates a challenge as departments aim to fill vacancies.

"If we're going to make a change to the policy, we have to communicate that 60 days prior to the change," Lindsay said.

No formal action was taken at this time.

The supervisors voted to call a special election for Diamondhead Lake and Lake Panorama Rural Improvement Zone for Tuesday, Dec. 9.

The supervisors meet regularly on Tuesdays at 9 a.m. The public is welcome to attend in person or via remote technology. To join remotely, call 323-792-6123, then use meeting code 547029216# ■

GUTHRIE CENTER CITY COUNCIL GIVES 14-DAY EXTENSION FOR SHED INSTALLATION

During the regular meeting of the Guthrie Center City Council on Sept. 22, councilmembers discussed the ongoing Ludwig/Winkleblack nuisance abatement status. Dennis Ludwig said a shed will be erected on the property to house the items of concern. At the request of Ludwig and Winkleblack, the council approved a 14-day extension (until Oct. 6) for the property to be in compliance with city ordinance.

Rod Rumelhart (Hometown Insurance) described the status of the city's insurance coverage. He said the city has had few claims, which helps keep costs down. He noted the city owns roughly \$24 million in property, which costs around \$55,000 per year to insure (or \$2.24 per \$1,000 in valuation).

"This has been a good year so far," Rumelhart said.

Rumelhart shared several savings the city has or will likely receive, including a \$4,500 savings he negotiated with the insurer and an expected dividend of ap-

proximately \$13,000. The councilmembers unanimously approved the insurance renewal.

The council approved appointing Brandon Monaghan to the MJB Library Board and to accept the resignation of Marcia Priestley from the library board.

City Administrator Kris Arrasmith shared information on savings the city will likely see due to little usage of the city's Workers Comp coverage.

"We also will get some type of a credit back on our Worker's Comp insurance. We will get a little over \$5,000," Arrasmith said. "Kudos to our employees for being safe."

The councilmembers had a brief discussion about setting a date for trick-ortreating. Because of the likelihood of a high school football playoff game on Oct. 31, the city had considered setting trick-or-treat on Oct. 30 but then realized the school has parent-teacher conferences on that date.

No formal action was taken at this time. The council meets regularly at City Hall on the second and fourth Mondays at 6:30 p.m. The public is welcome. ■

ACGC SCHOOL BOARDS DISCUSS HIGH SCHOOL SCHEDULE, GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

During the Sept. 17 joint meeting of the Adair-Casey and Guthrie Center school boards, the main discussion centered around the new high school class schedule and how it will impact graduation requirements.

ACGC High School's former class schedule included five class session "blocks" per school day with classes lasting one semester. The new schedule at the high school has an eight-period day with classes running yearlong and an "even/odd" everyother-day rotation.

Interim High School Principal Cody Matthewson reported on the implementation of the new schedule at the high school.

"The first few weeks have gone great," Matthewson said. "Kids are in the swing of things with the odd-and-even days. The only really negative feedback that I've gotten is every other Wednesday is an early-

out, so they're constantly losing time with those kids. We've looked at an opportunity for the next quarter to flip our odd/even days so it kind of evens out."

Matthewson added that the five-block schedule had been in use for the past 27 years, so it's expected that students and staff will have an adjustment period to the new system.

"From a student standpoint, nobody's come to me and said, 'I love it,' and nobody's come to me and said, 'I hate it,' "Matthewson said.

Board member Kris Langgaard said one unexpected result of the new schedule is that students entering ninth grade may suddenly find a significant change in the amount of homework.

"The transition is a lot," he said.

Because of the new eight-period high school schedule, the maximum number of credits a student could accumulate in four years of high school would be 64. Rasmussen said the boards need to determine how many credits are needed for graduation under the new class schedule.

Data was shared showing credit requirements for other area school using an eight-period schedule. Atlantic, Harlan, Ogden, Madrid and I-35 schools all require a minimum of 48 credits for graduation. West Central Valley requires 51, Audubon requires 52, Panorama and Van Meter require 56.

