We live joyfully, because the Father invites us to pray to Him as children talk to their dear father. We live joyfully, because Jesus has done it all for us."

St. Paul also adds, "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. Do not quench the Spirit. Do not despise prophecies, but test everything; hold fast what is good. Abstain from every form of evil. Now may the God of peace himself sanctify you completely, and

> may your whole spirit and soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus

Christ. He who calls you is faithful; he will surely do it" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-24, ESV).

As we joyfully critique mat-

ters of life and death in AD 2020 as well as look at mundane things in our lives, such as the music we listen to and the movies we watch through the lens of His Word, we discover that a Christ-centered focus of life, centered in His Word and Sacraments, gives light and wisdom to us as well as to our neighbors.