The boards each approved the first reading of Policy 505.5 (Graduation Requirements), with 55 credits required for graduation. Board members noted that the number could still be changed prior to final approval.

Elementary Principal Tandem Eischeid reported on Guthrie Center Elementary. He said things have been running fairly smoothly, and he reported on an event that uncovered an opportunity for improvement.

"Last Monday, we had a preschooler pull our fire alarm, so we had an impromptu fire drill, and we did well with that," Eischeid said. "But, I found out that no one was coming. The fire department is not connected to our fire alarm. So, I've been in talks with Josh to get that changed."


Superintendent Josh Rasmussen provided a report and voiced thoughts and prayers for the family of Savannah Matthias, the Panorama Schools student and Guthrie Center resident who recently died in a traffic accident.

The Adair-Casey board approved the purchase of a used 12-passenger van. Rasmussen suggested it may be beneficial for the Guthrie Center district to also consider purchasing a 12-passenger van, since it could be driven by coaches transporting students to and from athletic contests or other activities, which would save costs versus using a full-size bus.

The Guthrie Center board approved the 2025 FFA National Convention trip.

Upcoming dates noted included the two-hour early dismissal (for the Homecoming parade) on Oct. 3, the Nov. 4 school board elections, and the Nov. 19-21 IASB School Board Convention. ■

During the Sept. 25 meeting of the Guthrie County Hospital Board of Trustees, Matt Leaders and Cory Bettis, representatives from Graham Construction, presented the tentative timeline for the hospital's planned improvement project.

"We're looking to start construction in early March," Leaders said, adding that the construction period is tentatively expected to be from March 2026 to August 2028. He also said the tentative start date of March 2 is somewhat weather-dependent.

Chief Financial Officer Brandon Johnson provided a monthly report on finances.

It was noted that seasonal flu shots for staff have begun to be scheduled and administered.

Foundation Director Dennis Flanery

said the 5K walk/run and health fair are set for Oct. 4. He added that the hospital auxiliary plans to hold a potato bar fundraiser on Nov. 20.

The trustees voted to approve opening a bank account for the improvement project and to set a date for a hearing on a proposal to issue bonds or notes and borrow funds related to the project. CEO Chris Stipe noted that the hospital still could decide to shelve the project if unforeseen challenges arise.

"This is not a point of no return yet," he said.

The trustees set the hearing for Oct. 23 (the date of the next regular board meeting).

The board went into a special closed session to discuss a personnel matter.

The next regular meeting of the trustees is set for Oct. 23 at 4 p.m. The public is welcome. ■



LINDA'S HAIR HUT & GIFTS

Although the hair salon is the bulk of Linda Caltrider's business, the gift shop items have grown in popularity.

Linda Caltrider, owner of Linda's Hair Hut & Gifts in Casey, has a simple business plan: treat customers well and listen to what they want. That plan has worked well for decades, so don't expect major changes anytime soon.

Caltrider explained how she came to own a hair salon in Casey.

"When I graduated from high school, I was either going to be a dental assistant or a hairdresser, and I decided that this is me," she said. "I graduated at Creston from their Hair Tech in September of 1985. Then I got my first job in Anita, at the Rusty Razor, and worked there for about eight months."

Unexpectedly, an opportunity arose to run her own business, and Caltrider jumped at the chance.

"There was an elderly lady who had been in the business in Casey for 50 years, and she was retiring, and she said I should come to Casey," Caltrider said. "So, in July of 1986, I rented a little building from her. I stayed there for about 35 years, then came over here. I had always wanted a bigger building, so I could have a gift shop. I bought this building from my brother, and my husband, Kurt, and I remodeled it."

Caltrider's business is located at 607 McPherson St. in Casev.

"It used to be a post office, and years before that it had been a doctor's office," she said.

As soon as the building was remodeled, Caltrider began making use of the addition space by offering an eclectic array of gift shop items.

"What really got the gift shop started was, I had a friend encourage me to start making gift baskets. I used to make them just as gifts, so I started making more," Caltrider said.

Although the hair salon is the bulk of her business, the gift shop items have grown in popularity. Currently, Caltrider estimates that about one-fourth of her business is the

gift shop. Beauty services offered include haircuts, styling, perms, hair coloring, highlights and waxing.

Describing the variety of items for sale is a challenge; it is much easier to simply stop in and see. There are JR Watkins items (spices, seasonings, lotions, etc.), home

décor, kitchen items, health and beauty items, garden stones/yard art, local honey, greeting cards, and much more. Caltrider also keeps an inventory of her homemade and seasonally themed gift baskets. Some items are offered on consignment.

"I have a lady who makes tea towels. I

have a guy who paints pictures," Caltrider said. "I also have consignment clothing. I have hair products for sale as well. Sometimes people come in and ask for a certain thing, and then I'll see if I can get it in

The shop is open Tuesdays, Thursdays,

Fridays and Saturdays, and Caltrider puts in long hours on those days.

"I'm here usually from 8 in the morning until 6 or 7 o'clock at night," she said. Appointments can be made by calling Caltrider's business phone at 641-746-3375.

Having been in the business for decades, Caltrider has gotten to know her clients quite well.

"I've had a lot of customers where I gave them their first haircut, and then they've graduated and gone off to college, and then they come back to Casey for a haircut. There are generations that have come through," she said. "I like being here and being around family and friends."

Caltrider has two sons and a daughter-in-law (Nicolas, Dylan and Dylan's wife, Megan), as well as many other relatives and extended family members in the local area. She enjoys being active in the Casey community.

"I'm on the flower committee for Casey and the service club," Caltrider said. "I like to help out wherever and whenever I can."


For Caltrider, the most satisfying part of her career is knowing that she meets a need and makes a connection with her

THE SWEET SMELLS OF CASEY CANDLE COMPANY

Cara Caltrider devotes approximately 30 hours per week to her candles and other creations.

In her spare time, a young local hobbyist/entrepreneur is enjoying the sweet smell of success as customers enjoy the pleasant aromas of the products she creates. Cara Caltrider's venture is known as Casey Candle Company. She explained how she started.

"I started it in 2023. When I was in high school, I had the dream of starting my own company. I created my first candle in my parents' kitchen, and I had to do a lot of research about how to make candles. Then, during college, I kind of took a break, but I got back into it later," Caltrider said. "When I first started, I slowly kept branching out. It's been a lot of trial and error. Now, I make candles, countertop sprays, room sprays, wax melts, dough bowls and car diffusers."

Although she has a fulltime job, Caltrider still devotes approximately 30 hours per week to her candles and other creations.

Caltrider enjoys offering her items at vendor markets in the area but has also found shelf space in two local stores.

"I do a lot of vendor events in area towns on the weekends," she said. "I also sell my products at Hometown Basics in Casey and The Egg Crate in Elkhorn." Caltrider recalled how she has needed to learn on the fly as she created her products, and her family and friends have been happy to help.

"My favorite story is from when I was first starting out. I got an order from a local business, and it was in the winter, so my dad, who is a farmer, offered to help

me, since he had some free time. You typically wouldn't find a farmer learning how to pour candles, but he did fine," Caltrider said. "It's great because my family has been so willing to step in whenever I need help."

Caltrider recalled learning that attention to detail matters.

"The hardest part of it is getting the measurements correct, for fragrance and stuff. When I first started out, I struggled with that," Caltrider said. "I try to keep up the inventory, but I sell out of things a lot, so it's tough to keep up with it. So, I'm usually making candles every day."

Caltrider also learned that candles and summer heat do not mix.

"In the summer, I do a lot of outdoor events, and then, in the winter, it's indoor events," she said. "One time in the summer, I was going to a vendor event and hadn't thought about it, and they melted, so I had to fix them. Now I haul them in coolers when it's hot."

One unusual but popular item Caltrider makes is dough bowls, which are decorative wooden bowls designed to hold melted wax and/or serve as a candle holder.

"The dough bowls have been the most popular, just because nobody else around here sells them," she said.

Caltrider continually strives to add new scents or change the scents out seasonally.

"I have a flannel scent and a cinnamon bun scent that are very popular," Caltrider said. She noted that the flannel and leather canyon woods are the most popular scents with men. Other options include vanilla caramel spice, lavender, pumpkin pie and Columbian coffee.

Caltrider recently began making some candles with a base of beef tallow. She explained that this type of candle-making is more time-consuming.

"It gets rendered from beef fat. It's a lot harder. I have to put the tallow in a pot

and simmer it on low for a couple hours, then drain it and put it in the fridge overnight. Then scrape it off and remelt it," she said.

Caltrider recently began getting beef tallow for her candle making from local farm BC Angus.

As her hobby and production have grown, Caltrider has sought more outlets for selling her items. She has a website and also uses Facebook and Instagram to market her Casey Candle company creations.

Caltrider has a long-term goal for her venture but understands it can't be hurried.

"I'd eventually like to have a store, just so I could do events and fun things like that. So, that would be the ideal goal, but who knows when that will happen," she said.





Q: I SEE THAT THE GUTHRIE **COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE IS** HIRING ANOTHER DEPUTY, WHO **LEFT, AND WHY?**

A: According to Guthrie County Sheriff Matt Harmann, nobody left. Harmann told us the sheriff's department eliminated a deputy jail transport position and is using some of that money toward an additional deputy. The spending was approved in the county budget session and authorized in a resolution that the county supervisors voted on several months ago.

Q: I NOTICED YOU ARE PUBLISHING COMMUNITY MAPS NOW. HOW DO I GET ONE FOR **GUTHRIE CENTER?**

LIHEAP customers need to furnish some form of identification, a copy of their most recent heating and electric bill, and proof of all household members' gross income for the past 30 calendar days, the most recent 12 months, or for the past calendar year. Apply in person by calling to





PARMESAN GARLIC FOCACCIA BREAD IS A SLICE OF COMFORT

This month, I share another recipe from my daughter, Samantha. She loves to make all kinds of bread. Few things make a kitchen feel more welcoming than the aroma of freshly baked bread, and parmesan garlic focaccia delivers that comfort in every bite. Golden and crisp on the outside yet soft and airy inside, this Italian favorite is elevated with the irresistible pairing of roasted garlic and nutty parmesan cheese. It is the kind of bread that fe

parmesan cheese. It is the kind of bread that feels special but is surprisingly simple to make at home. Serve as a side with soups and pastas, cut into squares for an appetizer board, or enjoy warm right out of the pan. Focaccia is versatile and crowd pleasing. The drizzle of olive oil, a sprinkling of herbs and the cheesy finish give it that bakery-style touch you will love sharing — or keeping all to yourself. Enjoy!

PARMESAN GARLIC FOCACCIA BREAD

Ingredients:

- 1½ cups warm water (about 110°F)
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2¼ teaspoons instant yeast (1 packet)
- 4 cups flour
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1/3 cup extra virgin olive oil, plus more for greasing
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 2/3 cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 teaspoon dried Italian herbs or chopped rosemary
- Flaky sea salt

Directions

Combine warm water, sugar and



yeast. Let sit for 5 minutes until foamy. Add flour and salt. Mix until dough forms. (It will be sticky.) With a mixer, kneed for 5-7 minutes or by hand for 8-10 minutes until smooth. Brush dough with olive oil and cover. Let rise 1-1.5 hours in a warm spot until dough has doubled. Heat 2 tablespoons olive oil with minced garlic until fragrant

(about 1 minute) in a pan. Keep for later. Place dough in greased 9-inch by 13-inch pan. Gently press to corners. Let rest 10 minutes, then stretch. Cover and rise 30-45 minutes. Preheat oven to 425 F. With your fingers, dimple the dough all over. Brush with garlic oil. Then sprinkle parmesan cheese, herbs and sea salt on top of dough. Bake 20-25 minutes until golden brown. Cool 10 minutes in pan, then transfer to wire rack. Slice and serve warm. Store bread for two days at room temperature or freeze up to three months.

For the best results, follow these additional steps: Make sure your water is warm (110 F), not hot. For the best texture, let the dough rise completely. Use plenty of oil in your pan, as this will give your bread a crisp crust.


